Dear Co-chair Helm, Co-chair Owens and members of the committee,

I write today to ask you to support Oregon's rocky coastal habitats and eelgrass meadows. Specifically, I ask for your enthusiastic support on HB 3580 and HB 3587.

These bills are an opportunity to support biodiversity, coastal economies, and Oregon's resilience in the face of a changing climate.

I live on the North Coast. I don't live here by chance; I am of the coastal margin. Proximity to the ocean is a backbone of my quality of life. **The ability of coastal communities—my community—to weather economic and climate shifts is** *literally* **my life, and my neighbors' lives, and our mutual prosperity.**

I care deeply about the human and non-human inhabitants of our coastal landscapes. I think you do too. I hope you'll see that **HB 3580 and HB 3587 give our state a chance to make that care tangible**.

Just a few specific reasons we should protect and conserve eelgrass meadows and rocky habitats:

- Eelgrass meadows shelter juvenile fish. They directly sustain our fisheries.
- Eelgrass meadows cushion the impact of storm surges on human coastal communities.
- Eelgrass meadows sequester carbon at astonishing rates. They're part of a natural solution to increasing atmospheric CO2.
- Rocky habitats are iconic Oregon. Their beauty, and the wonder they inspire, brings the tourists, who directly support coastal communities' livelihoods.
- Rocky habitats also directly support the fish species that sustain our fisheries.

So maybe you're asking yourself what the *problem* is. Why do we need to spend money on these habitats; aren't they just...there?

No: in fact, eelgrass is disappearing around the world, and we're seeing signs of that on Oregon's south coast, too. No: because of threats from increasing pollution and warming seas, **these habitats won't continue to thrive without human help.**

That's why I need you to support these two bills. The sums of money we're asking you to allocate are modest. Please prioritize the thriving of coastal people, coastal habitats, and coastal economies—all three of which are unseparably intertwined.
