**RE: Opposition to SB 460** 

Chair Taylor, Vice-Chair Bonham, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in opposition of SB 460. My name is Robert Camarillo, and I am the Executive Secretary of the Oregon State Building and Construction Trades Council.

We are a state-wide umbrella organization comprised of 31 affiliate member Unions with 6 Regional Local Councils, representing tens of thousands of skilled trades journey level workers and registered apprentices across the state.

Our member Unions are leaders in the nation - establishing gold-standard apprenticeship programs and while it is not required, we still work in partnership with several pre-apprenticeship programs across the state to help prepare individuals for registered apprenticeship.

Construction is one of the most dangerous and physically demanding industries; workers are often exposed to extreme conditions and that is why we will oppose any proposal that lowers worker safety standards and exempts a workforce from prevailing wage requirements on public works projects. Having our public buildings and infrastructure built by untrained and unsafe workers is a danger to our communities and our industry across the country.

Exempting pre-apprentices from prevailing wage laws means any contractor could classify any of their workers as pre-apprentices, creating a pool of workers to be exploited. That is unsafe and is not a good policy.

Prevailing Wage laws are not obstacles to placement in registered pre-apprenticeships or to placement in state registered apprenticeship programs. Pre-apprentices do not normally work on job sites. Pre-apprenticeship programs are designed to provide training and prepare pre-apprentices to enter a registered apprenticeship program. Senate Bill 460 does nothing to ensure placement in a Union apprenticeship program.

There is no shortage of skilled trades workers in Oregon. In fact, <u>the Oregon</u> <u>Employment Department's latest data</u> shows that over 2,000 construction jobs were lost in Oregon in the month of February.

As we see an increase in the need for our infrastructure to be rebuilt across our state, it has never been more important that we maintain high standards in both prevailing wages and laws - and why the Building Trades Unions strongly disagree with exempting Prevailing Wages from any workforce that is engaged in the building and construction of public works projects. Having safe buildings and infrastructure is vital to our state and communities.

We respectfully urge you to oppose Senate Bill 460. Thank you for your time and consideration.
