Dear Chair Golden, Vice Chair Nash, and Members of the Committee,

I support Senate Bill 1153 to safeguard fish habitat and water quality in water right transfers. Water rights go first to the first users. People came way after fish, and the laws they brought and wrote are biased to favor short term human needs at the expense of fish and all of the natural world. That is simply not the way to "manage" earth's finite resources.

The water in our streams is our state's lifeblood. It grows our salmon and our food, and it fuels our families. It ties us to our neighbors upstream and downstream. It belongs to all of us.

Yet for far too long, an outdated loophole has allowed the Oregon Water Resources Department to approve applications for water right transfers without adequate consideration of whether the change will harm our streams. Lower water levels in a stream can hurt fish, impair water quality, and decrease scenic and recreation values.

Senate Bill 1153 safeguards our streams—and the fish habitat, water quality, and cultural values they support—by ensuring the state doesn't grant permission for voluntary water right changes that further harm fish habitat and water quality. This fix closes a dangerous loophole and brings modern environmental values into Oregon's outdated water right transfer review process.

I urge your support of SB 1153 and the life-sustaining streams it will safeguard.
