## SENATE MINORITY REPORT AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL 916

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 3 and 4 and insert "creating new provisions; amending
 ORS 181A.355, 181A.490, 181A.708, 181A.710, 181A.775, 238.005, 243.650, 243.672, 243.712, 243.726,
 243.742, 243.746, 243.752, 332.531, 352.118, 657.010, 657.153, 657.176, 657.200, 657.202, 657.310, 657.317
 and 657.400; and repealing ORS 243.732, 243.736 and 243.738.

5 "Whereas members of the majority party in support of unemployment benefits for workers who 6 choose not to work have received a combined \$1,003,595.46 in campaign contributions from union 7 organizations that also support unemployment benefits for workers who choose not to work; and

8 "Whereas Senators of the majority party who will vote on giving unemployment benefits for 9 workers who choose not to work have received a combined \$1,793,364.72 in campaign contributions 10 from union organizations that support unemployment benefits for workers who choose not to work; 11 and

12 "Whereas members of the majority party in both chambers who will vote on giving unemploy-13 ment benefits for workers who choose not to work have received a combined \$4,010,405.86 in cam-14 paign contributions from union organizations that also support unemployment benefits for workers 15 who choose not to work; and

16 "Whereas members of the majority party have repeatedly and directly contradicted the very 17 arguments they have made to justify the need for this bill today; and

18 "Whereas members of the majority party have stated on the record, 'These Senators should be 19 here doing their jobs....'; and

20 "Whereas members of the majority party have stated on the record, 'These Senators need to do 21 their jobs. The people of Oregon have to show up to work every day, their legislators should too.'; 22 and

<sup>23</sup> "Whereas members of the majority party have stated on the record, '[W]alking out on the job <sup>24</sup> and holding the entire state hostage isn't fair to the people of Oregon.'; and

25 "Whereas members of the majority party have stated on the record, 'Oregonians who do not 26 show up to work don't get paid. Senators who do not show up need to start returning the hard-27 earned tax dollars they do not earn.'; and

28 "Whereas members of the majority party have stated on the record, 'Oregonians work for a 29 living every day. And they don't get paid when they don't show up.'; and

30 "Whereas members of the majority party have stated on the record, 'You have a job. You show 31 up to work.'; and

32 "Whereas representatives of the AFL-CIO have stated on the record, 'It's time to hold politicians 33 accountable for their actions and ensure they show up to work.'; and

34 "Whereas representatives of the Coalition of Communities of Color have stated on the record,

1 'It's not fair that politicians can skip work and keep their jobs. They should have to play by the 2 same rules as all other Oregonians.'; and

3 "Whereas representatives of the American Federation of Teachers-Oregon have stated on the 4 record, 'As educators and other professionals in Oregon's schools, we know that attendance mat-5 ters.... Unfortunately, too many politicians don't take their attendance seriously. Over the past three 6 years, politicians have skipped work.'; and

"Whereas representatives of SEIU Oregon have stated on the record, 'Oregon's essential workers show up to work every day.... We are so disheartened by politicians who don't do *their* jobs.';
and

10 "Whereas representatives of SEIU Oregon have stated on the record, 'If we don't show up to 11 work, there are real consequences ... such as losing pay ... [P]oliticians who skip work ... don't face 12 the same consequences that regular working people face. And that must change.'; and

13 "Whereas representatives of SEIU Oregon have stated on the record, 'If politicians don't want 14 to show up to work and do their jobs, it's time for them to GO.'; and

15 "Whereas representatives of the Fair Shot for All Coalition have stated on the record, 'It's time 16 to hold politicians accountable.... They must show up and do their work--or face consequences.'; and 17 "Whereas representatives of Everytown for Gun Safety Action Fund have stated on the record,

18 'Politicians should NOT get to pick and choose when they come to work.'; and

19 "Whereas representatives of Oregon AFSCME have stated on the record, 'You don't get paid if 20 you are on strike.... It's time for politicians to face consequences for their action and be held ac-21 countable for their decisions to walk out on the job.'; now, therefore,".

23 "SECTION 1. ORS 657.200 is amended to read:

<sup>24</sup> "657.200. (1) [An individual is disqualified for benefits] Notwithstanding the provisions of this <sup>25</sup> chapter relating to availability for work, actively seeking work or refusal to accept suitable <sup>26</sup> work, an individual who is otherwise eligible for benefits is not disqualified for benefits or <sup>27</sup> waiting week credit for any week with respect to which the Director of the Employment Depart-<sup>28</sup> ment finds that the unemployment of the individual is due to a [labor dispute] lockout that is in <sup>29</sup> active progress at the factory, establishment or other premises at which the individual is or was last <sup>30</sup> employed or at which the individual claims employment rights by union agreement or otherwise.

31 "(2)(a) An individual is disqualified for benefits for the first three weeks with respect to 32 which the Director of the Employment Department finds that the unemployment of the in-33 dividual is due to a strike that is in active progress at the factory, establishment or other 34 premises at which the individual is or was last employed or at which the individual claims 35 employment rights by union agreement or otherwise.

36 "(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of this chapter relating to availability for work, ac-37 tively seeking work or refusal to accept suitable work, after the first three weeks, an indi-38 vidual described in paragraph (a) of this subsection who is otherwise eligible for benefits is 39 not disqualified for benefits or waiting week credit for any subsequent week of unemploy-40 ment due to the strike.

41 "[(2) When an employer operates two or more premises in the conduct of business they shall be 42 considered one premises for the purposes of this chapter if the labor dispute at one makes it impossible 43 or impractical to conduct work at the others or in a normal manner.]

44 "[(3) This section does not apply if it is shown to the satisfaction of the director that the 45 individual:] 1 "[(a) Is unemployed due to a lockout, as defined in ORS 662.205, at the factory, establishment or 2 other premises at which the individual was last employed; or]

3 "[(b)(A) Is not participating in or financing or directly interested in the labor dispute that caused
4 the unemployment of the individual; and]

5 "[(B) Does not belong to a grade or class of workers of which, immediately before the commence-6 ment of the labor dispute, there were members employed at the premises at which the labor dispute 7 occurs, any of whom are participating in or financing or directly interested in the dispute.]

8 "[(4) An individual who meets all other applicable benefit eligibility requirements of this chapter 9 is not disqualified from receipt of benefits by this section if:]

"[(a) The individual was laid off from the employer prior to commencement of the labor dispute, did not work for the employer more than seven days during the 21 calendar days immediately prior to the commencement of the labor dispute and meets the requirements of subsection (3)(b)(A) of this section; or]

14 "[(b) During the labor dispute, the individual's job or position is filled by the employer hiring a 15 permanent replacement and the following conditions are met:]

"[(A) The individual subsequently unilaterally abandons the labor dispute and affirmatively seeks
 reemployment with the employer; and]

"[(B) The individual meets the requirements of subsection (3)(b)(A) of this section.]

19 "[(5) An individual who maintains membership in a labor union or who continues to pay labor 20 union dues does not violate the provisions of subsection (3)(b)(A) of this section, for the purpose of 21 subsection (4) of this section.]

"<u>SECTION 2.</u> Sections 3, 4 and 5 of this 2025 Act are added to and made a part of ORS
 chapter 657.

"<u>SECTION 3.</u> (1) Notwithstanding any conflicting provisions of this chapter, an individual
 who is qualified for benefits under ORS 657.200 (2)(b) shall receive benefits in accordance with
 this section and section 4 of this 2025 Act.

"(2) The amount of benefits that the individual receives shall constitute a debt owed to
the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund established under ORS 657.805.

29 "(3)(a) The amount of benefits shall accrue interest at the rate of 0.1346 percent per 30 week, or fraction of a week, until repaid in full.

"(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, if the amount of benefits received
is repaid in full within one year of being paid to the individual, the interest shall be abated.
The final payment made by the individual in accordance with this paragraph shall be reduced
by the amount of interest already paid.

35 "(4) The labor organization, if any, that represents an individual subject to this section 36 is responsible for remitting payment on behalf of the individual to the Employment Depart-37 ment for deposit in the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund.

38 "(5) Benefits subject to this section may not be charged to the account of the employer 39 of an individual who receives benefits in accordance with this section.

40 "<u>SECTION 4.</u> (1) Notwithstanding any conflicting provisions of this chapter, benefits shall 41 be paid in accordance with this section and section 3 of this 2025 Act to an individual who 42 is:

43 "(a) Qualified for benefits under ORS 657.200 (2)(b); and

44 "(b) Is a member of a labor organization that:

45 "(A) Maintains a strike fund;

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1 "(B) As of the date on which a strike begins, demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Di-2 rector of the Employment Department that the strike fund has sufficient financial reserves 3 to provide a weekly payment of \$836 to each individual who is a member of the labor organ-4 ization for a period of not less than four consecutive weeks during the period of the strike; 5 and

6 "(C) During the period of a strike, offers strike fund moneys to all represented employees 7 regardless of their participation in strike support activities.

8 "(2) Benefits shall be paid in accordance with this chapter beginning with the first week 9 that begins after payments to striking workers out of the labor organization's strike fund 10 have depleted the balance in the fund to an amount not greater than 10 percent of the 11 amount of financial reserves described in subsection (1)(b)(B) of this section.

"SECTION 5. (1) Benefits received by an employee of a school district or an education
 service district during a lockout shall count toward the employee's total compensation in the
 applicable collective bargaining agreement.

"(2) The district shall deduct from the employee's future wages the amount of the bene fits received.

17 "<u>SECTION 6.</u> ORS 657.010, as amended by section 28, chapter 75, Oregon Laws 2024, is 18 amended to read:

19 "657.010. As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

"(1) 'Base year' means the first four of the last five completed calendar quarters preceding thebenefit year.

22 "(2) 'Benefits' means the money allowances payable to unemployed persons under this chapter.

"(3) 'Benefit year' means a period of 52 consecutive weeks commencing with the first week with respect to which an individual files an initial valid claim for benefits, and thereafter the 52 consecutive weeks period beginning with the first week with respect to which the individual next files an initial valid claim after the termination of the individual's last preceding benefit year except that the benefit year shall be 53 weeks if the filing of an initial valid claim would result in overlapping any quarter of the base year of a previously filed initial valid claim.

"(4) 'Calendar quarter' means the period of three consecutive calendar months ending on March
31, June 30, September 30 or December 31, or the approximate equivalent thereof, as the Director
of the Employment Department may, by rule, prescribe.

"(5) 'Contribution' or 'contributions' means [the] taxes [that are the money payments required by
 this chapter, or voluntary payments permitted, to be made to the Unemployment Compensation Trust
 Fund].

35 "(6) 'Educational institution,' including an institution of higher education, means an institution: 36 "(a) In which participants, trainees or students are offered an organized course of study or 37 training designed to transfer to them knowledge, skills, information, doctrines, attitudes or abilities 38 from, by or under the guidance of an instructor or teacher;

39 "(b) That is accredited, registered, approved, licensed or issued a permit to operate as a school 40 by the Department of Education or other government agency, or that offers courses for credit that 41 are transferable to an approved, registered or accredited school;

42 "(c) In which the course or courses of study or training that it offers may be academic, techni-43 cal, trade or preparation for gainful employment in a recognized occupation; and

44 "(d) In which the course or courses of study or training are offered on a regular and continuing 45 basis. 1 "(7) 'Employment office' means a free public employment office or branch thereof, operated by 2 this state or maintained as a part of a state-controlled system of public employment offices.

3 "(8) 'Hospital' has the meaning given that term in ORS 442.015.

4 "(9) 'Institution of higher education' means an educational institution that:

5 "(a) Admits as regular students only individuals having a certificate of graduation from a high 6 school, or the recognized equivalent of such a certificate;

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"(b) Is legally authorized in this state to provide a program of education beyond high school;

8 "(c) Provides an educational program for which it awards a bachelor's or higher degree, or 9 provides a program that is acceptable for full credit toward such a degree, a program of post-10 graduate or post-doctoral studies, or a program of training to prepare students for gainful employ-11 ment in a recognized occupation; and

12 "(d) Is a public or other nonprofit institution.

"(10) 'Instructional capacity' does not include services performed as an instructional assistant
 as defined in ORS 342.120.

"(11) 'Internal Revenue Code' means the federal Internal Revenue Code, as amended and in effect on December 31, 2023.

"(12) 'Labor dispute' means any concerted or deliberate action by two or more individuals
or by an employing unit resulting in either a strike or lockout in which wages, hours,
working conditions or terms of employment of the individuals are involved.

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"(13) 'Labor organization' has the meaning given that term in ORS 663.005.

21 "(14) 'Lockout' means any refusal by an employer to permit employees to work as a re-22 sult of a dispute with the employees affecting wages, hours or other terms or conditions of 23 their employment.

"[(12)] (15) 'Nonprofit employing unit' means an organization, or group of organizations, described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code that is exempt from income tax under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

"[(13)] (16) 'State' includes, in addition to the states of the United States of America, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. However, for all purposes of this chapter the Virgin Islands shall be considered a state on and after the day on which the United States Secretary of Labor first approves the Virgin Islands' law under section 3304(a) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act as amended by Public Law 94-566.

"(17) 'Strike' means any concerted act of employees in a lawful refusal under applicable
 state or federal law to perform work or services for an employer.

34 "(18) 'Strike fund' means a fund maintained by a labor organization for the purpose of 35 providing financial assistance to individuals who are members of the labor organization and 36 who directly participate in a labor dispute or engage in other activities that support an on-37 going labor dispute.

38 "[(14)] (19) 'Taxes' means the money payments to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund 39 required, or voluntary payments permitted, by this chapter.

40 "[(15)] (20) 'Valid claim' means any claim for benefits made in accordance with ORS 657.260 if 41 the individual meets the wages-paid-for-employment requirements of ORS 657.150.

42 "[(16)] (21) 'Week' means any period of seven consecutive calendar days ending at midnight, as
43 the director may prescribe by rule.

The obligation to meet and 25negotiate does not compel either party to agree to a proposal or require the making of a concession. 26This subsection may not be construed to prohibit a public employer and a certified or recognized 27representative of its employees from discussing or executing written agreements regarding matters 28 other than mandatory subjects of bargaining that are not prohibited by law as long as there is mu-29tual agreement of the parties to discuss these matters, which are permissive subjects of bargaining. 30 (5) 'Compulsory arbitration' means the procedure whereby parties involved in a labor dispute

"(g) For all other employee bargaining except school district bargaining and except as provided 14 15in paragraph (f) of this subsection, 'employment relations' excludes staffing levels and safety issues 16 (except those staffing levels and safety issues that have a direct and substantial effect on the on-17the-job safety of public employees), scheduling of services provided to the public, determination of 18 the minimum qualifications necessary for any position, criteria for evaluation or performance ap-19 praisal, assignment of duties, workload when the effect on duties is insubstantial, reasonable dress, 20grooming, and at-work personal conduct requirements respecting smoking, gum chewing, and similar 21matters of personal conduct at work, and any other subject proposed that is permissive under par-22agraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this subsection.

23 "(8) 'Exclusive representative' means the labor organization that, as a result of certification by 24 the board or recognition by the employer, has the right to be the collective bargaining agent of all 25 employees in an appropriate bargaining unit.

26 "(9) 'Fact-finding' means identification of the major issues in a particular labor dispute by one 27 or more impartial individuals who review the positions of the parties, resolve factual differences and 28 make recommendations for settlement of the dispute.

The payment must be equivalent to regular union dues and assessments, if any, or must be an amount agreed upon by the public employer and the exclusive representative of the employees.

24 "(19) 'Public employee' means an employee of a public employer but does not include elected 25 officials, persons appointed to serve on boards or commissions, incarcerated persons working under 26 Article I, section 41, of the Oregon Constitution, or persons who are confidential employees, super-27 visory employees or managerial employees.

For purposes of this subsection, a 2 member of the Legislative Assembly is a member of the governing body of a public employer when 3 the collective bargaining negotiation or dispute is between the State of Oregon and a labor organ-4 ization. The Governor and other statewide elected officials are not considered members of a gov-5 erning body for purposes of this subsection. Nothing in this subsection may be interpreted or applied 6 in a manner that violates the right of free speech and assembly as protected by the Constitution of 7 the United States or the Constitution of the State of Oregon.

8 "(5) It is not an unfair labor practice or a violation of subsection (2)(a) of this section for the 9 exclusive representative of an appropriate bargaining unit to charge the following employees in the 10 unit reasonable fees and costs for representation that are unrelated to the negotiation of a collective 11 bargaining agreement, provided that the employees are not members of the labor organization that 12 is the exclusive representative and have not voluntarily entered into a fair-share agreement:
