Instead of fixing inefficiencies, cutting unnecessary spending, or auditing current budgets, Governor Kotek is asking Oregonians to write the largest blank check in state history.

Oregon can address transportation funding without taxing people out of their homes and cars:

- Redirect underused or mismanaged funds within existing state budgets.
- Prioritize essential road and bridge projects over costly experimental programs.
- Increase transparency and accountability at ODOT before demanding billions more from taxpayers.

Conclusion

Oregonians deserve solutions that are fair, affordable, and fiscally responsible. House Bill 2025 is none of these. It punishes working families for the state's failure to manage its resources and should be rejected.

I urge the committee to oppose House Bill 2025 and work toward responsible, balanced alternatives that protect both Oregon's infrastructure and its people.
