3 537.175, 537.225, 537.227, 537.295, 537.297, 537.343, 537.409, 537.420, 537.445,  
4 537.470, 537.621, 537.622, 537.625, 537.628, 537.629, 540.520, 540.524, 540.537,  
5 540.560, 540.641, 543.255 and 543.765.”.

6 Delete lines 4 through 8 and insert:

8 **“UNIFORM PROCESS FOR CONTESTED CASES**  
9

10 **“SECTION 1. Sections 2 and 3 of this 2025 Act are added to and**  
11 **made a part of ORS chapter 536.**

12 **“SECTION 2. (1) As used in this section and section 3 of this 2025**  
13 **Act, ‘contested case’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 183.310.**

14 **“(2) This section and section 3 of this 2025 Act and rules adopted**  
15 **thereunder apply to:**

16 **“(a) A contested case proceeding under a provision of ORS chapter**  
17 **537 or 540 that references this section.**

18 **“(b) A contested case proceeding on an application related to the**  
19 **use of water under a provision of ORS chapter 537, 540 or 541 in which**  
20 **the contested case proceeding is provided for in rule or order and the**  
21 **rule or order refers to this section.**

1       **“(3) The Water Resources Commission and the Office of Adminis-**  
2 **trative Hearings shall establish a uniform process for hearing con-**  
3 **tested cases that is consistent with this section and with ORS chapter**  
4 **183. The contested case proceeding must be conducted in accordance**  
5 **with applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183 that govern contested**  
6 **cases, except as otherwise provided in this section and section 3 of this**  
7 **2025 Act and administrative rules adopted under this section and sec-**  
8 **tion 3 of this 2025 Act, or as specified in ORS chapters 537, 540 and 541.**

9       **“(4) The Water Resources Department, in consultation with the**  
10 **Office of Administrative Hearings, shall establish one or more default**  
11 **hearing schedules that govern contested case hearings and provide**  
12 **that the process, from a referral for a hearing to a completion of the**  
13 **hearing, must be completed in not more than 180 days, except as pro-**  
14 **vided in subsection (5) of this section. The default schedule must in-**  
15 **clude deadlines for discovery requests and responses and motions to**  
16 **compel discovery and may include other deadlines.**

17       **“(5) The Office of Administrative Hearings may allow an extension**  
18 **of the hearing schedule only under the following circumstances:**

19       **“(a) The department, after consulting with the parties, requests a**  
20 **different schedule for a particular contested case;**

21       **“(b) The chief administrative law judge, upon referral, determines**  
22 **that adhering to the default schedule is not feasible in a particular**  
23 **contested case; or**

24       **“(c) The administrative law judge assigned to the case determines**  
25 **that modifying the default schedule for a particular contested case**  
26 **serves the public interest, is necessary to provide due process or is in**  
27 **the interest of justice.**

28       **“(6) An administrative law judge shall, to the greatest extent prac-**  
29 **ticable, give preference to testimony being provided orally rather than**  
30 **in writing.**

1       **“(7) The administrative law judge shall determine the venue for**  
2 **conducting the hearing, subject to the approval of the Water Re-**  
3 **sources Department, and shall give preference to conducting a hearing**  
4 **by a remote method.**

5       **“(8) The department, after consultation with the parties, may re-**  
6 **quest that the Office of Administrative Hearings authorize the as-**  
7 **signment of a settlement administrative law judge. If the office assigns**  
8 **a settlement administrative law judge to a case, the parties have 60**  
9 **days after the date of the referral to reach a settlement of the case**  
10 **before continuing to a hearing. If the department refers the case for**  
11 **review with a settlement administrative law judge and the case does**  
12 **not resolve within 60 days after the date of the referral, the case pro-**  
13 **ceeds to a contested case hearing and the contested case hearing must**  
14 **be completed within 180 days after the end of the 60-day period, except**  
15 **as provided in subsection (5) of this section.**

16       **“(9) The commission shall establish standard timelines for the de-**  
17 **partment to rule on a request for party status.**

18       **“(10) The commission may adopt rules necessary to implement this**  
19 **section.**

20       **“SECTION 3. (1) To initiate a contested case proceeding that is**  
21 **subject to this section and section 2 of this 2025 Act:**

22       **“(a) Any person may submit a protest against a proposed final or-**  
23 **der.**

24       **“(b) Unless a timeline is otherwise specified under ORS chapter 537,**  
25 **540 or 541, the protest must be submitted within 45 days after publi-**  
26 **cation of the notice of the proposed final order in a weekly public no-**  
27 **tice of the Water Resources Department or, if weekly public notice is**  
28 **not required, within 45 days after issuance of notice of the proposed**  
29 **final order.**

30       **“(c) The protest must:**

1       **“(A) Be in writing;**

2       **“(B) Include the name, address and telephone number of the**  
3 **protestant;**

4       **“(C) Include a description of the protestant’s interest in the pro-**  
5 **posed final order and, if the protestant claims to represent the public**  
6 **interest, a precise statement of the public interest represented;**

7       **“(D) Include a detailed description of how the action proposed in the**  
8 **proposed final order would impair or be detrimental to the protestant’s**  
9 **interest;**

10       **“(E) Raise an issue with sufficient specificity to allow response to**  
11 **the issue, as described in subsection (3)(b) of this section;**

12       **“(F) Identify any citation of legal authority supporting the protest,**  
13 **if known; and**

14       **“(G) Include the protest fee required under ORS 536.050.**

15       **“(2) If a protest is submitted as described in subsection (5) of this**  
16 **section, within 30 days after the deadline for filing a protest:**

17       **“(a) Any person who supports the proposed final order may file a**  
18 **request for party status for the purpose of participating in any con-**  
19 **tested case proceeding on the proposed final order or for judicial re-**  
20 **view of a final order resulting from the proposed final order.**

21       **“(b) The request for party status must:**

22       **“(A) Be in writing.**

23       **“(B) Meet all requirements established in rule by the Water Re-**  
24 **sources Commission.**

25       **“(C) Include the fees described in ORS 536.050 (1)(n) and (o).**

26       **“(3) In a contested case proceeding under this section:**

27       **“(a) A hearing need not occur if:**

28       **“(A) All issues in the contested case are resolved as part of a**  
29 **settlement;**

30       **“(B) The protest is withdrawn; or**

1       **“(C) The protestant defaults.**

2       **“(b) A protest must raise an issue with sufficient specificity to allow**  
3 **response to the issue. To raise an issue with sufficient specificity, the**  
4 **protest must:**

5       **“(A) Identify the recommended findings of fact, conclusions of law**  
6 **or conditions of approval to which the protestant objects; and**

7       **“(B) Explain how the issues raised in the protest are within the**  
8 **jurisdiction of the department.**

9       **“(c) Not later than the end of the protest period, each person that**  
10 **submits a protest shall raise all reasonably ascertainable issues and**  
11 **submit all reasonably available arguments that support the person’s**  
12 **position.**

13       **“(d) A failure to raise a reasonably ascertainable issue in a protest**  
14 **or a failure to provide sufficient specificity to afford the department**  
15 **an opportunity to respond to the issue precludes judicial review of that**  
16 **issue.**

17       **“(4) If no protest on a proposed final order that is subject to this**  
18 **section and section 2 of this 2025 Act is timely received, as a matter**  
19 **of law, the proposed final order shall become a final order on the date**  
20 **that is 33 days after the close of the time period for submitting a**  
21 **protest, with no further action required by the department.**

22       **“(5) Notwithstanding subsection (4) of this section, not more than**  
23 **33 days after the close of the time period for submitting a protest, the**  
24 **department may withdraw a proposed final order for reconsideration**  
25 **and issuance of a superseding proposed final order.**

26       **“(6) The department shall refund the fees described in ORS 536.050**  
27 **(1)(o) if party status is denied.**

28       **“(7) The Water Resources Commission may adopt rules necessary**  
29 **to implement this section.**

30



1 utilized, and the uses to which the power is to be applied.

2 “(d) If for construction of a reservoir, the application shall give the  
3 height of dam, the capacity of the reservoir, and the uses to be made of the  
4 impounded waters.

5 “(e) If for municipal water supply, the application shall give the present  
6 population to be served, and, as near as may be, the future requirements of  
7 the city.

8 “(f) If for mining purposes, the application shall give the nature of the  
9 mines to be served, and the methods of supplying and utilizing the water.

10 “(2) Any person who has applied to the Federal Energy Regulatory Com-  
11 mission for a preliminary permit or an exemption from licensing shall, at the  
12 same time, apply to the Water Resources Department for a permit to appro-  
13 priate water for a hydroelectric project. An applicant for a permit to appro-  
14 priate water for a new hydroelectric project shall submit to the department  
15 a complete copy of any application for the project filed with the Federal  
16 Energy Regulatory Commission or other federal agency. If the copy of the  
17 federal application is filed with the department at the same time it is filed  
18 with the federal agency, at the department’s discretion such copy may fulfill  
19 the requirements for an application under subsection (1) of this section.

20 “(3) Each application shall be accompanied by any map or drawing and  
21 all other data concerning the proposed project and the applicant’s ability and  
22 intention to construct the project, as may be prescribed by the Water Re-  
23 sources Commission. The accompanying data shall be considered a part of  
24 the application.

25 “(4) The map or drawing required to accompany the application shall be  
26 of sufficient quality and scale to establish the location of the proposed point  
27 of diversion and the proposed place of use identified by tax lot, township,  
28 range, section and nearest quarter-quarter section along with a notation of  
29 the acreage of the proposed place of use, if appropriate. In addition, the de-  
30 partment shall accept locational coordinate information, including latitude

1 and longitude as established by a global positioning system. If the applica-  
2 tion is for a water right for a municipal use, the map need not identify the  
3 proposed place of use by tax lot.

4 “(5) Each application for a permit to appropriate water shall be accom-  
5 panied by the examination fee set forth in ORS 536.050 (1).

6 “(6) If the proposed use of the water is for operation of a mining operation  
7 as defined in ORS 517.952, the applicant shall provide the information re-  
8 quired under this section as part of the consolidated application under ORS  
9 517.952 to 517.989.

10 “[7] *Notwithstanding any provision of ORS chapter 183, an application for*  
11 *a permit to appropriate water shall be processed in the manner set forth in*  
12 *ORS 537.120 to 537.360. Nothing in ORS chapter 183 shall be construed to*  
13 *allow additional persons to participate in the process. To the extent that any*  
14 *provision in ORS chapter 183 conflicts with a provision set forth in ORS*  
15 *537.120 to 537.360, the provisions in ORS 537.120 to 537.360 shall control.]*

16 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 537.153 is amended to read:

17 “537.153. (1) Within 60 days after the Water Resources Department pro-  
18 ceeds with the application under ORS 537.150 (5), the department shall com-  
19 plete application review and issue a proposed final order approving or  
20 denying the application or approving the application with modifications or  
21 conditions. The department may request the applicant to provide additional  
22 information needed to complete the review. If the department requests addi-  
23 tional information, the request shall be specific and shall be sent to the ap-  
24 plicant by registered mail. The department shall specify a date by which the  
25 information must be returned, which shall be not less than 10 days after the  
26 department mails the request to the applicant. If the department does not  
27 receive the information or a request for a time extension under ORS 537.175  
28 by the date specified in the request, the department may reject the applica-  
29 tion and may refund fees in accordance with ORS 536.050 (4)(a). The time  
30 period specified by the department in a request for additional information



1 shall allow the department to comply with the 60-day time limit established  
2 by this subsection.

3 “(2) In reviewing the application under subsection (1) of this section, the  
4 department shall presume that a proposed use will not impair or be detri-  
5 mental to the public interest if the proposed use is allowed in the applicable  
6 basin program established pursuant to ORS 536.300 and 536.340 or given a  
7 preference under ORS 536.310 (12), if water is available, if the proposed use  
8 will not injure other water rights and if the proposed use complies with rules  
9 of the Water Resources Commission. This shall be a rebuttable presumption  
10 and may be overcome by a preponderance of evidence that either:

11 “(a) One or more of the criteria for establishing the presumption are not  
12 satisfied; or

13 “(b) The proposed use will impair or be detrimental to the public interest  
14 as demonstrated in comments, in a protest under [*subsection (6) of this*] sec-  
15 tion **3 of this 2025 Act** or in a finding of the department that shows:

16 “(A) The specific public interest under ORS 537.170 [(8)] **(5)** that would  
17 be impaired or detrimentally affected; and

18 “(B) Specifically how the identified public interest would be impaired or  
19 detrimentally affected.

20 “(3) The proposed final order shall cite findings of fact and conclusions  
21 of law and shall include but need not be limited to:

22 “(a) Confirmation or modification of the preliminary determinations made  
23 in the initial review;

24 “(b) A brief statement that explains the criteria considered relevant to the  
25 decision, including the applicable basin program and the compatibility of the  
26 proposed use with applicable land use plans;

27 “(c) An assessment of water availability and the amount of water neces-  
28 sary for the proposed use;

29 “(d) An assessment of whether the proposed use would result in injury to  
30 existing water rights;

1 “(e) An assessment of whether the proposed use would impair or be det-  
2 rimental to the public interest as provided in ORS 537.170;

3 “(f) A draft permit, including any proposed conditions, or a recommen-  
4 dation to deny the application;

5 “(g) Whether the rebuttable presumption that the proposed use will not  
6 impair or be detrimental to the public interest has been established; and

7 “(h) The date by which protests to the proposed final order must be re-  
8 ceived by the department.

9 “(4) The department shall mail copies of the proposed final order to the  
10 applicant and to persons who have requested copies and paid the fee required  
11 under ORS 536.050 (1)(p). The department also shall publish notice of the  
12 proposed final order by publication in the weekly notice published by the  
13 department.

14 “[5] *Any person who supports a proposed final order may request standing*  
15 *for purposes of participating in any contested case proceeding on the proposed*  
16 *final order or for judicial review of a final order. A request for standing shall*  
17 *be in writing and shall be accompanied by the fee established under ORS*  
18 *536.050 (1)(n).]*

19 “[6] *Any person may submit a protest against a proposed final order. A*  
20 *protest shall be in writing and shall include:]*

21 “[a] *The name, address and telephone number of the protestant;]*

22 “[b] *A description of the protestant’s interest in the proposed final order*  
23 *and, if the protestant claims to represent the public interest, a precise statement*  
24 *of the public interest represented;]*

25 “[c] *A detailed description of how the action proposed in the proposed final*  
26 *order would impair or be detrimental to the protestant’s interest;]*

27 “[d] *A detailed description of how the proposed final order is in error or*  
28 *deficient and how to correct the alleged error or deficiency;]*

29 “[e] *Any citation of legal authority supporting the protest, if known; and]*

30 “[f] *The protest fee required under ORS 536.050.]*

1        “[7] *Requests for standing and protests on the proposed final order shall*  
2 *be submitted within 45 days after publication of the notice of the proposed final*  
3 *order in the weekly notice published by the department. Any person who asks*  
4 *to receive a copy of the department’s final order shall submit to the department*  
5 *the fee required under ORS 536.050 (1)(p), unless the person has previously*  
6 *requested copies and paid the required fee under ORS 537.150 (7), the person*  
7 *is a protestant and has paid the fee required under ORS 536.050 (1)(j) or the*  
8 *person has standing and has paid the fee under ORS 536.050 (1)(n).]*

9        **“(5) A person who asks to receive a copy of the department’s final**  
10 **order shall submit to the department the fee required under ORS**  
11 **536.050 (1)(p), unless the person has previously requested copies and**  
12 **has paid the fee required under ORS 537.150 (7), the person is a**  
13 **protestant and has paid the fee required under ORS 536.050 (1)(j) or the**  
14 **person has party status and has paid the fees required under ORS**  
15 **536.050 (1)(n) and (o).**

16        **“(6) The provisions of sections 2 and 3 of this 2025 Act, and rules**  
17 **adopted thereunder, apply to a contested case proceeding on a pro-**  
18 **posed final order issued under this section.**

19        “[8] (7) Within 60 days after the close of the period for receiving pro-  
20 tests, **if a protest was timely submitted**, the Water Resources Director  
21 shall:

22        “(a) Issue a final order as provided under ORS 537.170 [(6); or] **(1) or (2),**  
23 **if the applicant has not filed a protest and the director finds that there**  
24 **are no significant issues related to the proposed use of water;**

25        “(b) Schedule a contested case hearing if a protest has been submitted;  
26 **or [and if:]**

27        **“(c) Provide any person who timely submitted a protest or request**  
28 **for party status with an estimate of the timing of referring the con-**  
29 **tested case to the Office of Administrative Hearings for a hearing and**  
30 **notice that parties may provide settlement proposals.**

1        “[A] Upon review of the issues, the director finds that there are significant  
2        disputes related to the proposed use of water; or]

3        “[B] Within 30 days after the close of the period for submitting protests,  
4        the applicant requests a contested case hearing.]

5        **“SECTION 6.** ORS 537.170 is amended to read:

6        “537.170. [(1) Within 45 days after the Water Resources Director schedules  
7        a contested case hearing under ORS 537.153 (8), the Water Resources Depart-  
8        ment shall hold the contested case hearing. The issues to be considered in the  
9        contested case hearing shall be limited to issues identified by the administra-  
10        tive law judge.]

11       “[2] Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS chapter 183 pertaining to  
12       contested case proceedings, the parties to any contested case hearing initiated  
13       under this section shall be limited to:]

14       “[a] The applicant;]

15       “[b] Any person who timely filed a protest; and]

16       “[c] Any person who timely filed a request for standing under ORS 537.153  
17       (5) and who requests to intervene in the contested case hearing prior to the  
18       start of the proceeding.]

19       “[3] The contested case proceeding shall be conducted in accordance with  
20       the applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183 except:]

21       “[a] As provided in subsections (1) and (2) of this section; and]

22       “[b] An interlocutory appeal under ORS 183.480 (3) shall not be allowed.]

23       “[4] If applicable, an application to appropriate water for the generation  
24       of electricity submitted under ORS 537.140 shall be included in the consol-  
25       idated review and hearings process under ORS 543.255.]

26       “[5] Each person submitting a protest or a request for standing shall raise  
27       all reasonably ascertainable issues and submit all reasonably available argu-  
28       ments supporting the person’s position by the close of the protest period. Fail-  
29       ure to raise a reasonably ascertainable issue in a protest or in a hearing or  
30       failure to provide sufficient specificity to afford the Water Resources Depart-

1 *ment an opportunity to respond to the issue precludes judicial review based*  
2 *on that issue.]*

3 “**[(6)] (1) If a protest of a proposed final order issued under ORS**  
4 **537.153 is filed under section 3 of this 2025 Act and**, after the contested  
5 case hearing or, if a hearing is not held, after the close of the period allowed  
6 to file a protest, the **Water Resources** Director determines that the pro-  
7 posed use does not comply with the standards set forth in ORS 543.017 or  
8 rules adopted by the Water Resources Commission under ORS 543.017 or  
9 would otherwise impair or be detrimental to the public interest, the director  
10 shall issue a final order rejecting the application or modifying the proposed  
11 final order to conform to the public interest.

12 “**(2) If a protest of a proposed final order issued under ORS 537.153**  
13 **is filed under section 3 of this 2025 Act and**, after the contested case  
14 hearing or, if a hearing is not held, after the close of the period allowed to  
15 file a protest, the director determines that the proposed use would not impair  
16 or be detrimental to the public interest, the director shall issue a final order  
17 approving the application or otherwise modifying the proposed final order.

18 “**(3)** A final order may set forth any of the provisions or restrictions to  
19 be included in the permit concerning the use, control and management of the  
20 water to be appropriated for the project, including, but not limited to, a  
21 specification of reservoir operation and minimum releases to protect the  
22 public interest.

23 “**(4) An interlocutory appeal under ORS 183.480 (3) is not allowed in**  
24 **a contested case proceeding under this section.**

25 “[**(7)** *If a contested case hearing is not held:*]

26 “[*(a) Where the final order modifies the proposed final order, the applicant*  
27 *may request and the department shall schedule a contested case hearing as*  
28 *provided under subsection (3) of this section by submitting the information*  
29 *required for a protest under ORS 537.153 (6) within 14 days after the director*  
30 *issues the final order. However, the issues on which a contested case hearing*

1 *may be requested and conducted under this paragraph shall be limited to is-*  
2 *ssues based on the modifications to the proposed final order.]*

3 *“(b) Only the applicant or a protestant may appeal the provisions of the*  
4 *final order in the manner established in ORS chapter 183 for appeal of order*  
5 *other than contested cases.]*

6 **“(5) If a contested case hearing is not held under ORS 537.153 (7)(a)**  
7 **where the final order modifies the proposed final order, the applicant,**  
8 **a person granted party status or a protestant may submit a protest**  
9 **under section 2 or 3 of this 2025 Act within 14 days after the director**  
10 **issues the final order, except that the issues on which a contested case**  
11 **hearing may be requested and conducted under this subsection are**  
12 **limited to issues based on the modifications to the proposed final or-**  
13 **der. The department must hold a hearing if the protestant is an ap-**  
14 **plicant.**

15 **“(6) If a protest of a proposed final order issued under ORS 537.153**  
16 **is filed under section 3 of this 2025 Act by a person other than the**  
17 **applicant and, as described in ORS 537.153 (7)(a), the director issues a**  
18 **final order without holding a contested case hearing, a protestant may**  
19 **appeal the provisions of the final order in the manner established in**  
20 **ORS chapter 183 for appeal of orders in other than contested cases.**

21 *“[(8)] (7) If the presumption of public interest under ORS 537.153 (2) is*  
22 *overcome, then before issuing a final order, the director or the commission,*  
23 *if applicable, shall make the final determination of whether the proposed use*  
24 *or the proposed use as modified in the proposed final order would impair or*  
25 *be detrimental to the public interest by considering:*

26 *“(a) Conserving the highest use of the water for all purposes, including*  
27 *irrigation, domestic use, municipal water supply, power development, public*  
28 *recreation, protection of commercial and game fishing and wildlife, fire pro-*  
29 *tection, mining, industrial purposes, navigation, scenic attraction or any*  
30 *other beneficial use to which the water may be applied for which it may have*

1 a special value to the public.

2 “(b) The maximum economic development of the waters involved.

3 “(c) The control of the waters of this state for all beneficial purposes,  
4 including drainage, sanitation and flood control.

5 “(d) The amount of waters available for appropriation for beneficial use.

6 “(e) The prevention of wasteful, uneconomic, impracticable or unreason-  
7 able use of the waters involved.

8 “(f) All vested and inchoate rights to the waters of this state or to the  
9 use of the waters of this state, and the means necessary to protect such  
10 rights.

11 “(g) The state water resources policy formulated under ORS 536.295 to  
12 536.350 and 537.505 to 537.534.

13 “[9] (8) Upon issuing a final order, the director shall notify the appli-  
14 cant and each person who submitted written comments or protests or other-  
15 wise requested notice of the final order and send a copy of the final order  
16 to any person who requested a copy and paid the fee required under ORS  
17 536.050 (1)(p).

18 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 537.175 is amended to read:

19 “537.175. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, the Wa-  
20 ter Resources Department shall issue a final order or schedule a contested  
21 case hearing on an application for a water right referred to in ORS 537.140  
22 or 537.400 within 180 days after the department proceeds with the application  
23 under ORS 537.150 (5).

24 “(2) At the request of the applicant, the department may extend the  
25 180-day period set forth in subsection (1) of this section for a reasonable  
26 period of time.

27 “[3] *If a contested case hearing is held, the department shall issue a final*  
28 *order:]*

29 “[a] *Within 270 days after scheduling the hearing for a contested case*  
30 *proceeding that involves three or more parties not including the department;*

1 *and]*

2 “[(b) *Within 180 days after scheduling the hearing for all other contested*  
3 *case proceedings.*]

4 “[(4)] (3) If the applicant does not request an extension under subsection  
5 (2) of this section and the department fails to issue a proposed final order  
6 or schedule a contested case hearing on an application for a water right  
7 within 180 days after the department proceeds with the application under  
8 ORS 537.150 (5), the applicant may apply in the Circuit Court for Marion  
9 County for a writ of mandamus to compel the department to issue a final  
10 order or schedule a contested case hearing on an application for a water  
11 right. If the application is for an out-of-stream use, the writ of mandamus  
12 shall compel the department to issue a water right permit, unless the de-  
13 partment shows by affidavit that to issue a permit may result in harm to an  
14 existing water right holder.

28 “537.622. [*(1) Within 45 days after the Water Resources Director schedules*  
29 *a contested case hearing under ORS 537.621 (9), the Water Resources Depart-*  
30 *ment shall hold the contested case hearing. The issues to be considered in the*

1 *contested case hearing shall be limited to issues identified by the administra-*  
2 *tive law judge.]*

3 “[(2) *Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS chapter 183 pertaining to*  
4 *contested case proceedings, the parties to any contested case hearing initiated*  
5 *under this section shall be limited to:]*

6 “[*(a) The applicant;*]

7 “[*(b) Any person who timely filed a protest; and]*

8 “[*(c) Any person who timely filed a request for standing under ORS 537.621*  
9 *(6) and who requests to intervene in the contested case hearing prior to the*  
10 *start of the proceeding.]*

11 “[*(3) The]* **A contested case proceeding under ORS 537.621 (8)** [*proceed-*  
12 *ing]* shall be conducted in accordance with the applicable provisions of ORS  
13 chapter 183 **and sections 2 and 3 of this 2025 Act**, except[:]

14 “[*(a) As provided in subsections (1) and (2) of this section; and]*

15 “[*(b)]* **that** an interlocutory appeal under ORS 183.480 (3) [*shall not be]*  
16 **is not** allowed.

17 “[*(4) Each person submitting a protest or a request for standing shall raise*  
18 *all reasonably ascertainable issues and submit all reasonably available argu-*  
19 *ments supporting the person’s position by the close of the protest period. Fail-*  
20 *ure to raise a reasonably ascertainable issue in a protest or in a hearing or*  
21 *failure to provide sufficient specificity to afford the Water Resources Depart-*

16 tificate.  
17 “(f) For a blueprint copy of any map or drawing, the actual cost of the  
18 work.  
19 “(g) For a computer-generated map, the actual cost of the work.  
20 “(h) For examining an application for approval of a change to an existing  
21 water right or permit:  
22 “(A) A base fee of \$1,360 for a change to a single water right or permit;  
23 “(B) \$1,090 for each additional type of change requested;  
24 “(C) For a request for a change in place of use or type of use or for a  
25 water exchange under ORS 540.533, \$410 for each second-foot or fraction  
26 thereof requested beyond the first second-foot;  
27 “(D) \$610 for each additional water right or permit included in the ap-  
28 plication;  
29 “(E) An additional fee of \$480 per application, if the application is for an  
30 additional point of appropriation, a change in a point of appropriation or a

5 “(p) Except for an applicant, for obtaining a copy of both a proposed final  
6 order and a final order for a water right application under ORS 537.140 to  
7 537.252, 537.505 to 537.795 or 543A.005 to 543A.300 or an extension issued  
8 under ORS 537.230, 537.248 or 537.630, \$35.

9 “(q) For examining an application to store water under ORS 537.409:

10 “(A) A base fee of \$480; and

11 “(B) \$41 for each acre-foot or fraction thereof.

12 “(r) For submitting a notice of intent under ORS 543A.030 or 543A.075,  
13 the amount established by the Water Resources Director under ORS  
14 543A.410.

15 “(s) For examining an application for a substitution made under ORS  
16 540.524:

17 “(A) A base fee of \$990 for the first well substitution; and

18 “(B) A fee of \$480 for each additional well substitution.

19 “(t) For examining an application for an allocation of conserved water  
20 under ORS 537.455 to 537.500:

21 “(A) A base fee of \$1,360 for the first water right that is part of the al-  
22 location; and

23 “(B) An additional fee of \$480 for each water right that is part of the  
24 allocation beyond the first water right.

25 “(u) For submitting a water management and conservation plan pursuant  
26 to rules of the commission:

27 “(A) \$680, if the plan is submitted by an agricultural water supplier;

27 “(17) If a certificate under this section is issued, the certificate holder  
28 must pay fees consistent with the fees described in ORS 543.078. Failure to  
29 pay a required fee invalidates a certificate issued under this section.

30 “(18) The Water Resources Department shall issue invoices for fees re-

1 quired under this section, and the state shall have a preference lien for de-  
2 linquent fees, as provided in ORS 543.082.

3 “(19) An applicant for a certificate issued under this section must provide  
4 evidence of a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission exemption or approval  
5 under a similar process by the federal agency responsible for authorizing the  
6 project before a certificate can be issued, if applicable.

7 “(20) Nothing in this section shall alter the preference of municipalities  
8 in ORS 543.260 (3) and 543.270.
