

House Bill 4135

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: Makes March 4th of each year HPV Awareness Day. (Flesch Readability Score: 84.9). Designates March 4th of each year as HPV Awareness Day. Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

1 A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to HPV Awareness Day; and declaring an emergency.

3 Whereas human papillomavirus (HPV) is the most common sexually transmitted infection and a
4 leading cause of several preventable cancers, including cervical, vaginal, vulvar, anal and penile
5 cancers; and

6 Whereas cervical cancer remains a significant public health concern and HPV vaccination can
7 prevent over 90 percent of cancers caused by HPV, and early detection through routine cervical
8 cancer screening is proven to reduce HPV-related cancer risk dramatically; and

9 Whereas HPV is believed to be responsible for more than 90 percent of anal and cervical can-
10 cers, approximately 70 percent of vaginal and vulvar cancers and 60 percent of penile cancer; and

11 Whereas many people who become infected with HPV are asymptomatic and do not know they
12 have it; and

13 Whereas Oregon's HPV vaccination completion rate for adolescents, at approximately 67.6 per-
14 cent, falls below national public health goals and is lower than in many other states; and

15 Whereas gaps in public awareness about the timing and importance of HPV vaccination and
16 cervical cancer screening contribute to preventable cancers, delayed diagnoses and long-term health
17 burdens for Oregon families; and

18 Whereas only 53.1 percent of Oregon women ages 25 to 44 have reported cervical cancer
19 screenings that adequately met the recommended guidelines; and

20 Whereas clinicians recommend HPV vaccination for adolescents beginning as early as age nine
21 and routine cervical cancer screenings beginning at age 21; and

22 Whereas many Oregonians remain unaware of when vaccinations or screenings are recom-
23 mended, and increasing public understanding of these guidelines is essential to improving early de-
24 tection and prevention; and

25 Whereas access to HPV vaccinations and cervical cancer screenings is uneven across Oregon,
26 with substantial disparities affecting rural communities, low-income families and communities of
27 color; and

28 Whereas culturally responsive, community-based outreach efforts are especially effective in re-
29 ducing stigma related to HPV and improving vaccination and screening rates; and

1 Whereas improving awareness of HPV-related cancer prevention supports Oregon's broader
2 goals around health equity and disease prevention; and

3 Whereas an annual day of awareness around HPV would reinforce the Oregon Health
4 Authority's existing prevention efforts and complement the voluntary work already undertaken by
5 county health departments, school-based health centers, community clinics and youth-serving or-
6 ganizations; and

7 Whereas establishing an annual day of awareness provides a low-cost, high-impact opportunity
8 to elevate public education around HPV prevention, cervical cancer screenings and vaccine avail-
9 ability; and

10 Whereas increasing public awareness of HPV and routine screenings will support statewide
11 goals for reducing cancer disparities and increasing early detection; and

12 Whereas the Legislative Assembly encourages the Oregon Health Authority, as resources allow,
13 to recognize HPV Awareness Day each year through voluntary public education and outreach ac-
14 tivities; and

15 Whereas the Legislative Assembly further encourages local public health authorities, community
16 clinics, county health departments, school-based health centers, educators and youth-serving organ-
17 izations to participate in HPV Awareness Day by sharing medically accurate, age-appropriate and
18 culturally responsive information on HPV prevention and cervical cancer screening; now, therefore,

19 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

20 **SECTION 1. March 4th of each year is designated as HPV Awareness Day.**

21 **SECTION 2. This 2026 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
22 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2026 Act takes effect**
23 **on its passage.**

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
