WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

The measure designates March 4 of each year as HPV Awareness Day. It declares an emergency, effective on its passage.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- The impact of human papillomavirus (HPV) and its related cancers
- Raising awareness

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

HPV is the most common sexually transmitted infection and a leading cause of several preventable cancers, including cervical, vaginal, vulvar, anal, and penile cancers. Many people who become infected with HPV are asymptomatic and do not know they have it. Many Oregonians remain unaware of when vaccinations or screenings are recommended, and increasing public understanding of these guidelines is essential to improving early detection and prevention.

The measure encourages the Oregon Health Authority to recognize HPV Awareness Day each year through voluntary public education and outreach activities. It encourages local public health authorities, community clinics, county health departments, school-based health centers, educators, and youth-serving organizations to participate in HPV Awareness Day by sharing medically accurate, age-appropriate, and culturally responsive information on HPV prevention and cervical cancer screening.
