

**SENATE AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 4060
(INCLUDING AMENDMENTS TO RESOLVE CONFLICTS)**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 3, after “2025” insert “, and section 23, chapter _____,
2 Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled House Bill 4066)”.

3 After line 17, insert:

4 **“SECTION 2a. Notwithstanding section 21, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled**
5 **House Bill 4066) (amending section 3, chapter 195, Oregon Laws 2025), if House Bill 4066 be-**
6 **comes law, section 3, chapter 195, Oregon Laws 2025, is repealed by section 2 of this 2026**
7 **Act.”.**

8 On page 2, after line 31, insert:

9 **“SECTION 3a. If House Bill 4066 becomes law, section 3 of this 2026 Act (amending ORS**
10 **459.488) is repealed and ORS 459.488, as amended by section 2, chapter 195, Oregon Laws 2025,**
11 **and section 22, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled House Bill 4066), is amended to**
12 **read:**

13 “459.488. ORS 459.485 does not apply to:

14 “(1) A lamp used for image capture and projection, including photocopying, printing, directly or
15 in preprocessing, lithography, film and video projection and holography.

16 “(2) A lamp that has a high proportion of ultraviolet light emission and is one of the following:

17 “(a) A lamp with high ultraviolet content that has ultraviolet power greater than two milliwatts
18 per kilolumen.

19 “(b) A lamp for germicidal use, such as the destruction of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid), that
20 emits a peak radiation of approximately 253.7 nanometers.

21 “(c) A lamp used for disinfection or fly trapping from which either:

22 “(A) The radiation power emitted between 250 and 315 nanometers represents at least five per-
23 cent of the total radiation power emitted between 250 and 800 nanometers; or

24 “(B) The radiation power emitted between 315 and 400 nanometers represents at least 20 percent
25 of the total radiation power emitted between 250 and 800 nanometers.

26 “(d) A lamp used for the generation of ozone where the primary purpose is to emit radiation at
27 approximately 185.1 nanometers.

28 “(e) A lamp used for coral zooxanthellae symbiosis from which the radiation power emitted be-
29 tween 400 and 480 nanometers represents at least 40 percent of the total radiation power emitted
30 between 250 and 800 nanometers.

31 “(f) Any lamp used in an electronic product designed to incorporate one or more ultraviolet
32 lamps and intended for irradiation of any part of the living human body by ultraviolet radiation,
33 with wavelengths in air between 200 and 400 nanometers, to induce skin tanning.

34 “(3) A lamp used in a medical device or otherwise used for medical or veterinary diagnosis or

1 treatment.

2 “(4) A lamp used in pharmaceutical product manufacturing or quality control.

3 “(5) A lamp used for spectroscopy and photometric applications, including ultraviolet-visible
4 spectroscopy, molecular spectroscopy, atomic absorption spectroscopy, nondispersive infrared
5 (NDIR), Fourier transform infrared (FTIR), medical analysis, ellipsometry, layer thickness measure-
6 ment, process monitoring or environmental monitoring.

7 “(6) A lamp used by academic or research institutions exclusively for conducting research
8 projects or experiments.

9 “(7) A compact fluorescent lamp used to replace a lamp in a motor vehicle manufactured on or
10 before January 1, 2020.

11 “(8) A lamp purchased by a school district, as defined in ORS 332.002, or an education service
12 district, as defined in ORS 334.003, for use in buildings used to provide educational services to stu-
13 dents.

14 **“(9) A lamp purchased by the owner or operator of one or more facilities located in this**
15 **state that together comprise more than one million square feet for use in the purchaser’s**
16 **facility. For purposes of this subsection, the square footage of buildings owned or operated**
17 **by the purchaser’s parent company or subsidiary, or by an entity that is similarly related to**
18 **the purchaser, may be used to determine the total square footage of buildings owned or op-**
19 **erated by the purchaser.”.**

20 On page 3, after line 27, insert:

21 **“SECTION 4a. If House Bill 4066 becomes law, section 4 of this 2026 Act (amending ORS**
22 **459.488) is repealed and ORS 459.488, as amended by section 2, chapter 195, Oregon Laws 2025,**
23 **section 22, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled House Bill 4066), and section 3a of**
24 **this 2026 Act, is amended to read:**

25 “459.488. ORS 459.485 does not apply to:

26 “(1) A lamp used for image capture and projection, including photocopying, printing, directly or
27 in preprocessing, lithography, film and video projection and holography.

28 “(2) A lamp that has a high proportion of ultraviolet light emission and is one of the following:

29 “(a) A lamp with high ultraviolet content that has ultraviolet power greater than two milliwatts
30 per kilolumen.

31 “(b) A lamp for germicidal use, such as the destruction of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid), that
32 emits a peak radiation of approximately 253.7 nanometers.

33 “(c) A lamp used for disinfection or fly trapping from which either:

34 “(A) The radiation power emitted between 250 and 315 nanometers represents at least five per-
35 cent of the total radiation power emitted between 250 and 800 nanometers; or

36 “(B) The radiation power emitted between 315 and 400 nanometers represents at least 20 percent
37 of the total radiation power emitted between 250 and 800 nanometers.

38 “(d) A lamp used for the generation of ozone where the primary purpose is to emit radiation at
39 approximately 185.1 nanometers.

40 “(e) A lamp used for coral zooxanthellae symbiosis from which the radiation power emitted be-
41 tween 400 and 480 nanometers represents at least 40 percent of the total radiation power emitted
42 between 250 and 800 nanometers.

43 “(f) Any lamp used in an electronic product designed to incorporate one or more ultraviolet
44 lamps and intended for irradiation of any part of the living human body by ultraviolet radiation,
45 with wavelengths in air between 200 and 400 nanometers, to induce skin tanning.

1 “(3) A lamp used in a medical device or otherwise used for medical or veterinary diagnosis or

3 “(4) A lamp used in pharmaceutical product manufacturing or quality control.

4 “(5) A lamp used for spectroscopy and photometric applications, including ultraviolet-visible
5 spectroscopy, molecular spectroscopy, atomic absorption spectroscopy, nondispersive infrared
6 (NDIR), Fourier transform infrared (FTIR), medical analysis, ellipsometry, layer thickness measure-
7 ment, process monitoring or environmental monitoring.

8 “(6) A lamp used by academic or research institutions exclusively for conducting research
9 projects or experiments.

10 “(7) A compact fluorescent lamp used to replace a lamp in a motor vehicle manufactured on or
11 before January 1, 2020.

12 “[*(8) A lamp purchased by a school district, as defined in ORS 332.002, or an education service
13 district, as defined in ORS 334.003, for use in buildings used to provide educational services to stu-
14 dents.*]

15 “[*(9) A lamp purchased by the owner or operator of one or more facilities located in this state that
16 together comprise more than one million square feet for use in the purchaser’s facility. For purposes
17 of this subsection, the square footage of buildings owned or operated by the purchaser’s parent com-
18 pany or subsidiary, or by an entity that is similarly related to the purchaser, may be used to determine
19 the total square footage of buildings owned or operated by the purchaser.*]

20 “**SECTION 4b. If House Bill 4066 becomes law, section 23, chapter _____, Oregon Laws
21 2026 (Enrolled House Bill 4066) (amending ORS 459.488), is repealed.**”.

22 After line 29, insert:

23 “**SECTION 5a.** If House Bill 4066 becomes law, section 5 of this 2026 Act is amended to read:

24 “**Sec. 5.** The amendments to ORS 459.488 by section [4] **4a** of this 2026 Act become operative
25 on January [1] **2**, 2030.

26 “**SECTION 6.** (1) **As used in this section:**

27 “(a) ‘**Long term care facility**’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 442.015.

28 “(b) ‘**Residential care facility**’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 443.400.

29 “(2) **Notwithstanding ORS 441.060 and any rules adopted pursuant to ORS 441.060, a long
30 term care facility or a residential care facility is not required to submit for review plans and
31 specifications for alterations to an existing facility if the alterations consist solely of alter-
32 ations required to replace light fixtures designed to use fluorescent lamps that are subject
33 to the prohibition described in ORS 459.485 with an alternative style of light fixture.**

34 “(3) **Nothing in this section relieves a long term care facility or a residential care facility
35 from the obligation to comply with rules adopted under ORS 441.060 when the replacement
36 of light fixtures is combined with any other unrelated alteration or addition to a facility or
37 the construction of a new facility.**

38 “**SECTION 7.** **Section 6 of this 2026 Act is repealed on January 2, 2030.**”.
