

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 4018

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after “elections” insert “; creating new provisions; amending ORS
2 260.005, 260.007, 260.009, 260.014, 260.016, 260.018, 260.021, 260.041, 260.042, 260.044, 260.059, 260.061,
3 260.083, 260.205, 260.232, 260.266, 260.268, 260.345, 260.402, 260.416 and 260.995 and sections 7, 14 and
4 23, chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024; repealing ORS 260.006; and declaring an emergency”.

5 Delete lines 4 through 8 and insert:

6 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 260.009 is amended to read:

7 “260.009. *[(1)(a) For purposes of the contribution limits established in ORS 260.014 and 260.016,*
8 *contributions made or donations received by multiple membership organizations are considered to be*
9 *made or received by a single membership organization, if the membership organizations are estab-*
10 *lished, financed, maintained or controlled by the same person or substantially the same group of per-*
11 *sons, including any parent, subsidiary, branch, division, department or local unit of the person or*
12 *group of persons.]*

13 “*[(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the same person acting as a director or*
14 *officer of two or more membership organizations is not by itself sufficient to consider contributions*
15 *made or donations received by the membership organizations to be contributions made or received by*
16 *a single membership organization.]*

17 “*[(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, membership organizations may not be con-*
18 *sidered established, financed, maintained or controlled by the same person or within the same group*
19 *of persons if the membership organizations have the authority to make independent decisions as to*
20 *which candidates, if any, to support or oppose.]*

21 “[2] A membership organization may make political contributions directly or through a mem-
22 bership organization political committee, but may not make aggregate contributions that exceed the
23 contribution limits of ORS 260.014 *[and 260.016]*.

24 “**SECTION 1a.** ORS 260.009, as amended by section 1 of this 2026 Act, is amended to read:

25 “260.009. **(1)(a) For purposes of the contribution limits established in ORS 260.014, con-**
26 **tributions made by multiple membership organizations are considered to be made by a single**
27 **membership organization, if the membership organizations are established, financed, main-**
28 **tained or controlled by the same person or substantially the same group of persons, including**
29 **any parent, subsidiary, branch, division, department or local unit of the person or group of**
30 **persons.**

31 “**(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the same individual acting as a**
32 **director or officer of two or more membership organizations is not by itself sufficient to**
33 **consider contributions made by the membership organizations to be contributions made by**
34 **a single membership organization.**

35 “**(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, membership organizations may not**

1 **be considered to be established, financed, maintained or controlled by the same person or**
2 **within the same group of persons if the membership organizations have the authority to**
3 **make independent decisions as to which candidates, if any, to support or oppose.**

4 “(2) A membership organization may make political contributions directly or through a mem-
5 bership organization political committee, but may not make aggregate contributions that exceed the
6 contribution limits of ORS 260.014.

7 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 260.014 is amended to read:

8 “260.014. (1)(a) A candidate [*for state office or*], the principal campaign committee of a candidate
9 [*for state office*] **or a political committee** may accept contributions only from the sources and in the
10 amounts described in this section.

11 “(b) An in-kind contribution under this section may only be made by a contributor that is au-
12 thorized to make a contribution under this chapter and may only be received by a political com-
13 mittee.

14 “(c) Except as provided in paragraph (d) of this subsection, the limits on aggregate contributions
15 that may be accepted by a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for the
16 office of state Representative under this section also apply to a candidate or the principal campaign
17 committee of a candidate for any public office that is not a state office.

18 “(d)(A) Any local government that, as of January 1, 2024, had a system of contribution limits in
19 effect for local elections may maintain or adopt contribution limits that are lower than those re-
20 quired by this section and may limit the sources that may make contributions to candidates in local
21 elections, except that a local government system of contribution limits described in this subpara-
22 graph must permit small donor political committees to accept contributions from individuals of up
23 to \$250 per **calendar** year, as provided in subsection (8)(a) of this section.

24 “(B) For any local government that is not described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph:

25 “(i) Except as provided in subsection (8)(a) of this section, a local government may adopt con-
26 tribution limits that are lower than those required by this section for elections of the local govern-
27 ment.

28 “(ii) Any contribution limits adopted by a local government under this subparagraph must allow
29 a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for an election contest of the local
30 government to accept contributions from any political committee from which a candidate or the
31 principal campaign committee of a candidate for the office of state Representative may accept con-
32 tributions under subsection (2)(a) of this section.

33 “(C) Any local government may provide public funding for campaigns for local government
34 public office that are not subject to contribution limits under this section [*or ORS 260.016*].

35 “(2) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for the office of state
36 Representative, state Senator, circuit court judge or district attorney **may not accept aggregate**
37 **contributions in excess of:**

38 “(a) [*May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of*] \$3,300 per election from a person.

39 “(b) [*May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of*] \$2,000 per election from a [*candidate*
40 *political*] **principal campaign committee of another candidate.**

41 “(c) [*May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of*] \$5,000 per election cycle from a multi-
42 candidate political committee.

43 “(d) [*May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of*] \$15,000 per election from a political
44 party **multicandidate** committee.

45 “(e) [*May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of*] \$15,000 per election from a legislative

1 caucus **political** committee.

2 “(f) *[May not accept aggregate contributions from a membership organization or membership or-*
3 *ganization political committee per election in excess of \$3,300 times four]* **The amount set forth un-**
4 **der paragraph (a) of this subsection times four per election from a membership organization**
5 **or membership organization political committee.**

6 “(g) *[May not accept aggregate contributions per election from a small donor political committee*
7 *in excess of] \$5 times the number of [donors] contributors* to the small donor political committee
8 **per election from a small donor political committee.**

9 “(3) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office not de-
10 scribed in subsection (2) of this section **may not accept aggregate contributions in excess of:**

11 “(a) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$3,300 per election from a person.

12 “(b) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of \$2,000 per election cycle from a candidate*
13 *political committee]* **\$2,000 per election from a principal campaign committee of another candi-**
14 **date.**

15 “(c) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$5,000 per election cycle from a multi-
16 candidate political committee.

17 “(d) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$30,000 per election from a political
18 party **multicandidate** committee.

19 “(e) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$30,000 per election from a legislative
20 caucus **political** committee.

21 “(f) *[May not accept aggregate contributions]* **The amount set forth under paragraph (a) of**
22 **this subsection times eight per election** from a membership organization or membership organ-
23 ization political committee *[per election in excess of \$3,300 times eight]*.

24 “(g) *[May not accept aggregate contributions per election from a small donor political committee*
25 *in excess of]* \$10 times the number of *[donors] contributors* to the small donor political committee
26 **per election from a small donor political committee.**

27 “(4) A multicandidate political committee **may not accept aggregate contributions in excess**
28 **of:**

29 “(a) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$5,000 per *[election cycle]* **year** from a
30 person.

31 “(b) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$5,000 per year from a *[candidate poli-*
32 *tical committee]* **principal campaign committee of a candidate.**

33 “(c) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$5,000 per year from another multi-
34 candidate political committee.

35 “(d) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$5,000 per *[election cycle]* **year** from a
36 political party **multicandidate** committee.

37 “(e) *[May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of]* \$5,000 per year from a legislative
38 caucus **political** committee.

39 “(f) *[May not accept aggregate contributions from a membership organization or membership or-*
40 *ganization political committee in excess of]* \$5,000 per year **from a membership organization or**
41 **membership organization political committee.**

42 “(g) *[May not accept aggregate contributions from a small donor political committee per election*
43 *in excess of]* \$5,000 per year **from a small donor political committee.**

44 “(5) A political party **multicandidate** committee **may not accept aggregate contributions in**
45 **excess of:**

1 “(a) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$10,000 per year from a person.

2 “(b) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$5,000 per year from a [candidate poli-

3 tical committee] **principal campaign committee of a candidate.**

4 “(c) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$15,000 per year from a multicandidate

5 political committee.

6 “(d) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$15,000 per year from another political

7 party **multicandidate** committee.

8 “(e) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$15,000 per year from a legislative

9 caucus **political** committee.

10 “(f) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$10,000 per year from a membership

11 organization or membership organization political committee.

12 “(g) [May not accept aggregate contributions from a small donor political committee in excess of]

13 \$10,000 per year **from a small donor political committee.**

14 “(6) A legislative caucus **political** committee **may not accept aggregate contributions in ex-**

15 **cess of:**

16 “(a) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$10,000 per year from a person.

17 “(b) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$5,000 per year from a [candidate poli-

18 tical committee] **principal campaign committee of a candidate.**

19 “(c) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$15,000 per year from a multicandidate

20 political committee.

21 “(d) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$15,000 per year from a political party

22 **multicandidate** committee.

23 “(e) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$15,000 per year from another legisla-

24 tive caucus **political** committee.

25 “(f) [May not accept aggregate contributions in excess of] \$10,000 per year from a membership

26 organization or membership organization political committee.

27 “(g) [May not accept aggregate contributions from a small donor political committee in excess of]

28 \$10,000 per year **from a small donor political committee.**

29 “(7) Contributions to a measure political committee, **recall political committee or an inde-**

30 **pendent expenditure-only political committee** are not limited under this section.

31 “(8)(a) A small donor political committee:

32 “(A) May not accept contributions in excess of \$250 per **calendar** year from an individual.

33 “(B) May not accept contributions from a [candidate political committee] **principal campaign**

34 **committee of a candidate, independent expenditure-only political committee**, multicandidate

35 political committee, political party **multicandidate** committee, legislative caucus **political** commit-

36 tee, [or a] membership organization, **measure political committee, membership organization**

37 **political committee, recall political committee or a petition committee.**

38 “(C) May not accept contributions from another small donor political committee.

39 “(b) The number of [donors] **contributors** to a small donor political committee [shall] **must** be

40 determined by the number of unique individuals who have [donated] **contributed** funds to the com-

41 mittee during the [election cycle] **calendar year** in which the small donor political committee [do-

42 nation] **contribution** is made.

43 “(9) A membership organization:

44 “(a) May accept unlimited donations from a person and from another membership organization

45 or membership organization political committee.

1 “(b) May not accept donations from a [*candidate political committee*] **principal campaign com-**
2 **mittee of a candidate**, multicandidate political committee, political party **multicandidate** commit-
3 tee, legislative caucus **political** committee or a small donor political committee.

4 “[*(10) A donor may not make a contribution, or an aggregate of contributions during an applicable*
5 *limitation period, to a recipient that exceeds the amount a recipient could accept under the limitations*
6 *of subsections (2) to (9) of this section. This subsection does not apply to in-kind contributions described*
7 *in ORS 260.016 (2).*.]

8 “[*(11)(a) A political committee may make a contribution to a candidate for state office or the prin-*
9 *icipal campaign committee of a candidate for state office only if the political committee is registered with*
10 *the Secretary of State as a multicandidate political committee, a political party multicandidate commit-*
11 *tee, a legislative caucus committee, a membership organization political committee, the principal cam-*
12 *campaign committee of a candidate or a small donor political committee.*.]

13 “[*(b) A measure political committee or recall political committee may not make a contribution to a*
14 *candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office.*.]

15 “[*(12)(a) A membership organization may make in-kind contributions of up to 12 months per year*
16 *of full-time staff equivalence for a campaign for the office of state Representative or state Senator and*
17 *may make in-kind contributions of up to 36 months per year of full-time staff equivalence for a cam-*
18 *campaign for statewide elected office, provided that the staff time is limited to administrative support, direct*
19 *voter contact, community organizing, community outreach and staff support for direct voter contact,*
20 *community organizing or community outreach activities.*.]

21 “[*(b) The organization must measure full-time staff equivalence from staff or members of the or-*
22 *ganization who attest that they are not currently employed as pollsters, political consultants or candi-*
23 *date campaign strategists and that they have not served as a pollster, political consultant or candidate*
24 *campaign strategist for at least the previous 18 months.*.]

25 “[*(c) The organization must be solely responsible for the pay, benefits, employment status and other*
26 *human resources of every staff person or member of the organization facilitating contributions under*
27 *this subsection.*.]

28 “[*(d) The Secretary of State shall by rule define ‘administrative support,’ ‘community organizing,’*
29 *‘community outreach,’ ‘direct voter contact’ and ‘staff support’ for purposes of this subsection.*.]

30 “[*(13) Nothing in this section limits the amount a candidate may contribute from the candidate’s*
31 *personal funds to the candidate or the principal campaign committee of the candidate.*.]

32 “[*(14)(a) For purposes of the contribution limits established in this section, contributions made or*
33 *received by multiple political committees are considered to be made or received by a single political*
34 *committee if:*]

35 “[*(A) The political committees have filed to operate as the same type of political committee under*
36 *ORS 260.042; and*]

37 “[*(B) The political committees are established, financed, maintained or controlled by the same per-*
38 *son or substantially the same group of persons, including any parent, subsidiary, branch, division, de-*
39 *partment or local unit of the person or group of persons.*.]

40 “[*(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, independent businesses, entities, affiliates*
41 *or local groups of any structure operating under the same corporate family or umbrella organization*
42 *may not be considered established, financed, maintained or controlled by the same person or within the*
43 *same group of persons if the independent businesses, entities, affiliates or local groups have the au-*
44 *thority to make independent decisions as to which candidate, if any, to support or oppose.*.]

45 “[*(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, having the same person acting as the*

1 *treasurer of two or more political committees is not by itself sufficient to consider contributions made*
2 *by the political committees to be contributions made or received by a single political committee.]*

3 *“(15) For purposes of the contribution limits established in this section, contributions made by*
4 *multiple persons are considered to be made or received by a single person if the persons are estab-*
5 *lished, financed, maintained or controlled by the same person or substantially the same group of per-*
6 *sons, including any parent, subsidiary, branch, division, department or local unit of the person or*
7 *group of persons.]*

8 *“(16)(a) For purposes of candidate contributions, clubs, societies, associations, organizations or*
9 *anonymous limited liability companies are not authorized contributors.]*

10 *“(b) This subsection does not apply to membership organizations.]*

11 *“(17) A candidate seeking a minor party nomination shall be considered to be participating in the*
12 *primary election for the purposes of the contribution limits established in this section.]*

13 *“(18) The Secretary of State may adopt rules necessary to implement this section.]*

14 **“(10) A candidate, or the principal campaign committee of a candidate, may not accept**
15 **a contribution from another candidate or from a principal campaign committee of a candi-**
16 **date or a political committee unless the committee files a statement of organization in the**
17 **manner set forth in ORS 260.042.**

18 **“(11)(a)(A) In addition to the contribution limits described in subsections (2) and (3) of**
19 **this section, a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate may receive**
20 **in-kind contributions of staff time from a membership organization or a membership organ-**
21 **ization political committee in the following amounts:**

22 **“(i) To a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for the office of**
23 **state Representative or state Senator, not to exceed 2,080 staff hours per calendar year.**

24 **“(ii) To a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office**
25 **that is not state Representative or state Senator, not to exceed 6,240 staff hours per calendar**
26 **year.**

27 **“(iii) To a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a public of-**
28 **fice that is not a national or state office, not to exceed 2,080 staff hours per calendar year.**

29 **“(B) In-kind contributions of staff time provided under this paragraph must be limited**
30 **to administrative support, direct voter contact, community organizing, community outreach**
31 **and staff support for direct voter contact, community organizing or community outreach**
32 **activities, including any staff time associated with the creation, production or distribution**
33 **of communications in relation to the activities described in this subparagraph.**

34 **“(b) The staff time of a staff person or member of a membership organization or a**
35 **membership organization political committee may be contributed by a membership organ-**
36 **ization or a membership organization political committee under this subsection only if the**
37 **staff person or member attests that the staff person or member is not currently employed**
38 **as a pollster, political consultant or candidate campaign strategist and that the staff person**
39 **or member has not served as a pollster, political consultant or candidate campaign strategist**
40 **in the previous 18-month period.**

41 **“(c) The membership organization political committee or the membership organization**
42 **that formed the membership organization political committee making the in-kind contribu-**
43 **tion shall be solely responsible for the pay, benefits, employment status and other human**
44 **resources of every staff person or member of the organization whose staff time is contrib-**
45 **uted under this subsection.**

1 “(d) The Secretary of State shall define by rule the terms ‘administrative support,’
2 ‘community organizing,’ ‘community outreach,’ ‘direct voter contact’ and ‘staff support’ for
3 purposes of this subsection.

4 “(12)(a) In addition to the contribution limits described in subsections (2), (3) and (11) of
5 this section, a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate may receive
6 in-kind contributions not to exceed the amounts described in this subsection from any person
7 or entity otherwise authorized to make a contribution under this section.

8 “(b)(A) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate may accept:

9 “(i) Without limitation:

10 “(I) In-kind contributions of child care, elder care, interpretation or translation services.

11 “(II) Legal services related to advising a candidate on compliance with election laws.

12 “(III) Legal services related to representing the candidate in responding to or defending
13 against a complaint that has been filed against the candidate alleging a violation of election
14 laws.

15 “(ii) In-kind contributions of office space, including conference rooms and other utility
16 areas associated with office space, not to exceed 2,500 square feet per calendar year.

17 “(B) The amount of incidental costs incurred by the contributor in connection with pro-
18 viding in-kind contributions described in this paragraph may not exceed \$1,000 per calendar
19 year.

20 “(c) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for all offices except
21 a state office subject to the contribution limits set forth in subsection (3) of this section may
22 receive in-kind contributions not to exceed the amounts described in this paragraph from any
23 person or entity otherwise authorized to make a contribution under this section:

24 “(A) Food and beverages, \$2,500 per calendar year.

25 “(B) Transportation costs, \$2,500 per calendar year.

26 “(d) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office
27 subject to the contribution limits set forth in subsection (3) of this section may receive in-
28 kind contributions not to exceed the amounts described in this paragraph from any person
29 or entity otherwise authorized to make a contribution under this section:

30 “(A) Food and beverages, \$5,000 per calendar year.

31 “(B) Transportation costs, \$5,000 per calendar year.

32 “(13) A measure political committee may not make expenditures in support of or in op-
33 position to a candidate.

34 “(14) At the end of each even-numbered year, the Secretary of State shall adjust the
35 dollar amounts set forth in this section based on the cumulative change in the Consumer
36 Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bureau
37 of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor, or its successor. The adjust-
38 ments performed under this subsection must be rounded to the nearest \$10 increment.

39 “(15) Nothing in this section limits the amount a candidate may contribute from the
40 candidate’s personal funds to the candidate or the principal campaign committee of the
41 candidate.

42 “(16)(a) An in-kind contribution to, or coordinated expenditures with, a candidate, other
43 than independent expenditures made by that person to support or oppose a candidate, may
44 not be deemed to be coordinated so long as that person complies with the requirements of
45 this subsection.

1 **“(b) To comply with this subsection, the person must:**

2 **“(A) Separate the person’s staff persons that provide in-kind contributions or coordinated**
3 **expenditures from other staff persons that make decisions about independent expenditures**
4 **that support or oppose a candidate.**

5 **“(B) Prohibit the person’s owners, executives, managers and supervisors from simul-**
6 **taneously overseeing the decisions made by staff that are separated under subparagraph (A)**
7 **of this paragraph regarding contributions and expenditures. The owners, executives, manag-**
8 **ers and supervisors may participate in decisions regarding budget allocations to the person**
9 **without violating this subparagraph.**

10 **“(C) Prohibit the exchange of strategic nonpublic information regarding contributions**
11 **and coordinated expenditures with staff who are separated under subparagraph (A) of this**
12 **paragraph.**

13 **“(D) Establish and distribute a written policy regarding the requirements under this**
14 **subsection to all staff of the person prior to any work performed regarding the in-kind con-**
15 **tributions or coordinated expenditures. The written policy under this subparagraph must be**
16 **provided to the Secretary of State upon the secretary’s request.**

17 **“(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of this subsection, separation of the person’s volun-**
18 **teers or nonsupervisory staff persons that are engaged in direct voter contact is not required**
19 **so long as the person prohibits the volunteers and nonsupervisory staff persons from ex-**
20 **changing strategic nonpublic information regarding the contributions and coordinated**
21 **expenditures with staff persons that are separated under paragraph (b) of this subsection.**

22 **“(17) The Secretary of State may adopt rules for the administration of this section.**

23 **“SECTION 2a.** ORS 260.014, as amended by section 2 of this 2026 Act, is amended to read:

24 **“260.014. (1)(a) A candidate, the principal campaign committee of a candidate or a political**
25 **committee may accept contributions only from the sources and in the amounts described in this**
26 **section.**

27 **“(b) An in-kind contribution under this section may only be made by a contributor that is au-**
28 **thorized to make a contribution under this chapter and may only be received by a political com-**
29 **mittee.**

30 **“(c) Except as provided in paragraph (d) of this subsection, the limits on aggregate contributions**
31 **that may be accepted by a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for the**
32 **office of state Representative under this section also apply to a candidate or the principal campaign**
33 **committee of a candidate for any public office that is not a state office.**

34 **“(d)(A) Any local government that, as of January 1, 2024, had a system of contribution limits in**
35 **effect for local elections may maintain or adopt contribution limits that are lower than those re-**
36 **quired by this section and may limit the sources that may make contributions to candidates in local**
37 **elections, except that a local government system of contribution limits described in this subpara-**
38 **graph must permit small donor political committees to accept contributions from individuals of up**
39 **to \$250 per calendar year, as provided in subsection (8)(a) of this section.**

40 **“(B) For any local government that is not described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph:**

41 **“(i) Except as provided in subsection (8)(a) of this section, a local government may adopt con-**
42 **tribution limits that are lower than those required by this section for elections of the local govern-**
43 **ment.**

44 **“(ii) Any contribution limits adopted by a local government under this subparagraph must allow**
45 **a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for an election contest of the local**

1 government to accept contributions from any political committee from which a candidate or the
2 principal campaign committee of a candidate for the office of state Representative may accept con-
3 tributions under subsection (2)(a) of this section.

4 “(C) Any local government may provide public funding for campaigns for local government
5 public office that are not subject to contribution limits under this section.

6 “(2) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for the office of state
7 Representative, state Senator, circuit court judge or district attorney may not accept aggregate
8 contributions in excess of:

9 “(a) \$3,300 per election from a person.

10 “(b) \$2,000 per election from a principal campaign committee of another candidate.

11 “(c) \$5,000 per election cycle from a multicandidate political committee.

12 “(d) \$15,000 per election from a political party multicandidate committee.

13 “(e) \$15,000 per election from a legislative caucus political committee.

14 “(f) The amount set forth under paragraph (a) of this subsection times four per election from a
15 membership organization or membership organization political committee.

16 “(g) \$5 times the number of contributors to the small donor political committee per election from

18 “(3) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office not de-
19 scribed in subsection (2) of this section may not accept aggregate contributions in excess of:

20 “(a) \$3,300 per election from a person.

21 “(b) \$2,000 per election from a principal campaign committee of another candidate.

22 “(c) \$5,000 per election cycle from a multicandidate political committee.

23 “(d) \$30,000 per election from a political party multicandidate committee.

24 “(e) \$30,000 per election from a legislative caucus political committee.

25 “(f) The amount set forth under paragraph (a) of this subsection times eight per election from
26 a membership organization or membership organization political committee.

27 “(g) \$10 times the number of contributors to the small donor political committee per election
28 from a small donor political committee.

29 “(4) A multicandidate political committee may not accept aggregate contributions in excess of:

30 “(a) \$5,000 per year from a person.

31 “(b) \$5,000 per year from a principal campaign committee of a candidate.

32 “(c) \$5,000 per year from another multicandidate political committee.

33 “(d) \$5,000 per year from a political party multicandidate committee.

34 “(e) \$5,000 per year from a legislative caucus political committee.

35 “(f) \$5,000 per year from a membership organization or membership organization political com-
36 mittee.

37 “(g) \$5,000 per year from a small donor political committee.

38 “(5) A political party multicandidate committee may not accept aggregate contributions in ex-
39 cess of:

40 “(a) \$10,000 per year from a person.

41 “(b) \$5,000 per year from a principal campaign committee of a candidate.

42 “(c) \$15,000 per year from a multicandidate political committee.

43 “(d) \$15,000 per year from another political party multicandidate committee.

44 “(e) \$15,000 per year from a legislative caucus political committee.

45 “(f) \$10,000 per year from a membership organization or membership organization political

1 committee.

2 “(g) \$10,000 per year from a small donor political committee.

3 “(6) A legislative caucus political committee may not accept aggregate contributions in excess
4 of:

5 “(a) \$10,000 per year from a person.

6 “(b) \$5,000 per year from a principal campaign committee of a candidate.

7 “(c) \$15,000 per year from a multicandidate political committee.

8 “(d) \$15,000 per year from a political party multicandidate committee.

9 “(e) \$15,000 per year from another legislative caucus political committee.

10 “(f) \$10,000 per year from a membership organization or membership organization political
11 committee.

12 “(g) \$10,000 per year from a small donor political committee.

13 “(7) Contributions to a measure political committee, recall political committee or an independent
14 expenditure-only political committee are not limited under this section.

15 “(8)(a) A small donor political committee:

16 “(A) May not accept contributions in excess of \$250 per calendar year from an individual.

17 “(B) May not accept contributions from a principal campaign committee of a candidate, inde-
18 pendent expenditure-only political committee, multicandidate political committee, political party
19 multicandidate committee, legislative caucus political committee, membership organization, measure
20 political committee, membership organization political committee, recall political committee or a
21 petition committee.

22 “(C) May not accept contributions from another small donor political committee.

23 “(b) The number of contributors to a small donor political committee must be determined by the
24 number of unique individuals who have contributed funds to the committee during the calendar year
25 in which the small donor political committee contribution is made.

26 “(9) A membership organization:

27 “(a) May accept unlimited donations from a person and from another membership organization
28 or membership organization political committee.

29 “(b) May not accept donations from a principal campaign committee of a candidate, multicandi-
30 date political committee, political party multicandidate committee, legislative caucus political com-
31 mittee or a small donor political committee.

32 “(10) A candidate, or the principal campaign committee of a candidate, may not accept a con-
33 tribution from another candidate or from a principal campaign committee of a candidate or a poli-
34 tical committee unless the committee files a statement of organization in the manner set forth in
35 ORS 260.042.

36 “(11)(a)(A) In addition to the contribution limits described in subsections (2) and (3) of this sec-
37 tion, a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate may receive in-kind contribu-
38 tions of staff time from a membership organization or a membership organization political committee
39 in the following amounts:

40 “(i) To a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for the office of state
41 Representative or state Senator, not to exceed 2,080 staff hours per calendar year.

42 “(ii) To a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office that
43 is not state Representative or state Senator, not to exceed 6,240 staff hours per calendar year.

44 “(iii) To a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a public office that
45 is not a national or state office, not to exceed 2,080 staff hours per calendar year.

1 “(B) In-kind contributions of staff time provided under this paragraph must be limited to ad-
2 ministrative support, direct voter contact, community organizing, community outreach and staff
3 support for direct voter contact, community organizing or community outreach activities, including
4 any staff time associated with the creation, production or distribution of communications in relation
5 to the activities described in this subparagraph.

6 “(b) The staff time of a staff person or member of a membership organization or a membership
7 organization political committee may be contributed by a membership organization or a membership
8 organization political committee under this subsection only if the staff person or member attests that
9 the staff person or member is not currently employed as a pollster, political consultant or candidate
10 campaign strategist and that the staff person or member has not served as a pollster, political con-
11 sultant or candidate campaign strategist in the previous 18-month period.

12 “(c) The membership organization political committee or the membership organization that
13 formed the membership organization political committee making the in-kind contribution shall be
14 solely responsible for the pay, benefits, employment status and other human resources of every staff
15 person or member of the organization whose staff time is contributed under this subsection.

16 “(d) The Secretary of State shall define by rule the terms ‘administrative support,’ ‘community
17 organizing,’ ‘community outreach,’ ‘direct voter contact’ and ‘staff support’ for purposes of this sub-
18 section.

19 “(12)(a) In addition to the contribution limits described in subsections (2), (3) and (11) of this
20 section, a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate may receive in-kind con-
21 tributions not to exceed the amounts described in this subsection from any person or entity other-

23 “(b)(A) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate may accept:

24 “(i) Without limitation:

25 “(I) In-kind contributions of child care, elder care, interpretation or translation services.

26 “(II) Legal services related to advising a candidate on compliance with election laws.

27 “(III) Legal services related to representing the candidate in responding to or defending against
28 a complaint that has been filed against the candidate alleging a violation of election laws.

29 “(ii) In-kind contributions of office space, including conference rooms and other utility areas
30 associated with office space, not to exceed 2,500 square feet per calendar year.

31 “(B) The amount of incidental costs incurred by the contributor in connection with providing
32 in-kind contributions described in this paragraph may not exceed \$1,000 per calendar year.

33 “(c) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for all offices except a
34 state office subject to the contribution limits set forth in subsection (3) of this section may receive
35 in-kind contributions not to exceed the amounts described in this paragraph from any person or
36 entity otherwise authorized to make a contribution under this section:

37 “(A) Food and beverages, \$2,500 per calendar year.

38 “(B) Transportation costs, \$2,500 per calendar year.

39 “(d) A candidate or the principal campaign committee of a candidate for a state office subject
40 to the contribution limits set forth in subsection (3) of this section may receive in-kind contributions
41 not to exceed the amounts described in this paragraph from any person or entity otherwise author-
42 ized to make a contribution under this section:

43 “(A) Food and beverages, \$5,000 per calendar year.

44 “(B) Transportation costs, \$5,000 per calendar year.

45 “(13) A measure political committee may not make expenditures in support of or in opposition

1 to a candidate.

2 “(14) At the end of each even-numbered year, the Secretary of State shall adjust the dollar
3 amounts set forth in this section based on the cumulative change in the Consumer Price Index for
4 All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the
5 United States Department of Labor, or its successor. The adjustments performed under this sub-
6 section must be rounded to the nearest \$10 increment.

7 “(15) Nothing in this section limits the amount a candidate may contribute from the candidate’s
8 personal funds to the candidate or the principal campaign committee of the candidate.

9 “(16)(a) An in-kind contribution to, or coordinated expenditures with, a candidate, other than
10 independent expenditures made by that person to support or oppose a candidate, may not be deemed
11 to be coordinated so long as that person complies with the requirements of this subsection.

12 “(b) To comply with this subsection, the person must:

13 “(A) Separate the person’s staff persons that provide in-kind contributions or coordinated
14 expenditures from other staff persons that make decisions about independent expenditures that
15 support or oppose a candidate.

16 “(B) Prohibit the person’s owners, executives, managers and supervisors from simultaneously
17 overseeing the decisions made by staff that are separated under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph
18 regarding contributions and expenditures. The owners, executives, managers and supervisors may

21 “(C) Prohibit the exchange of strategic nonpublic information regarding contributions and co-

12 “[(C) *Child care, elder care, interpretation or translation services without limitation.*]

13 “[(D) *Small gifts that are incidental to the operation of a business up to \$1,000. The Secretary of*
14 *State may by rule further define what is meant by small gifts.*]

15 “[(E) *Contributions of office space, including conference rooms and other utility areas associated*
16 *with office space, except that the office space may not exceed 2,500 square feet or be contributed for a*
17 *period of longer than 12 months.*]

18 “[(F) *Legal services related to advising a candidate on compliance with election laws and repre-*
19 *senting a candidate in the event a complaint alleging a violation of election laws is filed against the*
20 *candidate may be contributed without limitation.*]

21 “[(b) *In-kind contributions described in this subsection must be reported to the Secretary of State*
22 *at the same time and in the same manner as other contributions and expenditures are reported.*]

23 “[(c) *In-kind contributions described in this subsection may only be made by a contributor author-*
24 *ized to make a contribution under this chapter and may only be received by a candidate or a candidate*
25 *committee.*]

26 “[(3) *Prior to the start of each election cycle, the Secretary of State shall adjust the dollar amounts*
27 *set forth in this section and ORS 260.014 by the cumulative change in the Consumer Price Index for*

29 *United States Department of Labor, or its successor, since 2024. The adjustments performed under this*

31 “[(4)] **(3)** The Secretary of State may adopt rules [*necessary to implement*] **for the adminis-**
32 **tration of** this section.

35 *of a candidate political committee may be used only as follows:*]

36 “**(1) Unless the excess unexpended funds are reported in the time and manner required**
37 **by the Secretary of State by rule, an individual who was a candidate for election to public**
38 **office, or the principal campaign committee of the candidate, not later than the 60th day**

15 that earned or received the business income or personal funds.

16 “[24] (26) ‘Person’ means an individual, corporation, limited liability company, labor organiza-
17 tion, association, firm, partnership, joint stock company, club, organization or other combination of
18 individuals having collective capacity.

19 “(27) ‘Personal funds’ means income received by an individual as salary or wages, other
20 earned income from bona fide employment, interest, dividends, royalties or proceeds from
21 an individual’s personal investments, bequests and income from testamentary trusts or other
22 trusts established by bequest. ‘Personal funds’ does not include any funds received from any
23 person for the purpose of influencing an election.

24 “[25] (28) ‘Petition committee’ means an initiative, referendum or recall petition committee
25 organized under ORS 260.118.

26 “[26] (29) ‘Political committee’ means a combination of two or more individuals, or a person
27 other than an individual, that has:

28 “(a) Received a contribution for the purpose of supporting or opposing a candidate, measure or
29 political party; or

30 “(b) Made an expenditure for the purpose of supporting or opposing a candidate, measure or
31 political party. For purposes of this paragraph, an expenditure does not include:

32 “(A) A contribution to a candidate or political committee that is required to report the contri-
33 bution on a statement filed under ORS 260.057 or 260.076 or a certificate filed under ORS 260.112;
34 or

35 “(B) An independent expenditure for which a statement is required to be filed by a person under
36 ORS 260.044.

37 “[27] (30) ‘Political party multicandidate committee’ means a political committee that:

38 “(a) Operates on a statewide basis;

39 “(b) Qualifies as a multicandidate political committee; and

40 “(c)(A) Represents a major or minor political party; or

41 “(B) Is established under the bylaws of a major or minor political party.

42 “[28] (31) ‘Public office’ means any national, state, county, district, city office or position, ex-
43 cept a political party office, that is filled by the electors.

44 “[29] (32) ‘Recall election’ means an election at which a holder of public office is subject to a
45 recall by the electors of the jurisdiction the holder of public office represents.

1 “[30] (33) ‘Recall petition’ means a petition to recall a public officer for which a prospective
2 petition has been filed but that is not yet a measure.

3 “[31] (34) ‘Recall political committee’ means a political committee that supports or opposes the
4 recall of a holder of public office for which a prospective petition has been certified to the ballot.

5 “[32] (35) ‘Referendum petition’ means a petition to refer a measure for which a prospective
6 petition has been filed but that is not yet a measure.

7 “[33] (36) ‘Regular district election’ means the regular district election described in ORS
8 255.335.

9 “[34] (37) ‘Small donor political committee’ means a political committee that:

10 “(a) Registers as a small donor political committee;

11 “(b) Prior to registering as a small donor political committee has not accepted a contribution
12 in excess of the contribution limits for small donor political committees set forth in ORS 260.014;
13 and

14 “(c) While operating as a small donor political committee, complies with the limits on accepting
15 contributions under ORS 260.014.

16 “[35] (38) ‘State office’ means the office of Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, At-
17 torney General, Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries, state Senator, state Repre-
18 sentative, judge or district attorney.

19 **“SECTION 12. Sections 13 and 14 of this 2026 Act are added to and made a part of ORS
20 chapter 260.**

21 **“SECTION 13. (1)(a) For purposes of the amounts described in ORS 260.014, contributions
22 made or received by multiple political committees are considered to be made or received by
23 a single political committee if the political committees:**

24 **“(A) Have filed to operate as the same type of political committee under ORS 260.042; and**

25 **“(B) Are established, financed, maintained or controlled by the same person, or sub-
26 stantially the same group of persons, including any parent, subsidiary, branch, division, de-
27 partment or local unit of the person or group of persons.**

28 **“(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, independent businesses, entities,
29 affiliates or local groups of any structure operating under the same corporate family or
30 umbrella organization may not be considered established, financed, maintained or controlled
31 by the same person or within the same group of persons if the independent businesses, en-
32 tities, affiliates or local groups have the authority to make independent decisions as to which
33 candidate, if any, to support or oppose.**

34 **“(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, having the same person acting as
35 the treasurer of two or more political committees is not, by itself, sufficient to consider
36 contributions made by the political committees to be contributions made or received by a
37 single political committee.**

38 **“(2)(a) For purposes of the amounts described in ORS 260.014, contributions made by
39 multiple persons are considered to be made or received by a single person if the persons are
40 established, financed, maintained or controlled by:**

41 **“(A) The same person; or**

42 **“(B) Substantially the same group of persons, including any parent, subsidiary, branch,
43 division, department or local unit of the person or group of persons.**

44 **“(b) For purposes of the consideration under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the pres-
45 ence of either or both factors described in paragraph (a)(A) and (B) of this subsection is not**

1 sufficient unless the person was established for the sole purpose of evading the contribution
2 limits set forth in ORS 260.014.

3 “(c) The determination under paragraph (b) of this subsection of whether a person was
4 established for the sole purpose of evading contribution limits must be based on an investi-
5 gation by the Secretary of State following the filing of a complaint in accordance with the
6 process set forth in ORS 260.345.

7 “(3)(a) Clubs, societies, associations, organizations or anonymous limited liability com-
8 panies may not make contributions to a candidate or the principal campaign committee of
9 a candidate.

10 “(b) This subsection does not apply to a membership organization.

11 “SECTION 14. (1) A foreign national, foreign corporation or foreign entity may not, di-
12 rectly or indirectly, make or offer to make:

13 “(a) A contribution to a candidate;

14 “(b) An expenditure; or

15 “(c) A donation or contribution used by an entity to pay for candidate campaign inde-
16 pendent expenditures.

17 “(2)(a) As used in this section, ‘foreign national’ means a foreign principal, as defined in
18 22 U.S.C. 611(b).

19 “(b) ‘Foreign national’ does not include any individual who is:

20 “(A) A citizen of the United States;

21 “(B) A national of the United States; or

22 “(C) Lawfully admitted for permanent residence in the United States.

23 “SECTION 15. ORS 260.059 is amended to read:

24 “260.059. [(1) The Secretary of State by rule shall adopt an addition to the electronic filing system
25 described in ORS 260.057 to be used by:]

26 “[a] Membership organizations;]

27 “[b] Persons; and]

28 “[c] Any combination of organizations or persons that has a collective capacity and that is legally
29 separate from other persons and that makes independent expenditures.]

30 “[(2) The electronic filing system addition described in this section shall be used by entities de-
31 scribed in subsection (1) of this section to report the original source of funds used to pay for candidate
32 campaign independent expenditures, to promote transparency and accountability to voters.]

33 “[(3) Once an entity subject to this section has spent an aggregate of \$50,000 on candidate cam-
34 paign independent expenditures in an election cycle, the entity must disclose the name of each person
35 that has contributed \$5,000 or more during the election cycle and the original source of funds used for
36 the contribution. In identifying persons that have made aggregate donations of \$5,000 or more per
37 election cycle, the entity may exclude:]

38 “[a] Donations received from an affiliated charitable organization that is tax exempt under section
39 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code;]

40 “[b] Donations and grants received from foundations and other persons that may not be used to
41 make a communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate; and]

42 “[c] Donations received from a source that demonstrates to the Secretary of State that there is a
43 reasonable probability that public knowledge of the identity of the source would subject the source or
44 the family of the source to serious risk of physical harm.]

45 “[4] An entity described in subsection (3) of this section must disclose the original source of funds

1 of the full amount spent on the entity's aggregate independent expenditures.]

2 “[5] Donations from donors who have contributed less than \$5,000 during the election cycle may
3 be aggregated and reported on a ‘Miscellaneous Under \$5,000’ category on the electronic filing system
4 addition.]

5 “[6](a) Each donor that is separately reported under subsection (3) of this section and that spends
6 an aggregate of \$50,000 on independent expenditures in an election cycle must also report the original
7 source of funds used for the donation.]

8 “[b] If and to the extent a donor serves as a pass-through or intermediary for the original source
9 of the funds, both the pass-through or intermediary and the original source of funds shall be
10 reported.]

11 “[c] For purposes of this section and ORS 260.061 and 260.266:]

12 “[A] ‘Business income’ means:]

13 “[i] Funds received by a person in commercial transactions in the ordinary course of the person’s
14 regular trade, business or investments;]

15 “[ii] Membership or union dues paid to the person, except dues exceeding \$5,000 from any person
16 in a calendar year; and]

17 “[iii] Contributions or donations paid to the person, except contributions or donations exceeding
18 \$5,000 from any person in a calendar year.]

19 “[B] ‘Original source of funds’ means business income or personal funds and the person that
20 earned or received the business income or personal funds.]

21 “[C] ‘Personal funds’ means income received by an individual as salary or wages, other earned
22 income from bona fide employment, interest, dividends, royalties or proceeds from an individual’s per-
23 sonal investments, bequests and income from testamentary trusts or other trusts established by bequest.
24 ‘Personal funds’ does not include any funds received from any person for the purpose of influencing
25 an election.]

26 “(1) The Secretary of State by rule shall provide for the use of the electronic filing sys-
27 tem adopted under ORS 260.057 by a covered person in accordance with this section.

28 “(2) To promote transparency and accountability, a covered person shall use the elec-
29 tronic filing system adopted under ORS 260.057 to report the original source of funds used
30 to pay for candidate campaign independent expenditures.

31 “(3) Upon making candidate campaign independent expenditures in an aggregate of
32 \$50,000 in an election cycle, a covered person shall disclose:

33 “(a)(A) Except as provided under subsection (5)(a) of this section, the name of each per-
34 son that has donated or contributed not less than \$5,000 to the covered person during the
35 election cycle; and

36 “(B) The aggregate amount of donations or contributions received by the covered person
37 from all persons that have each donated or contributed not more than \$5,000; and

38 “(b) The original source of funds for donations or contributions to the covered person in
39 an amount equal to the total amount spent on the aggregate candidate campaign independent
40 expenditures by the covered person.

41 “(4) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a covered person that is not a political
42 committee shall disclose donations or contributions to the covered person in an amount
43 equal only to the total amount of candidate campaign independent expenditures made by the
44 covered person.

45 “(5)(a) Donations or contributions from any person that has donated or contributed not

1 more than \$5,000 during an election cycle may be aggregated and reported on a ‘Miscella-
2 neous Under \$5,000’ category on the electronic filing system, except that a covered person
3 may exclude from disclosure any:

4 “(A) Donation or contribution received from an affiliated charitable organization that is
5 tax exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code;

6 “(B) Donation or grant received from a foundation or other person that may not be used
7 to make a communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate;

8 “(C) Donation or contribution received from a person that has restricted that person’s
9 funds in writing from being used to make a communication in support of or in opposition to
10 a clearly identified candidate; and

11 “(D) Donation or contribution received from a source of funds that demonstrates to the
12 Secretary of State that there is a reasonable probability that public knowledge of the identity
13 of the source would subject the source or the family of the source to serious risk of physical
14 harm.

15 “(b) A covered person that is not a political committee may disclose the identity of any
16 person that donated or contributed to the covered person in the two years preceding the date
17 on which the covered person made the independent expenditure.

18 “(6)(a) Upon the written request of a covered person, a person that donated or contrib-
19 uted to the covered person shall disclose:

20 “(A) The name of and amount provided by any person that provided the original source
21 of funds that comprises, in whole or in part, the person’s donation or contribution to the
22 covered person. The names and amounts disclosed under this subsection must equal the
23 amount of the person’s total donation or contribution to the covered person.

24 “(B) The name of and amount provided by any person that is not an original source of
25 funds but which served as a pass-through or intermediary for funds from an original source
26 of funds.

27 “(b) A person that must make the disclosure described under paragraph (a) of this sub-
28 section may disclose the name of any original source of funds that has provided funds, either
29 directly or through a pass-through or intermediary entity, in the two years preceding the
30 date on which the person made donations or contributions to the covered entity, except that:

31 “(A) Funds that are identified as the original source of funds for a donation or contri-
32 bution to a covered person may not be identified as the original source of funds for a sub-
33 sequent donation or contribution to that covered person or for a donation or contribution
34 to any other covered person.

35 “(B) The person may not disclose the name of any person that has restricted that
36 person’s funds in writing from being used to make a communication in support of or in op-
37 position to a clearly identified candidate.

38 “(C) The person may provide an aggregate total for any original sources of funds that
39 comprise not more than \$5,000 of the donation or contribution to the covered person. The
40 original sources of funds provided under this subparagraph may be aggregated and disclosed
41 on a ‘Miscellaneous Under \$5,000’ category on the electronic filing system.

42 “(c) The Secretary of State shall adopt rules establishing the procedure by which a cov-
43 ered person may request and obtain information under this subsection.

44 “(7) The original sources of funds used to pay for candidate campaign independent expenditures
45 and persons associated with those original sources of funds must be reported to the Secretary of

1 State at the same time and in the same manner as other contributions and expenditures are re-
2 ported.

3 “(8) Prior to the start of each election cycle, the Secretary of State shall adjust the dollar
4 amounts set forth in this section [by] **based on** the cumulative change in the Consumer Price Index
5 for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics
6 of the United States Department of Labor, or its successor, since 2024. The adjustments performed
7 under this subsection shall be rounded to the nearest \$10 increment.

8 “(9) The Secretary of State shall by rule establish reporting timelines and guidance for the re-
9 porting of independent expenditures.

10 “(10) **Any personally identifying information that is required to be provided to the Sec-**
11 **retary of State under this section is not a public record for purposes of ORS 192.311 to**
12 **192.478 and may not be made public by the secretary. This subsection does not apply to an**
13 **individual’s name, residence address, occupation and the name of the individual’s employer.**

14 “(11) **For purposes of this section, ‘covered person’ means any person that has made in-**
15 **dependent expenditures in an aggregated amount of not less than \$50,000 in an election cycle**
16 **for any statewide or local election.**

17 “**SECTION 16.** Section 14, chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024, is amended to read:

18 “**Sec. 14.** [On or before January 1, 2028,] The Secretary of State shall:

19 “(1) Create a web-based campaign finance dashboard that promotes transparency and fosters
20 research and analysis on campaign **contributions**, donations and expenditures in this state. The
21 dashboard [shall] **must** include numeric and visual representations of campaign finance activity in
22 Oregon.

23 “(2) Update software related to campaign filings to promote transparency, efficiency and modern
24 best practices in campaign finance reporting.

25 “**SECTION 17. The Secretary of State shall create the dashboard, and update the soft-**
26 **ware, described in section 14, chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024, not later than January 1, 2032.**

27 “**SECTION 18.** ORS 260.061 is amended to read:

28 “260.061. (1) [For elections occurring after January 1, 2028,] The Secretary of State shall:

29 “(a) At least 10 days before each election, release on the dashboard **created under section 14,**
30 **chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024,** a list of the 100 largest contributors to candidates or principal
31 campaign committees, aggregated across all candidates.

32 “(b) Annually release a visual representation of contributions by industry aggregated across all
33 candidates and broken down by statewide, legislative and local office.

34 “(c) At least 10 days before each election, release on the dashboard the original sources of funds
35 of candidate campaign independent expenditures as required by ORS 260.059. The disclosures must
36 be set forth on the dashboard [so as] to promote transparency with the public.

37 “(d) Annually display the average cost of campaigns by office and the largest three categories
38 for spending, broken down by statewide office, legislative office, circuit court and district attorney
39 offices and local offices.

40 “(2) The Secretary of State may by rule establish other reports, data and information to be in-
41 cluded on the dashboard and the frequency with which the information is reported, except that the
42 information must be reported at least annually. The secretary shall follow best practices to promote
43 efficiency when establishing reporting and filing requirements.

44 “(3)(a) The Secretary of State shall biannually conduct a review process of:

45 “(A) The reporting and filing of information required in order to comply with the disclosures

1 and content required on the dashboard; and

2 “(B) Compliance by and the needs of stakeholders, including [*but not limited to*]:

3 “(i) Persons who make and report [*donations*] **contributions** to candidates or [*principle*] **prin-**
4 **icipal** campaign committees;

5 “(ii) Persons who make independent expenditures;

6 “(iii) Entities organized under section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code;

7 “(iv) Candidates; and

8 “(v) Media organizations.

9 “(b) The secretary shall report the findings of the biannual review to the Legislative Assembly
10 and may also report on improvements undertaken or planned by the secretary based on the findings
11 of the review.

12 “[*(4) As used in this section, ‘dashboard’ means the web-based dashboard described in section 14,*
13 *chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024.*]

14 “**SECTION 19. The amendments to ORS 260.061 by section 18 of this 2026 Act apply to**
15 **elections occurring after January 1, 2032.**

16 “**SECTION 20.** ORS 260.266, as amended by section 15, chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024, is
17 amended to read:

18 “260.266. (1) Except as otherwise provided by a local provision, a communication in support of
19 or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate must state the name of the persons that paid for
20 the communication.

21 “(2) For the purpose of complying with subsection (1) of this section:

22 “(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a communication in support of or in
23 opposition to a clearly identified candidate by a political committee or recall petition committee that
24 costs at least \$10,000 for the entire placement of the communication and substantially similar com-
25 munications must state:

26 “(A) The name of the political committee or petition committee; and

27 “(B) The names of the four persons that have made the largest aggregate contributions of
28 \$10,000 or more to the committee in the election cycle in which the communication is made.

29 “(b) A communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate by an in-
30 dividual, a for-profit business entity or a candidate or the principal campaign committee of a can-
31 didate must state the name of the individual, for-profit business entity or candidate.

32 “(c)(A) A communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate by a
33 person not described in paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection must state:

34 “(i) The name of the person; and

35 “(ii) Except as provided in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, the names of the four persons
36 that have made the largest aggregate donations of \$10,000 or more to the person in the election
37 cycle in which the communication is made.

38 “(B) In identifying persons that have made aggregate donations of \$10,000 or more, a person
39 described in this paragraph may exclude:

40 “(i) Donations received from an affiliated charitable organization that is tax exempt under sec-
41 tion 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; and

42 “(ii) Donations and grants received from foundations and other persons that may not be used to
43 make a communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate.

44 “(d) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) or (c) of this subsection, a digital communication may state
45 only the name of the person that made the communication if the digital communication includes an

1 active link to a website that prominently displays the additional information required by this sub-
2 section.

3 “(3) If a candidate has contributed more than \$20,000 to the candidate’s own campaign, a com-
4 munication subject to this section must include a statement indicating that the candidate has con-
5 tributed more than \$20,000 to the candidate’s own campaign.

6 “(4) A person that makes communications in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified
7 candidate must consider an anonymous donation of \$1,000 or more from a single person to be a do-
8 nation that may not be used to make a communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly
9 identified candidate.

10 “(5)(a) If a person is required to disclose the names of four persons under subsection (2)(a)(B)
11 or (c)(A)(ii) of this section and more than four persons qualify as having made the largest aggregate
12 contributions or donations, the person shall disclose the four applicable persons whose contributions
13 or donations were made closest to the date of initial printing or transmission of the communication.

14 “(b) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, the four persons required to be
15 named under subsection (2)(a)(B) or (c)(A)(ii) of this section must be accurate as of 10 days before
16 the most recent payment to print or transmit the communication.

17 “(c) A person that both makes multiple digital communications in support of or in opposition to
18 a clearly identified candidate and uses the method described in subsection (2)(d) of this section to
19 meet the identification requirements of subsection (2)(a)(B) or (c)(A)(ii) of this section, may use one
20 active link to the same website for all digital communications made by the person, provided that the
21 information on the website is accurate as of 10 days before the most recent payment to print or
22 transmit a communication.

23 “(6) A communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate that costs
24 at least \$10,000 must include an electronic, printed or [*aural*] **auditory** link to the appropriate site
25 on the electronic filing system described in ORS 260.057, that identifies the original sources of funds
26 to the entity that made the expenditure. The link **must be**:

27 “(a) [*Shall be*] An active link if the communication is in digital form; **and**

28 “(b) [*Shall be*] A printed or televised rendition of the link if the communication is in printed or
29 televised form.[: *and*]

30 “[*c*] *Shall be read as part of the communication if the communication is on radio or other aural*
31 *format. The Secretary of State shall strive for brevity and clarity in creating links to be read under this*
32 *paragraph.*]

33 “(7) The Secretary of State shall by rule provide technical specifications for the links described
34 in subsection (6) of this section.

35 “(8) This section does not apply to:

36 “(a) Candidates for federal office.

37 “(b) Candidates other than those described in paragraph (a) of this subsection who are not re-
38 quired to use the electronic filing system adopted under ORS 260.057 to file statements of contribu-
39 tions received or expenditures made.

40 “(c) Petition committees that are not required to use the electronic filing system adopted under
41 ORS 260.057 to file statements of contributions received or expenditures made.

42 “(d) Political committees that are not required to use the electronic filing system adopted under
43 ORS 260.057 to file statements of contributions received or expenditures made.

44 “(e) A person that makes independent expenditures and that is exempt under ORS 260.044 from
45 being required to file statements of independent expenditures using the electronic filing system

1 adopted under ORS 260.057.

2 “(f) A communication that is excluded from the definition of ‘expenditure’ under ORS 260.007.

3 “(g) Items of de minimis value relating to a candidate, including [*but not limited to*]:

4 “(A) Lawn signs, pins, pens and other similar items;

5 “(B) Skywriting; or

6 “(C) Wearable merchandise.

7 “(h) Any other item that the Secretary of State by rule determines is too small to feasibly in-
8 clude the identifying information required by this section.

9 “(9) The Secretary of State by rule shall prescribe the form of statements required on commu-
10 nications described in this section. Rules adopted under this subsection must ensure that the infor-
11 mation required to be included in communications under this section is:

12 “(a) In a font, size and color that are easy for an average person to read, if the communication
13 appears in a print or digital format; and

14 “(b) Clearly audible to the average person, if the communication appears in an audio format.

15 “(10) As used in this section:

16 “(a) ‘Clearly identified’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 260.005 [(10)(b)].

17 “(b)(A) Except as provided in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, ‘communication in support of
18 or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate’ means:

19 “(i)(I) The communication, when taken as a whole and with limited reference to external events,
20 such as the proximity to the election, could only be interpreted by a reasonable person as containing
21 advocacy for the election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate for nomination or election to
22 public office; and

23 “(II) The electoral portion of the communication is unmistakable, unambiguous and suggestive
24 of only one meaning; or

25 “(ii)(I) The communication involves aggregate expenditures by a person of more than the amount
26 provided in ORS 260.044 (1);

27 “(II) The communication refers to a clearly identified candidate who will appear on the ballot;
28 and

29 “(III) The communication is printed or transmitted to the relevant electorate within the time
30 frame [*provided*] **for publication and dissemination described** in ORS 260.005 [(10)(c)(B)(iii)].

31 “(B)(i) ‘Communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate’ includes
32 [*but is not limited to*] communications distributed via print, telephone, radio, television or the Inter-
33 net.

34 “(ii) ‘Communication in support of or in opposition to a clearly identified candidate’ does not
35 include newspaper editorials, printed advertisements with a fair market value of less than \$500 or
36 communications made via telephone that have a fair market value of less than \$500.

37 “(c)(A) ‘Donation’ means the gift or transfer of moneys or any other item of value to a person
38 subject to subsection (2)(c)(A) of this section, including any membership fees, dues or assessments.

39 “(B) ‘Donation’ does not include moneys or any other item of value received by a person subject
40 to subsection (2)(c)(A) of this section in the ordinary course of a trade or business conducted by the
41 person.

42 “(d) ‘Local provision’ means a charter provision, ordinance, resolution or other provision
43 adopted by a city, county or other local government.

44 “**SECTION 21.** ORS 260.402 is amended to read:

1 tion or donation, or make a contribution or donation in any name other than that of the person that
2 in truth provides the contribution or donation, to:

3 “(a) Any other person, relating to a nomination or election of any candidate or the support of
4 or opposition to any measure;

5 “(b) Any political committee;

6 “(c) Any entity required by ORS 260.059 to disclose the original source of funds used to pay for
7 candidate campaign independent expenditures; or

8 “(d) A petition committee required to file a statement under ORS 260.118.

9 “(2) A person may not establish an entity for the purpose of obscuring the original source of
10 funds used to pay for candidate campaign independent expenditures or evading contribution limits.

11 “(3) Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, a person, political committee, petition
12 committee or entity required to make a disclosure under ORS 260.059 may not knowingly receive a
13 contribution or donation prohibited under subsection (1) of this section or enter or cause the con-
14 tribution or donation to be entered in accounts or records in another name than that of the person
15 that actually provided the contribution or donation.

16 “(4) If a person receives a contribution from a political committee, the person may enter the
17 contribution into accounts or records as received from the political committee.

18 “[*(5) As used in this section, ‘original source of funds’ has the meaning given that term in ORS*
19 *260.059.*]

20 “**SECTION 22. Sections 23 to 25 of this 2026 Act are added to and made a part of ORS**
21 **chapter 260.**

22 “**SECTION 23. As used in sections 23 to 25 of this 2026 Act:**

23 “(1) ‘Anonymous donation’ means a donation for which the covered organization does not
24 possess the donor name or address that is required under section 24 of this 2026 Act.

25 “(2) ‘Covered organization’ means a combination of two or more individuals, or a person
26 other than an individual, political committee, petition committee or a not-for-profit corpo-
27 ration that is tax exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, that accepts
28 donations and makes political communications.

29 “(3)(a) ‘Donation’ means a gift or transfer of moneys or any other item of value to a
30 covered organization, including any membership fees, dues or assessments.

31 “(b) ‘Donation’ does not include moneys or any other item of value received by a covered
32 organization in the ordinary course of a trade or business conducted by the covered organ-
33 ization.

34 “(4) ‘Donor’ means a person that makes a donation to a covered organization.

35 “(5) ‘Election cycle’ means a two-year period starting on January 1 of an odd-numbered
36 year and ending on December 31 of the following even-numbered year.

37 “(6) ‘Electioneering cost threshold for a legislative race’ means the costs for political
38 communications made by a covered organization of less than \$25,000 for a candidate for a
39 particular seat in the Legislative Assembly.

40 “(7)(a) ‘Electioneering cost threshold for a measure,’ except as provided in paragraphs
41 (b) and (c) of this subsection, means the costs for political communications made by a cov-
42 ered organization of less than \$100,000 for a particular measure.

43 “(b) For a city measure in a city with a population of less than 60,000, ‘electioneering cost
44 threshold for a measure’ means the costs for political communications made by a covered
45 organization of less than \$25,000 for a particular city measure.

1 “(c) For a county measure in a county with a population of less than 60,000,
2 ‘electioneering cost threshold for a measure’ means the costs for political communications
3 made by a covered organization of less than \$25,000 for a particular county measure.

4 “(8) ‘Electioneering cost threshold for a political committee’ means the costs for political
5 communications made by a covered organization of less than \$100,000 for a particular poli-
6 tical committee.

7 “(9) ‘Electioneering cost threshold for a statewide race’ means the costs for political
8 communications made by a covered organization of less than \$100,000 for a particular state
9 office as defined in ORS 249.215.

10 “(10)(a) ‘Political communication’ means a communication in support of or in opposition
11 to a clearly identified candidate or measure.

12 “(b) ‘Political communication’ does not include a communication:

13 “(A) By a covered organization to its current members, stockholders or executive or
14 administrative personnel;

15 “(B) That constitutes lobbying as defined in ORS 171.725; or

16 “(C) Excluded from the definition of ‘expenditure’ under ORS 260.007.

17 “SECTION 24. (1)(a) Except as provided in subsection (5) of this section, a covered or-
18 ganization that during an election cycle exceeds the electioneering threshold for a legislative
19 race, the electioneering threshold for a measure, the electioneering threshold for a political
20 committee or the electioneering threshold for a statewide race shall file with the Secretary
21 of State an initial donor identification list containing the name and address of and aggregate
22 amount donated by each donor that donated an aggregate amount of \$10,000 or more to the
23 covered organization during that election cycle.

24 “(b) A covered organization that is required to file an initial donor identification list un-
25 der this subsection shall file the list not later than seven calendar days after the covered
26 organization makes a political communication that requires the covered organization to
27 make a filing under paragraph (a) of this subsection.

28 “(2)(a) A covered organization that filed an initial donor identification list under sub-
29 section (1) of this section shall, during that election cycle, update the list by filing with the
30 Secretary of State:

31 “(A) The name and address of and aggregate amount donated by each subsequent donor
32 that makes a donation or aggregate donations of \$10,000 or more to the covered organization
33 during that election cycle; and

34 “(B) An updated amount of the aggregate donations the covered organization has re-
35 ceived during the election cycle from each donor that was previously listed on an initial do-
36 nor identification list or updated donor identification list filed under this section.

37 “(b) An updated donor identification list filed under this subsection must be filed ac-
38 cording to the time frame for filing a statement of independent expenditures under ORS
39 260.044, except that the time frame for filing starts on the day that:

40 “(A) The dollar amount received by the covered organization from a single donor not
41 previously on the list, whether by single donation or aggregate donations, equals \$10,000 or
42 more; or

43 “(B) The covered organization receives an additional donation from a donor that was
44 previously listed on an initial donor identification list or updated donor identification list filed
45 under this section.

1 “(3) Each initial donor identification list and updated donor identification list filed under
2 this section must be signed and certified as true by an authorized representative of the
3 covered organization. Signatures must be supplied in the manner specified by the Secretary
4 of State by rule.

5 “(4) The Secretary of State shall, upon request, deliver to any person the initial donor
6 identification lists and updated donor identification lists filed under this section. If the Sec-
7 retary of State receives a request under this subsection, the Secretary of State shall deliver
8 the lists not later than five days after receiving the request.

9 “(5) In identifying donors that have made aggregate donations of \$10,000 or more in the
10 manner described in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, a covered organization may ex-
11 clude:

12 “(a) Donations received from an affiliated charitable organization that is tax exempt un-
13 der section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; and

14 “(b) Donations and grants received from foundations and other donors that may not be
15 used for political communications.

16 “(6) A covered organization must consider an anonymous donation of \$1,000 or more from
17 a single donor to be a donation that may not be used for political communications.

18 “(7) The Secretary of State may enact rules for the administration of this section.

19 “SECTION 25. (1) The Secretary of State may impose a civil penalty as provided in this
20 section, in addition to any other penalty that may be imposed, for failing to:

21 “(a) Timely file an initial donor identification list required to be filed under section 24 of
22 this 2026 Act;

23 “(b) Timely file an updated donor identification list required to be filed under section 24
24 of this 2026 Act; or

25 “(c) Include all donors or amounts donated that are required to be included in an initial
26 donor identification list or an updated donor identification list that is required to be filed
27 under section 24 of this 2026 Act.

28 “(2)(a) For each failure to timely file an initial donor identification list that is required
29 to be filed under section 24 of this 2026 Act for exceeding the electioneering cost threshold
30 for a legislative race, the Secretary of State may impose a civil penalty not to exceed the
31 lesser of:

32 “(A) 10 percent per day of the total cost for political communications made by the cov-
33 ered organization for the applicable legislative race; or

34 “(B) 150 percent of the total cost for political communications made by the covered or-
35 ganization for the applicable legislative race.

36 “(b) For each failure to timely file an initial donor identification list that is required to
37 be filed under section 23 of this 2026 Act for exceeding the electioneering cost threshold for
38 a measure, the Secretary of State may impose a civil penalty not to exceed the lesser of:

39 “(A) 10 percent per day of the total cost for political communications made by the cov-
40 ered organization for the applicable measure; or

41 “(B) 150 percent of the total cost for political communications made by the covered or-
42 ganization for the applicable measure.

43 “(c) For each failure to timely file an initial donor identification list that is required to
44 be filed under section 23 of this 2026 Act for exceeding the electioneering cost threshold for
45 a political committee, the Secretary of State may impose a civil penalty not to exceed the

1 lesser of:

2 “(A) 10 percent per day of the total cost for political communications made by the cov-
3 ered organization for the applicable political committee; or

4 “(B) 150 percent of the total cost for political communications made by the covered or-
5 ganization for the applicable political committee.

6 “(d) For each failure to timely file an initial donor identification list that is required to
7 be filed under section 23 of this 2026 Act for exceeding the electioneering cost threshold for
8 a statewide race, the Secretary of State may impose a civil penalty not to exceed the lesser
9 of:

10 “(A) 10 percent per day of the total cost for political communications made by the cov-
11 ered organization for the applicable statewide race; or

12 “(B) 150 percent of the total cost for political communications made by the covered or-
13 ganization for the applicable statewide race.

14 “(3) For each failure to accurately include the name of a donor or the amount a donor
15 donated to the covered organization in an initial donor identification list or an updated donor
16 identification list that is required to be filed under section 24 of this 2026 Act, or for each
17 failure to timely file an updated donor identification list that is required to be filed under
18 section 24 of this 2026 Act, the Secretary of State may impose a civil penalty not to exceed
19 10 percent of the aggregate donations that were not properly included or filed.

20 “(4) Except as otherwise provided by this section, civil penalties under this section shall
21 be imposed as provided in ORS 183.745. In addition to the requirements for a notice of right
22 to a hearing under ORS 183.745, the notice shall include:

23 “(a) A statement of the authority and jurisdiction under which the hearing is to be held;
24 and

25 “(b) If the person is an agency, corporation or an unincorporated association, a state-
26 ment that the person must be represented by an attorney licensed in Oregon.

27 “(5) A hearing on whether to impose a civil penalty and to consider circumstances in
28 mitigation shall be held by the Secretary of State:

29 “(a) Upon request of the person against whom the penalty may be assessed, if the request
30 is made not later than the 20th day after the date the person received notice sent under
31 subsection (4) of this section; or

32 “(b) Upon the Secretary of State’s own motion.

33 “(6) The person against whom a penalty may be assessed need not appear in person at a
34 hearing held under this section, but instead may submit written testimony or other evidence,
35 sworn to before a notary public, to the Secretary of State for entry in the hearing record.
36 The testimony or other evidence must be received by the Secretary of State not later than
37 three business days before the day of the hearing and may be submitted electronically.

38 “(7) All hearings under this section shall be held not later than 45 days after the deadline
39 for the person against whom the penalty may be assessed to request a hearing. However, if
40 requested by the person against whom the penalty may be assessed, a hearing under sub-
41 section (5) of this section shall be held not later than 60 days after the deadline for the per-
42 son against whom the penalty may be assessed to request a hearing.

43 “(8) The Secretary of State shall issue an order not later than 90 days after a hearing
44 or after the deadline for requesting a hearing if no hearing is held.

45 “(9) All penalties recovered under this section shall be paid into the State Treasury and

1 credited to the General Fund.

2 “(10) The Secretary of State may adopt rules for the administration of this section.

3 “SECTION 26. Sections 23 to 25 of this 2026 Act are repealed on January 2, 2031.

4 “SECTION 27. ORS 260.034 is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 249.

5 “SECTION 28. Section 29 of this 2026 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 260.

6 “SECTION 29. Any person that is a corporation or a labor organization designated as tax
7 exempt under section 501(c)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code may establish or administer
8 separate, segregated funds that operate as a political committee only if:

9 “(1) The person files a statement of organization in accordance with ORS 260.042, regis-
10 tering the funds as a small donor political committee, multicandidate political committee,
11 or both, and files any statement or report that is required under this chapter;

12 “(2) The funds consist solely of contributions from individual employees, officers, share-
13 holders or members of the person or, if the person is a labor organization, from individual
14 membership dues paid to the person, with the aggregate amount contributed by and attri-
15 buted to each individual not to exceed the limits described in ORS 260.014; and

16 “(3) Any solicitation for contributions directed to employees of the person states that the
17 employee is not required to contribute and that the employee’s decision to contribute or not
18 contribute will not affect the employee’s employment or be disclosed to the employee’s
19 supervisor or manager.

20 “SECTION 30. ORS 260.007 is amended to read:

21 “260.007. As used in this chapter, ‘contribute,’ ‘contribution,’ ‘expend’ or ‘expenditure’ does not
22 include:

23 “(1) Any written news story, commentary or editorial distributed through the facilities of any
24 broadcasting station, newspaper, magazine or other regularly published publication, unless a poli-
25 tical committee owns the facility.

26 “(2) An individual’s use of the individual’s own personal residence, including a community room
27 associated with the individual’s residence, to conduct a reception for a candidate or political com-
28 mittee and the individual’s cost of invitations, food and beverages provided at the reception.

29 “(3) A vendor’s sale of food and beverages for use in a candidate’s or political committee’s
30 campaign at a charge less than the normal comparable charge, if the charge is at least equal to the
31 cost of the food or beverages to the vendor.

32 “(4) Any unreimbursed payment for travel expenses an individual, including a candidate, makes
33 on behalf of a candidate or political committee.

34 “(5) Any loan of money made by a financial institution as defined in ORS 706.008, other than
35 any overdraft made with respect to a checking or savings account, if the loan bears the usual and
36 customary interest rate for the category of loan involved, is made on a basis that ensures repay-
37 ment, is evidenced by a written instrument and is subject to a due date or amortization schedule.
38 However, each indorser or guarantor of the loan shall be considered to have contributed that por-
39 tion of the total amount of the loan for which that person agreed to be liable in a written agreement,
40 except if the indorser or guarantor is the candidate’s spouse.

41 “(6) Nonpartisan activity designed to encourage individuals to vote or to register to vote, in-
42 cluding but not limited to activity that is allowed for a not-for-profit corporation that is tax exempt
43 under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

44 “(7) Any communication a membership organization or corporation makes to its members,
45 shareholders or employees if the membership organization or corporation is not organized primarily

1 for the purpose of influencing an election.

2 “(8) The payment of compensation for legal and accounting services rendered to a candidate or
3 political committee if the person paying for the services is the regular employer of the individual
4 rendering the services and the services are solely for the purpose of ensuring compliance with the
5 provisions of this chapter.

6 “(9) The payment by a state or local committee of a political party of the costs of preparation,
7 display or mailing or other distribution incurred by the committee with respect to a printed slate
8 card or sample ballot, or other printed listing, of three or more candidates for any public office for
9 which an election is held in this state. This subsection does not apply to costs incurred by the
10 committee with respect to a display of any such listing made on broadcasting stations or in news-
11 papers, magazines or similar types of general public political advertising.

12 “(10) A candidate debate or forum for a state office, or a communication publicizing a candidate
13 debate or forum for a state office, when candidates for the state office are invited to participate in
14 the candidate debate or forum based on neutral criteria that are publicized in advance of the invi-
15 tation.

16 “(11) The following nonpartisan communications that refer to a candidate or political party
17 within 30 calendar days before a primary election or 60 calendar days before a general election:

18 “(a) The publication of a nonpartisan voters’ guide that:

19 “(A) Is permitted to be published by a not-for-profit corporation that is tax exempt under section
20 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; or

21 “(B) With respect to each state office referenced in the voters’ guide:

22 “(i) Includes information from all major political party candidates for the state office referenced;
23 or

24 “(ii) Offers all major political party candidates for the state office referenced a reasonable op-
25 portunity to be included in the voters’ guide.

26 “(b) A commercial communication that depicts a candidate’s name, image, likeness or voice only
27 in the candidate’s capacity as owner, operator or employee of a business that existed prior to the
28 candidate’s declaration of candidacy.

29 “(c) Official publications produced or distributed by public employees while on the job during
30 working hours.

31 “(d) A communication by a labor union, membership organization or corporation to its members,
32 stockholders or executive or administrative personnel.

33 “(e) Any other nonpartisan communication identified by the Secretary of State by rule.

34 “(12) **Transfers of funds between a political party multicandidate committee and any ac-**
35 **count that is established, financed, maintained or controlled by the committee and regulated**
36 **by the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, 52 U.S.C. 30101 et seq., or its successor, to the**
37 **extent the transfers are permitted under federal law.**

38 “**SECTION 31.** ORS 260.205 is amended to read:

39 “260.205. (1) A filing officer shall inspect each statement filed under ORS **260.044**, 260.057,
40 **260.076**, 260.083, 260.112 or 260.118 not later than the 10th business day after the filing deadline or
41 the 10th business day after the statement is filed, whichever is later.

42 “(2) A filing officer immediately shall notify a person required to file a statement with the filing
43 officer under ORS **260.044**, 260.057, **260.076**, 260.083, 260.112 or 260.118 if[.],

8 “[*(4)* (3) If, upon receiving notification under subsection (2) of this section a person responds
9 by filing a statement or submitting information to correct an insufficient statement, the filing officer
10 shall confirm whether the person’s response is sufficient not later than [90] **30** days after receiving
11 the response. If, within [90] **30** days, the filing officer does not confirm whether a response is suffi-
12 cient under this subsection, the person is not subject to civil penalty under ORS 260.232 for failure

19 “(2) A filing officer immediately shall notify a person required to file a statement **or make a**

43 the time specified in ORS 260.044, 260.057, 260.076, 260.078 or 260.118, **or if a person that has ac-**
44 **cepted a contribution in excess of the amounts described in ORS 260.014 has failed to cure**
45 **the violation within 14 days of the violation in the manner described in subsection (7)(c)(B)**

1 **of this section**, the Secretary of State by first class mail or electronically shall notify the person
2 or elector designated under ORS 260.042 or 260.118 that a penalty may be imposed and that the
3 person has 20 days from the service date on the notice to request a hearing before the Secretary

9 **“(e) For each failure to comply with ORS 260.018 (3), the amount of the unlawful dis-**
10 **bursement of funds.**

11 **“[(9)] (8) The Secretary of State, upon a showing of mitigating circumstances, may reduce the**
12 **amount of the penalty described in subsection [(8)] (7) of this section.**

13 **“[(10)] (9) Except as otherwise provided by this section, civil penalties under this section shall**
14 **be imposed as provided in ORS 183.745.**

15 **“SECTION 34. ORS 260.345, as amended by section 19, chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2024, is**
16 **amended to read:**

17 **“260.345. (1) Any elector may file with any filing officer a written complaint alleging that a vi-**
18 **olation of an election law or rule adopted by the Secretary of State under ORS chapters 246 to 260**
19 **has occurred and stating the reason for believing that the violation occurred and any evidence re-**
20 **lating to it. A complaint and any evidence relating to it may be filed electronically. A complaint**
21 **alleging a violation involving the Secretary of State, a candidate for the office of Secretary of State,**
22 **or any political committee or person supporting the Secretary of State or a candidate for the office**
23 **of Secretary of State may be filed with the Attorney General. The Secretary of State or Attorney**
24 **General [shall] may not accept an anonymous complaint.**

25 **“(2) The Secretary of State by rule shall prescribe the procedure for processing a complaint filed**
26 **with any person other than the Secretary of State. If the complaint concerns the Secretary of State,**
27 **any candidate for the office of the Secretary of State, or any political committee or person sup-**

8 “(b) In the case of a violation not subject to a penalty under ORS 260.268, 260.537 or 260.993,
9 may impose a civil penalty under ORS 260.995;

10 “(c) In the case of a violation under ORS 260.537, may institute civil proceedings in the manner
11 described in ORS 260.537; or

12 “(d) In the case of a violation under ORS 260.268, may institute civil proceedings in the manner
13 described in ORS 260.268.

14 “(5) Upon receipt of a complaint or report under subsection (1), (2) or (4) of this section in-
15 volving an alleged violation subject to a penalty under ORS 260.993 or an alleged violation of ORS
16 260.268 or 260.537, the Attorney General or other prosecutor immediately shall examine the com-
17 plaint or report to determine whether a violation of an election law has occurred. If the Attorney
18 General or prosecutor determines that a violation has occurred, the Attorney General or prosecutor
19 immediately shall begin prosecution or civil proceedings in the name of the state. The Attorney
20 General or other prosecutor shall have the same powers in any county of this state as the district
21 attorney for the county.

5 outcome of any investigation and may request an administrative hearing. If the complainant requests

8 “(b) The contested case hearing officer shall prepare and issue a final order for any contested

44 a campaign communication that includes synthetic media, if the communication includes a
45 statement that the synthetic media contained therein does not accurately represent a ballot issue

3 an individual to physically or verbally impersonate a candidate without the use of technology.
