Measure, Appointment or Topic: HB3075

As a concerned Oregonian, 07 FFL Manufacture holder I oppose HB 3075 because it lacks a fiscal impact statement, leaving taxpayers and FFL's in the dark on what it will cost and the financial burden it will have on our business. This bill amending the firearm permit fee's from measure 114 doubles fee's and unconstitutionally extends processing time from 30 to 60 days, placing yet another burden on law-abiding citizens and puts an even high demand on the understaffed State Police NICS center.

Without a clear and transparent fiscal analysis no one has any idea of the cost to the consumer, FFL's, price tag for expanded bureaucracy higher administrative costs. more staff time and no evidence these changes will enhance safety.

Responsible legislation warrants transparency, yet HB3075 pushes forward without proving it won't put more strain on public funds. We need to avoid any unaccountable spending that does nothing for public safety but instead takes away more rights of law-abiding citizens, FFL holders and sporting goods stores.
