4 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 414.665 is amended to read:
5 “414.665. (1) As used in this section, ‘traditional health worker’ includes any of the following:
6 “(a) A community health worker.
7 “(b) A personal health navigator.
8 “(c) A peer wellness specialist.
9 “(d) A peer support specialist.
10 “(e) A doula.
11 “(f) A tribal traditional health worker.
12 “(2) In consultation with the Traditional Health Workers Commission established under ORS
13 413.600, the Oregon Health Authority, for purposes related to the regulation of traditional health
14 workers, shall adopt by rule:
15 “(a) The qualification criteria, including education and training requirements, for the traditional
16 health workers utilized by coordinated care organizations, including [*distinct qualification criteria for*
17 *birth doulas and postpartum doulas*] **qualification criteria for the distinct perinatal doula pro-**
18 **vider types of birth doula and postpartum doula;**
19 “(b) Appropriate professional designations for supervisors of the traditional health workers; and
20 “(c) Processes by which other occupational classifications may be approved to supervise the
21 traditional health workers.
22 “(3) The criteria and requirements established under subsection (2) of this section:
23 “(a) Must be broad enough to encompass the potential unique needs of any coordinated care
24 organization;
25 “(b) Must meet requirements of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to qualify for
26 federal financial participation; and
27 “(c) May not require certification by the Home Care Commission.
28 “**SECTION 2.** **The Oregon Health Authority shall adopt by rule the qualification criteria**
29 **for the distinct perinatal doula provider types of birth doula and postpartum doula, as re-**
30 **quired under the amendments to ORS 414.665 by section 1 of this 2026 Act, no later than**
31 **January 1, 2028.**
32 “**SECTION 3.** **ORS 414.667 is repealed.**
33 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 414.668 is amended to read:
34 “414.668. (1) In determining the types and extent of health care and services to be provided to
35 medical assistance recipients under ORS 414.065, the Oregon Health Authority and a coordinated

1 care organization shall ensure that recipients have access to services provided by doulas[, *lactation*
2 *counselors and lactation educators*].

3 “(2) The services described in subsection (1) of this section must:

4 “(a) Include a minimum of 24 hours of services, in addition to labor and delivery services, re-
5 gardless of birth outcome, with an option for the authority or a coordinated care organization to
6 approve additional hours based on need;

7 “(b) Be sufficient to support recipients’ robust maternal health and support positive birth out-
8 comes; and

9 “(c) Be provided:

10 “(A) By an individual or organization from the community of the recipient, using language,
11 structures and settings familiar to members of the community; or

12 “(B) If an individual or organization from the community of the recipient is not available, by a
13 provider that has received cultural competency training within the preceding three years.

14 “(3) Access to [*doulas, lactation counselors and lactation educators*] **doula services**:

15 “(a) Must be made available without a referral **or signature** from another health care provider;
16 and

17 “(b) May not require [*a signature from or supervision by any other health care provider*] **prior**
18 **authorization**, except as necessary to approve additional hours based on need as described in sub-
19 section (2)(a) of this section.

20 “(4) A coordinated care organization shall make information about how to access services pro-
21 vided by a doula[, *lactation counselor or lactation educator*] available on a website operated by or on
22 behalf of the coordinated care organization and shall provide the information in print whenever a
23 printed explanation of benefits is available.

24 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 414.668, as amended by section 4 of this 2026 Act, is amended to read:

25 “414.668. (1) In determining the types and extent of health care and services to be provided to
26 medical assistance recipients under ORS 414.065, the Oregon Health Authority and a coordinated
27 care organization shall ensure that recipients have access to services provided by doulas.

28 “(2) The services described in subsection (1) of this section must:

29 “(a) Include a minimum of **12 visits or** 24 hours of services, **or a comparable combination of**
30 **visits and hours**, in addition to labor and delivery services, regardless of birth outcome, with an
31 option for the authority or a coordinated care organization to approve additional hours based on
32 need[;].

33 “(b) Be sufficient to support recipients’ robust maternal health and support positive birth
34 outcomes[; *and*].

35 “(c) Be provided:

36 “(A) By an individual or organization from the community of the recipient, using language,
37 structures and settings familiar to members of the community; or

38 “(B) If an individual or organization from the community of the recipient is not available, by a
39 provider that has received cultural competency training within the preceding three years.

40 “(3) Access to doula services:

41 “(a) Must be made available without a referral or signature from another health care provider;
42 and

43 “(b) May not require prior authorization, except as necessary to approve additional hours based
44 on need as described in subsection (2)(a) of this section.

45 “(4) A coordinated care organization shall make information about how to access services pro-

1 vided by a doula available on a website operated by or on behalf of the coordinated care organiza-
2 tion and shall provide the information in print whenever a printed explanation of benefits is
3 available.

4 **“SECTION 6. (1) The amendments to ORS 414.668 by section 5 of this 2026 Act apply to**
5 **contracts between coordinated care organizations and the Oregon Health Authority entered**
6 **into, amended or renewed on or after January 1, 2028.**

7 **“(2) A contract between a coordinated care organization and the authority that was en-**
8 **tered into, amended or renewed before January 1, 2028, may authorize medical assistance**
9 **coverage of services consistent with the amendments to ORS 414.668 by section 5 of this 2026**
10 **Act.**

11 **“SECTION 7. ORS 414.669 is amended to read:**

12 **“414.669. [(1)] The Oregon Health Authority, in coordination with the Traditional Health Work-**
13 **ers Commission, shall in each even-numbered year review, and revise if necessary, any rates of re-**
14 **imbursement in the state medical assistance program for doulas. When reviewing and revising rates**
15 **of reimbursement, the authority shall consider factors including retention of doulas and the need to**
16 **ensure that a career as a doula is financially sustainable, access to culturally specific doulas and**
17 **evidence-based factors and empirical studies related to the cost-effectiveness of services provided**
18 **by doulas.**

19 ***“(2) The authority shall in each even-numbered year review, and revise if necessary, any rates of***
20 ***reimbursement in the state medical assistance program for lactation counselors and lactation educators.***
21 ***When reviewing and revising rates of reimbursement, the authority shall consider factors including***
22 ***retention of lactation counselors and lactation educators and the need to ensure that a career as a***
23 ***lactation counselor or lactation educator is financially sustainable, access to culturally specific lactation***
24 ***counselors and lactation educators and evidence-based factors and empirical studies related to the***
25 ***cost-effectiveness of services provided by lactation counselors and lactation educators.*]**

26 **“SECTION 8. Section 9 of this 2026 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 414.**

27 **“SECTION 9. (1) As used in this section, ‘lactation counselor’ has the meaning given that**
28 **term in section 11 of this 2026 Act.**

29 **“(2) The Oregon Health Authority and a coordinated care organization shall ensure that**
30 **medical assistance recipients have access to services provided by lactation counselors and**
31 **that access to those services is made available without a referral from another health care**
32 **provider.**

33 **“(3) A coordinated care organization shall make information about how to access services**
34 **provided by a lactation counselor available on a website operated by or on behalf of the co-**
35 **ordinated care organization and shall provide the information in print whenever a printed**
36 **explanation of benefits is available.**

37 **“(4) The authority shall in each even-numbered year review, and revise if necessary, any**
38 **rates of reimbursement in the state medical assistance program for lactation counselors.**
39 **When reviewing and revising rates of reimbursement, the authority shall consider retention**
40 **of lactation counselors as a factor.**

41 **“SECTION 10. Section 9 of this 2026 Act applies to contracts between coordinated care**
42 **organizations and the Oregon Health Authority entered into, amended or renewed on or after**
43 **January 1, 2028.**

44 **“SECTION 11. (1) As used in this section, ‘lactation counselor’ has the meaning given**
45 **that term by the Traditional Health Workers Commission by rule.**

1 “(2) The commission shall adopt rules to establish a voluntary registration for lactation
2 counselors. The rules adopted under this section must include at least rules to:

3 “(a) Establish continuing education requirements for lactation counselors;

4 “(b) Establish standards of practice for lactation counselors;

5 “(c) Establish a voluntary registration process and requirements for lactation counselors;
6 and

7 “(d) Specify that a lactation counselor may provide services to a client who was pregnant
8 regardless of the client’s birth outcome.

9 “**SECTION 12.** ORS 743A.081 is amended to read:

10 “743A.081. (1) As used in this section[.],

11 “[(a)] ‘doula’ has the meaning given that term in ORS [414.667] **414.025.**

12 “[(b)] ‘Lactation counselor’ and ‘lactation educator’ have the meanings given those terms in ORS
13 676.665.]

14 “(2) A health benefit plan, as defined in ORS 743B.005, in this state that reimburses the cost of
15 pregnancy and childbirth expenses shall provide coverage for services provided by doulas[, lactation
16 counselors and lactation educators].

17 “(3) Covered services required under subsection (2) of this section shall include a minimum of
18 24 hours of services, in addition to labor and delivery services, regardless of birth outcome, with
19 an option for the health benefit plan to approve additional hours based on need.

20 “(4) Except for coverage of additional hours based on need as described in subsection (3) of this
21 section, the health benefit plan described in subsection (2) of this section may not require prior au-
22 thorization, a referral from another health care provider or a signature from or supervision by any
23 other health care provider for coverage of services described in this section.

24 “(5) A health benefit plan that provides the services described in subsection (2) of this section
25 shall provide information on how to access doulas[, lactation counselors and lactation educators] to
26 all enrollees.

27 “(6) The coverage required by subsection (2) of this section may be made subject to provisions
28 of the policy, certificate or contract that apply to other benefits under the policy, certificate or
29 contract, including, but not limited to, provisions related to deductibles and coinsurance.

30 “(7) The health benefit plan shall reimburse the cost for coverage of services described in this
31 section up to a total amount that is not less than \$3,760. On January 1 of each year, the Department
32 of Consumer and Business Services shall adjust the dollar limit provided by this subsection to reflect
33 the percentage changes in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers, West Region (All
34 Items), as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor or
35 a successor agency, and may vary from year to year.

36 “(8) This section is exempt from ORS 743A.001.

37 “**SECTION 13.** ORS 743A.081, as amended by section 12 of this 2026 Act, is amended to read:

38 “743A.081. (1) As used in this section, ‘doula’ [has the meaning given that term] **means a doula,**
39 **as defined in ORS 414.025, who is certified and registered by the Oregon Health Authority.**

40 “[(2) A health benefit plan, as defined in ORS 743B.005, in this state that reimburses the cost of
41 pregnancy and childbirth expenses shall provide coverage for services provided by doulas, lactation
42 counselors and lactation educators.]

43 “[(3) Covered services required under subsection (2) of this section shall include a minimum of 24
44 hours of services, in addition to labor and delivery services, regardless of birth outcome, with an option
45 for the health benefit plan to approve additional hours based on need.]

1 “(2) A health benefit plan, as defined in ORS 743B.005, in this state that provides coverage
2 for pregnancy and childbirth shall provide coverage for services provided by doulas up to
3 \$3,760 of coverage per 12-month period under a plan or per calendar year.

4 “(3) If additional doula services are needed after the benefit amount specified in sub-
5 section (2) of this section is exhausted, a health benefit plan may approve the additional
6 services, subject to reasonable medical management techniques.

7 “(4) Except for [coverage of additional hours] the approval of additional services based on need
8 as described in subsection (3) of this section, the health benefit plan described in subsection (2) of
9 this section may not require prior authorization, a referral from another health care provider or a
10 signature from or supervision by any other health care provider for coverage of services described
11 in this section.

12 “(5) A health benefit plan may develop payment models that enable the member to re-
13 ceive the following services within the benefit amount described in subsection (2) of this
14 section:

15 “(a) Support during labor and delivery; and

16 “(b) Approximately 12 visits or 24 hours, or a comparable combination thereof, of
17 prenatal or postpartum services.

18 “(6)(a) Covered services under subsection (2) of this section shall be limited to services
19 that relate directly to medical services covered by the health benefit plan.

20 “(b) The Department of Consumer and Business Services shall adopt rules specifying the
21 types of services that are not covered medical services and that are consistent with appli-
22 cable definitions and guidance adopted by the federal Internal Revenue Service on or before
23 the effective date of this 2026 Act.

24 “[(5)] (7) A health benefit plan that provides the services described in subsection (2) of this
25 section shall provide information on how to access doulas to all enrollees.

26 “[(6)] (8) The coverage required by subsection (2) of this section may be made subject to pro-
27 visions of the policy, certificate or contract that apply to other benefits under the policy, certificate
28 or contract, including, but not limited to, provisions related to deductibles and coinsurance.

29 “[(7)] *The health benefit plan shall reimburse the cost for coverage of services described in this*
30 *section up to a total amount that is not less than \$3,760. On January 1 of each year, the Department*
31 *of Consumer and Business Services shall adjust the dollar limit provided by this subsection to reflect*
32 *the percentage changes in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers, West Region (All*

35 “(9) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, a health benefit plan described
36 in subsection (2) of this section shall reimburse the cost of coverage of services up to a total
37 amount established in subsection (2) of this section. Beginning with the 2029 calendar year,
38 the Department of Consumer and Business Services shall annually adjust the maximum
39 amount of required coverage under subsection (2) of this section by multiplying the amount
40 by the percentage change in the monthly averaged Consumer Price Index for All Urban
41 Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the
42 United States Department of Labor, for the 12 consecutive months ending on the imme-
43 diately preceding December 31 compared to the monthly averaged Consumer Price Index for
44 All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), for the 12 consecutive months ending on
45 December 31, 2028.

1 “[8] (10) This section is exempt from ORS 743A.001.

2 “**SECTION 14.** (1) The amendments to ORS 743A.081 by section 13 of this 2026 Act apply
3 to health benefit plans that are issued, renewed or extended on or after January 1, 2028, and
4 to enrollees in a health benefit plan who receive services from a doula certified and regis-
5 tered by the Oregon Health Authority.

6 “(2) A health benefit plan that was issued, renewed or extended before January 1, 2028,
7 may provide covered services consistent with ORS 743A.081, as amended by section 13 of this
8 2026 Act, and enrollees in a health benefit plan that was issued, renewed or extended before
9 January 1, 2028, may receive services from a doula certified and registered by the Oregon
10 Health Authority.

11 “**SECTION 15.** Section 21, chapter 539, Oregon Laws 2025, is amended to read:

12 “**Sec. 21.** The Department of Consumer and Business Services shall issue guidance on the im-
13 plementation of [section 17 of this 2025 Act] **ORS 743A.081**, including alignment with the rules and
14 requirements for doulas[, *lactation counselors and lactation educators*] as described by the Oregon
15 Health Authority.

16 “**SECTION 16.** Section 17 of this 2026 Act is added to and made a part of the Insurance
17 Code.

18 “**SECTION 17.** (1) As used in this section:

19 “(a) ‘Health benefit plan’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 743B.005.

20 “(b) ‘Lactation counselor’ has the meaning given that term in section 11 of this 2026 Act.

21 “(2) A health benefit plan issued in this state that provides coverage for pregnancy and
22 childbirth expenses shall provide coverage for services provided by lactation counselors and
23 may not require prior authorization, a referral from another health care provider, approval
24 or a signature from another health care provider or supervision by another health care
25 provider for coverage of services described in this section.

26 “(3) A health benefit plan that provides the services described in this section shall pro-
27 vide information on how to access lactation counselors to all enrollees.

28 “(4) The coverage described in this section may be made subject to provisions of the
29 health benefit plan that apply to other benefits under the plan, including but not limited to
30 provisions relating to deductibles or coinsurance.

31 “(5) The Department of Consumer and Business Services shall issue guidance on coverage
32 of lactation counselors required by this section and on the implementation of that required
33 coverage, including alignment with the rules and requirements for lactation counselors as
34 established by the Oregon Health Authority, to the extent practicable.

5 including culturally specific organizations, the nine federally recognized **Indian** tribes in this state,

2 “676.665. As used in ORS 676.665 to 676.689:

3 “(1) ‘Lactation consultant’ means a person licensed to practice lactation consultation.

4 “(2) ‘Lactation consultation’ means the clinical application of scientific principles and evidence
5 to provide care related to lactation to childbearing families. Lactation consultation includes, but is
6 not limited to:

7 “(a) Client assessment through systematic collection of data;

8 “(b) Data analysis;

9 “(c) Creation of a care plan;

10 “(d) Implementation of the care plan, including demonstration and instructions to clients and
11 communication with the clients’ primary care provider;

12 “(e) Evaluation of client outcomes;

13 “(f) Problem identification and treatment;

14 “(g) Recommendation and use of assistive devices; and

15 “(h) Lactation education to childbearing families and to health care providers.

16 “[(3) ‘Lactation counselor’ means a person certified by the Academy of Lactation Policy and Prac-

32 “**SECTION 24.** An entity that received a grant under ORS 676.380 before the operative
33 date specified in section 25 of this 2026 Act for purposes related to lactation counselors or
34 lactation educators may use the grant for purposes related to lactation counselors on and
35 after the operative date specified in section 25 of this 2026 Act.

36 “**SECTION 25.** (1) Sections 9, 11 and 17 of this 2026 Act and the amendments to ORS
37 414.668, 676.380, 676.386 and 743A.081 by sections 5, 13, 19a and 20a of this 2026 Act become
38 operative on January 1, 2028.

39 “(2) The Oregon Health Authority, the Department of Consumer and Business Services,
40 a coordinated care organization and an insurer may take any action before the operative date
41 specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable those entities to exer-
42 cise, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section, all of the du-
43 ties, functions and powers conferred on those entities by sections 9, 11 and 17 of this 2026
44 Act and the amendments to ORS 414.668, 676.380, 676.386 and 743A.081 by sections 5, 13, 19a
45 and 20a of this 2026 Act.

1 **“SECTION 26. This 2026 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
2 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2026 Act takes effect**
3 **on its passage.”.**
