## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

**Digest: The Act changes some laws about labs, overdose reports and terms about the environment. The Act makes a new law to keep some information secret. The Act also lets OHA have more contracts for school-based health centers. (Flesch Readability Score: 68.5).**

The Act also lets OHA have more contracts for school-based health centers and tells OHA to sign up some people for medical assistance. (Flesch Readability Score: 63.6).]*

Changes the date by which the Oregon Health Authority report on opioid and opiate overdoses is due to the Legislative Assembly.

Changes the definition of "hemodialysis technician."

Requires the authority to keep confidential specified information related to psilocybin licensees, license applicants and permit holders.

Defines "environmental health." Changes requirements for authorizations for certain environmental health occupations and professions.

Aligns state regulations of clinical laboratories with federal law.

Broadens the authority's ability to enter into contracts for purposes of supporting school-based health centers.

*[Requires the authority or the Department of Human Services to enroll an eligible individual in a correctional facility in pre-release medical assistance.]*

**Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

## OVERDOSE REPORTING

**SECTION 1.** ORS 432.141 is amended to read:

432.141. (1) From resources available to the Oregon Health Authority, the authority shall compile statistics on the total number of opioid and opiate overdoses and the total number of opioid and opiate overdose related deaths occurring in this state.

(2) Not less than once every three months, the authority shall report to the Governor and each local health department, as defined in ORS 431.003, the statistics compiled under subsection (1) of

2 (3) Not later than [September 15] **January 15** of each year, the authority shall report to the in-  
3 terim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to health care, in the manner provided by ORS  
4 192.245, the statistics compiled under subsection (1) of this section **for the immediately preceding**  
5 **year. The report must include the most recently available relevant data.**

6 **SECTION 2.** (1) The amendments to ORS 432.141 by section 1 of this 2025 Act first apply  
7 to the report required under ORS 432.141 (3) in 2027.

8 (2) Notwithstanding ORS 432.141 (3), the report required under ORS 432.141 (3) is not re-  
9 quired to be submitted in 2026.

11 **HEMODIALYSIS TECHNICIANS**

13 **SECTION 3.** ORS 688.625 is amended to read:

14 688.625. As used in ORS 688.625 to 688.665:

15 [(1) "*Hemodialysis technician*" means a person certified by the Oregon Health Authority under  
16 ORS 688.650.]

17 (1)(a) "**Hemodialysis technician**" means a person who provides hemodialysis services as  
18 that term is defined by the Oregon Health Authority by rule.

19 (b) "**Hemodialysis technician**" does not include a licensed health care provider if the  
20 provision of hemodialysis services falls within the licensed health care provider's scope of  
21 practice.

22 (2) "Outpatient renal dialysis facility" has the meaning given that term in ORS 442.015.

24 **PSILOCYBIN SERVICES**

25  
26 **SECTION 4.** Sections 5 and 6 of this of this 2025 Act are added to and made a part of ORS  
27 475A.210 to 475A.722.

28 **SECTION 5.** (1) Except as provided in this section, section 6 of this 2025 Act and ORS  
29 475A.586, the Oregon Health Authority shall keep confidential any information obtained by  
30 the authority as part of an investigation of a psilocybin training program or a licensee,  
31 licensee representative, applicant for licensure, holder of a permit issued under ORS 475A.483  
32 or applicant for a permit issued under ORS 475A.483, including any information contained in  
33 a complaint, and any information that might reasonably lead to the identification of a  
34 complainant.

35 (2) The authority may disclose the information described in subsection (1) of this section  
36 to the extent necessary to conduct an investigation or as allowed under section 6 of this 2025  
37 Act.

38 (3) If the authority issues a notice of intent to deny a license or permit, a notice of intent  
39 to impose a disciplinary sanction or a notice of intent to deny training program course ap-  
40 proval, the authority:

41 (a) Shall disclose information obtained as part of an investigation of an applicant,  
42 permittee, training program or licensee if the requester of the information demonstrates by  
43 clear and convincing evidence that the public interest in disclosure outweighs any interests  
44 in nondisclosure, including but not limited to the public interest in nondisclosure.

45 (b) May disclose to a complainant a written summary of information obtained as part of

1 an investigation of an applicant, permittee, training program or licensee resulting from the  
2 complainant's complaint to the extent the authority determines necessary to explain the  
3 reasons for the authority's decisions related to the complaint. The applicant, permittee,  
4 provider of a training program or licensee that is the subject of the complaint may request  
5 and is entitled to receive a copy of a written summary under this paragraph from which the  
6 authority shall redact any information that could be reasonably used to identify the  
7 complainant.

8 (4) If the authority issues a notice of intent to deny a license or permit, a notice of intent  
9 to impose a disciplinary sanction or a notice of intent to deny a training program course  
10 approval, the applicant, permittee, provider of a training program or licensee that is the  
11 subject of the notice may request, and the authority shall disclose to the applicant,  
12 permittee, provider of a training program or licensee all information obtained by the au-  
13 thority in the investigation of the allegations in the notice except:

14 (a) Information that is privileged or confidential under a law other than this section;

15 (b) Information that would enable the identification of any person who provided infor-  
16 mation that led to the filing of the notice and who will not provide testimony at a hearing  
17 arising out of the investigation;

18 (c) Information that would enable the identification of a person as a complainant to the  
19 authority about the applicant, permittee, training program or licensee; or

20 (d) Reports of expert witnesses.

21 (5) Nothing in this section is intended to prohibit the authority from making public:

22 (a) A notice of intent issued by the authority to deny a license or permit, to impose a  
23 disciplinary sanction against an applicant, permittee, provider of a training program or  
24 licensee or to deny training program course approval;

25 (b) A final order that results from a notice described in paragraph (a) of this subsection;

26 (c) An emergency suspension order; or

27 (d) A consent order or stipulated agreement that involves the conduct of an applicant,  
28 permittee, training program or licensee.

29 **SECTION 6.** (1) As used in this section, "public entity" means:

30 (a) A board or agency of this state;

31 (b) A board or agency of another state with regulatory or enforcement functions similar  
32 to those of the Oregon Health Authority under ORS 475A.210 to 475A.722;

33 (c) A district attorney;

34 (d) The Department of Justice; or

35 (e) A law enforcement agency.

36 (2) Subject to section 5 of this 2025 Act, the Oregon Health Authority may disclose con-  
37 fidential information to another public entity if the information reasonably relates to the  
38 regulatory or enforcement function of that other public entity. A public entity that receives  
39 information under this subsection shall take all reasonable steps to maintain the  
40 confidentiality of the information, except that the public entity may use or disclose the in-  
41 formation to the extent necessary to carry out the regulatory or enforcement functions of  
42 the public entity.

43 (3) The authority may not disclose information described in subsection (2) of this section  
44 to another public entity if the information relates to the provision of or referral for repro-  
45 ductive or gender-affirming health care services.

1       **SECTION 7.** ORS 475A.380 is amended to read:

2       475A.380. [*Minimum standards of education and training for psilocybin service facilitators;*  
3 *rules.*] (1) The Oregon Health Authority shall adopt by rule minimum standards of education and  
4 training requirements for psilocybin service facilitators.

5       (2) The authority shall approve **training program** courses for psilocybin service facilitators.  
6 To obtain approval of a **training program** course, the provider of a **training program** course must  
7 submit an outline of instruction to the authority. The outline must include the approved **training**  
8 **program** courses, total hours of instruction, hours of lectures in theory and the hours of instruction  
9 in application of practical skills.

10       **SECTION 8.** ORS 475A.483 is amended to read:

11       475A.483. [*Issuing, renewing permits; fees; rules.*] (1) The Oregon Health Authority shall issue  
12 permits to qualified applicants to perform work described in ORS 475A.480. The authority shall  
13 adopt rules establishing:

- 14       (a) The qualifications for performing work described in ORS 475A.480;
- 15       (b) The term of a permit issued under this section;
- 16       (c) Procedures for applying for and renewing a permit issued under this section; and
- 17       (d) Reasonable application, issuance and renewal fees for a permit issued under this section.

18       (2)(a) The authority may require an individual applying for a permit under this section to suc-  
19 cessfully complete a **training program** course, made available by or through the authority, through  
20 which the individual receives training on:

- 21       (A) Checking identification;
- 22       (B) Detecting intoxication;
- 23       (C) Handling psilocybin products;
- 24       (D) If applicable, the manufacturing of psilocybin products;
- 25       (E) The content of ORS 475A.210 to 475A.722 and rules adopted under ORS 475A.210 to  
26 475A.722; or
- 27       (F) Any matter deemed necessary by the authority to protect the public health and safety.

28       (b) The authority or other provider of a **training program** course may charge a reasonable fee  
29 for the **training program** course.

30       (c) The authority may not require an individual to successfully complete a **training program**  
31 course more than once, except that:

32       (A) As part of a final order suspending a permit issued under this section, the authority may  
33 require a permit holder to successfully complete the **training program** course as a condition of  
34 lifting the suspension; and

35       (B) As part of a final order revoking a permit issued under this section, the authority shall re-  
36 quire an individual to successfully complete the **training program** course prior to applying for a  
37 new permit.

38       (3) The authority shall conduct a criminal records check under ORS 181A.195 on an individual  
39 applying for a permit under this section.

40       (4) Subject to the applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183, the authority may suspend, revoke  
41 or refuse to issue or renew a permit if the individual who is applying for or who holds the permit:

42       (a) Is convicted of a felony or is convicted of an offense under ORS 475A.210 to 475A.722, except  
43 that the authority may not consider a conviction for an offense under ORS 475A.210 to 475A.722 if  
44 the date of the conviction is two or more years before the date of the application or renewal;

45       (b) Violates any provision of ORS 475A.210 to 475A.722 or any rule adopted under ORS 475A.210

1 to 475A.722; or

2 (c) Makes a false statement to the authority.

3 (5) A permit issued under this section is a personal privilege and permits work described under  
4 ORS 475A.480 only for the individual who holds the permit.

5 **SECTION 9.** ORS 475A.586 is amended to read:

6 475A.586. [*Certain information related to licensure exempt from disclosure.*] (1) Subject to sub-  
7 section (2) of this section, information is exempt from public disclosure under ORS 192.311 to 192.478  
8 if the information is:

9 (a) Personally identifiable information, as defined in ORS 432.005;

10 (b) The address of a premises for which a license has been issued or for which an applicant has  
11 proposed licensure under ORS 475A.290, 475A.305 or 475A.594;

12 (c) Related to the security plan or the operational plan for a premises for which a license has  
13 been issued or for which an applicant has proposed licensure under ORS 475A.290, 475A.305 or  
14 475A.594; or

15 (d) Related to any record that the Oregon Health Authority determines contains proprietary  
16 information of a licensee.

17 (2) The exemption from public disclosure as provided by this section does not apply to:

18 (a) The name of an individual listed on an application, if the individual is a direct owner of the  
19 business operating or to be operated under the license; or

20 (b) A request for information if the request is made by a law enforcement agency, **unless the**  
21 **information requested is confidential pursuant to section 5 of this 2025 Act.**

22 (3) For purposes of subsection (2)(a) of this section, an individual is not a direct owner of the  
23 business operating or to be operated under the license if:

24 (a) The direct owner of the business operating or to be operated under the license is a legal  
25 entity; and

26 (b) The individual is merely a general partner, limited partner, member, shareholder, or other  
27 direct or indirect owner of the legal entity.

29 676.177. (1) **For purposes of this section, “public entity” means:**

30 (a) **A board or agency of this state, or a board or agency of another state with regulatory**  
31 **or enforcement functions similar to the functions of a health professional regulatory board**  
32 **of this state;**

33 (b) **A district attorney;**

34 (c) **The Department of Justice;**

35 (d) **A state or local public body of this state that licenses, franchises or provides emer-**  
36 **gency medical services; or**

37 (e) **A law enforcement agency of this state, another state or the federal government.**

38 [(1)] (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 676.165 to 676.180 and except as provided

10 (4) Notwithstanding subsections [(1) to] (2) and (3) of this section, the Oregon Board of Physical  
11 Therapy may disclose information described in subsection [(1)] (2) of this section to the Physical  
12 Therapy Compact Commission established in ORS 688.240.

13 (5) A health professional regulatory board may not disclose the information described in sub-  
14 section [(1)] (2) of this section to another public entity if the information relates to the provision  
15 of or referral for reproductive or gender-affirming health care services.

16 (6) **A health professional regulatory board may disclose to the Oregon Health Authority**  
17 **information described in subsection (2) of this section. The authority shall take all reasonable**  
18 **steps to maintain the confidentiality of any information received under this subsection, ex-**  
19 **cept that the authority may use the information to the extent necessary to carry out its**  
20 **regulatory or enforcement functions under ORS 475A.210 to 475A.722.**

21 **SECTION 11. Sections 5 and 6 of this 2025 Act and the amendments to ORS 475A.380,**

26 **ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH REGISTRATION BOARD**

27  
28 **SECTION 12.** ORS 700.010 is amended to read:

29 700.010. As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

30 (1) “Board” means the Environmental Health Registration Board, established within the Health  
31 Licensing Office.

32 (2) “Certified professional soil scientist” means a person registered in good standing with the  
33 American Registry of Certified Professionals in Agronomy, Crops and Soils.

34 (3) **“Environmental health” means the art and science of applying sanitary, biological and**  
35 **physical science principles and knowledge to improve and control the environment and fac-**  
36 **tors therein for the protection of the health and welfare of the public.**

37 [(3)] (4) “Environmental health specialist” means a person who by education, training and ex-  
38 perience in the sanitary, biological and physical sciences is qualified to perform duties in environ-  
39 mental [sanitation] **health**, including but not limited to scientific investigation and education and  
40 counseling in environmental [sanitation] **health**.

41 [(4)] (5) “Environmental health specialist trainee” means a person who lacks the combination  
42 of training, education and experience required for a registered environmental health specialist, but  
43 who is engaged in meeting the requirements.

44 [(5) “Environmental sanitation” means the art and science of applying sanitary, biological and  
45 physical science principles and knowledge to improve and control the environment and factors therein

1 *for the protection of the health and welfare of the public.]*

2 (6) "Registrant" means any person registered with the office under this chapter.

3 (7) "Registration" means written authorization issued under ORS 700.030 or 700.053 for the  
4 holder to perform duties in the fields of environmental [*sanitation*] **health** or waste water sanitation.

5 [(8) "*Science courses relating to environmental sanitation*" include courses in public or community  
6 *health or in sanitary, biological or physical sciences.*]

7 [(9) (8) "Trainee registration" means written authorization issued under ORS 700.035 or 700.062  
8 for the holder to perform duties as an environmental health specialist trainee or as a waste water  
9 specialist trainee.

10 [(10) (9) "Waste water specialist" means a person who by education, training and experience  
11 in the sanitary, biological and physical sciences is qualified to perform duties in the field of waste  
12 water treatment, disposal and reuse where soil is used in the final stage of the treatment process.

13 [(11) (10) "Waste water specialist trainee" means a person who lacks the combination of train-  
14 ing, education and experience required for a registered waste water specialist, but who is engaged  
15 in the process of meeting the requirements.

16 **SECTION 13.** ORS 700.025 is amended to read:

17 700.025. The provisions of ORS 700.020 (2) do not apply to:

18 (1) Any person teaching, lecturing or engaging in research in environmental [*sanitation*] **health**  
19 but only in so far as such activities are performed as part of an academic position in a college or  
20 university.

21 (2) Any person who is a sanitary engineer, public health engineer or registered professional  
22 engineer.

23 (3) Any public health officer employed pursuant to ORS 431.001 to 431.550, 431.705 to 431.760,  
24 431.990 and 431A.005 to 431A.020.

25 (4) Any person employed by a federal governmental agency but only at such times as the person  
26 is carrying out the functions of employment.

27 (5) Any person who holds a doctorate in veterinary medicine.

28 (6) The performances of such duties as meat inspection, produce inspection, bee inspection, grain  
29 warehouse inspection, landscaping, gardening, plumbing, septic tank or cesspool installation or in-  
30 sect and rodent poison application.

13 **SECTION 42.** ORS 413.223 is amended to read:

14 413.223. The division of the Oregon Health Authority that is charged with public health func-  
15 tions:

16 (1) Shall develop and continuously refine a system of care that:

17 (a) Meets the developmental needs of adolescents;

18 (b) Promotes evidence-based practices for children; and

19 (c) Prioritizes public health through activities such as:

20 (A) Establishing certification and performance standards;

21 (B) Collecting and analyzing clinical data;

22 (C) Conducting ongoing assessments and special studies; and

23 (D) Defining a statewide planning and development process.

24 (2) Shall adopt by rule the procedures and criteria for the certification, suspension and decerti-  
25 fication of school-based health centers. The procedures must allow certified school-based health  
26 centers a reasonable period of time to cure any defects in compliance prior to the suspension or  
27 decertification of the school-based health center.

28 (3) Shall convene work groups to recommend best practices for school-based health centers with  
29 respect to electronic health records, billing, joint purchasing, business models and patient centered  
30 primary care home identification.

31 (4)(a) May, in addition to the duties described in subsection (1) of this section, enter into [*a*  
32 *contract with an entity that coordinates the efforts of school-based health centers*] **contracts with**  
33 **entities** for the purpose of providing assistance to school-based health centers that receive grant

2 (a) "Community health center or safety net clinic" means a nonprofit medical clinic or school-  
3 based health center that provides primary physical health, vision, dental or mental health services  
4 to low-income patients without charge or using a sliding scale based on the income of the patient.

5 (b) "School-based health center" means a health clinic that:

6 (A) Is located on the grounds of a school in a school district or on the grounds of a school op-  
7 erated by a federally recognized Indian tribe or tribal organization;

8 (B) Is organized through collaboration among **youth**, schools, communities and health providers,  
9 including public health authorities;

10 (C) Is administered by a county, state, federal or private organization that ensures that certi-  
11 fication requirements are met and provides project funding through grants, contracts, billing or  
12 other sources of funds;

13 (D) Is operated exclusively for the purpose of providing health services such as:

14 (i) Primary care;

15 (ii) Preventive health care;

16 (iii) Management and monitoring of chronic health conditions;

17 (iv) Behavioral health care;

18 (v) Oral health care;

19 (vi) Health education services; and

20 (vii) The administration of vaccines recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Pre-  
21 vention;

22 (E) Provides health services to children and adolescents by licensed or certified health profes-  
23 sionals; and

24 (F) May provide one or more health services to children and adolescents by:

25 (i) A student enrolled in a professional medical, nursing or dental program at an accredited  
26 university if the health service is within the student's field of study and training; or

27 (ii) An expanded practice dental hygienist holding a permit issued under ORS 680.200 for oral  
28 health care.

29 (2)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall award grants to community health centers or safety  
30 net clinics, including school-based health centers, to ensure the capacity of each grantee to provide  
31 health care services to underserved or vulnerable populations.

32 (b) The authority shall work with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and  
33 stakeholders to identify additional sources of funding for school-based health center expenditures for  
34 which federal financial participation is available under Title XIX or Title XXI of the Social Security  
35 Act.

36 (3) The authority shall provide outreach for the Cover All People program, including develop-  
37 ment and administration of an application assistance program, and including grants to provide  
38 funding to organizations and local groups for outreach and enrollment activities for the program,  
39 within the limits of funds provided by the Legislative Assembly for this purpose.

40 (4) The authority shall, using funds allocated by the Legislative Assembly:

41 (a) Provide funds for the expansion and continuation of school-based health centers that are  
42 operating on July 29, 2013, and that become certified under ORS 413.223;

43 (b) Direct funds to communities with certified school-based health centers and to communities  
44 planning for certified school-based health centers; and

45 (c) Create a pool of funds available to provide financial incentives to:

1 (A) Increase the number of school-based health centers identified as patient centered primary  
2 care homes without requiring school-based health centers to be identified as patient centered pri-  
3 mary care homes;

4 (B) Improve the coordination of the care of patients served by coordinated care organizations  
5 and school-based health centers; and

6 (C) Improve the effectiveness of the delivery of health services through school-based health  
7 centers to children who qualify for medical assistance.

8 (5) The authority shall by rule adopt criteria for awarding grants and providing funds in ac-  
9 cordance with this section.

10 (6) The authority shall analyze and evaluate the implementation of the Cover All People pro-  
11 gram.
