

HB 4114 A -A9, -A10 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

The measure creates a cause of action against any person who enters property, under color of law, without a judicial warrant or a judicially recognized exception to the warrant requirement. The measure declares an emergency, effective on its passage.

HOUSE VOTE: Ayes, 36; Nays, 4

FISCAL IMPACT: Has minimal fiscal impact

REVENUE IMPACT: Has no revenue impact

Detailed Summary:

Defines “property.” Allows an owner or occupant of or a person lawfully present on a property to sue another person who enters the property, under color of law, without a judicial warrant or a judicially recognized exception to the warrant requirement. Allows a successful plaintiff to recover economic and non-economic damages, equitable relief, and any other appropriate relief. Requires the court to award attorney fees to a prevailing plaintiff. Prohibits action against a person subject to suit under 42 U.S.C. 1983. Requires the action to be brought within two years of the cause of action accruing.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Interaction with Oregon’s sanctuary law
- Limitation of cooperation with the federal government to felonies and class A misdemeanors
- Messaging to the federal government

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

-A9 The amendment adds a requirement that all law enforcement agencies in Oregon must cooperate with federal law enforcement regarding actions concerning any person convicted of a crime constituting a felony under Oregon law.

-A10 The amendment replaces the measure with a requirement that all law enforcement agencies in Oregon must cooperate with federal law enforcement regarding actions concerning any person convicted of a crime constituting a felony under Oregon law.

BACKGROUND:

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement has increased immigration enforcement operations nationwide since 2025. In response to warrantless arrests executed by immigration authorities in Oregon, Innovation Law Lab filed a proposed class-action lawsuit against the federal government, arguing that the warrantless arrests violated U.S. laws. On February 4, 2026, [a U.S. District Court judge](#) enjoined immigration agents in Oregon from arresting people without a warrant unless they are likely to escape. The federal case is ongoing, and similar cases have been filed in other states.
