

A-Engrossed Senate Bill 5701

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act changes law relating to borrowing by the state for certain projects. (Flesch Readability Score: 63.4).

[Digest: The Act changes lottery bonds from prior sessions. (Flesch Readability Score: 61.2).]

Modifies amounts authorized for issuance of debt instruments for the biennium.

Authorizes issuance of bonds and certificates of participation for Moda Center capital improvement in the current biennium and subsequent biennium, subject to certain conditions.

Modifies previously approved lottery bonding provisions. **Authorizes issuance of various lottery bonds.**

Provides that the Oregon State University Cascades Student Health and Recreation Center project is subject to certain requirements related to apprenticeship, outreach and benefits.

Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to state financial administration; creating new provisions; amending section 15, chapter 746, Oregon Laws 2007, section 1, chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, section 44, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, sections 1, 2, 3 and 12, chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025, and sections 3, 7, 11 and 20, chapter 633, Oregon Laws 2025; repealing section 37, chapter 633, Oregon Laws 2025; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. Section 1, chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025, is amended to read:

41 **SECTION 4.** (1) **In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue general obli-**
 42 **gation bonds under ORS 286A.035, for the biennium ending June 30, 2027, at the request of**
 43 **the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the State Treasurer may issue Article**
 44 **XI-Q bonds under ORS 286A.816 to 286A.826 in an amount that produces up to \$200,000,000**
 45 **of net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an amount**

5 icates of participation in an amount that produces up to \$165,000,000 of net proceeds in the
6 biennium beginning July 1, 2027, for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section,
7 plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay costs of issuance but not to exceed
8 \$1,200,000, subject to subsection (3) of this section.

9 (2) Net proceeds of certificates of participation issued under this section must be trans-
10 ferred to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for deposit in the Oregon Arena
11 Fund established by section 3, chapter __, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), to
12 support capital improvements to the Moda Center and surrounding plaza areas.

13 (3) The department may issue certificates of participation under this section only if:

14 (a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments set forth in section 5,
15 chapter __, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), are met; and

16 (b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certificates of participation
17 issued or anticipated to be issued under this section and section 6 of this 2026 Act does not
18 exceed \$165,000,000 of net proceeds.

12 **wastewater infrastructure is an integral part of the commercial and industrial infrastructure**

15 **SECTION 38.** Section 12, chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025, is amended to read:

16 **Sec. 12.** (1) A public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall require each con-
17 tractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater to:

18 (a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable
19 occupations perform under the contract, in a manner consistent with the apprentices' respective
20 apprenticeship training programs;

21 (b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention of women, minority
22 individuals and veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having
23 at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;

24 (c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers employed by the contractor; and

25 (d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth
26 in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract
27 has an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.

28 (2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is carrying out a qualified
29 project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on
30 Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:

31 (a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;

32 (b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, minority individuals and
33 veterans; and

34 (c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits provided to workers by
35 contractors and subcontractors.

36 (3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu of, the requirements im-
37 posed under ORS 350.379.

38 (4) As used in this section:

39 (a) "Apprentice" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

40 (b) "Apprenticeable occupation" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

41 (c) "Apprenticeship training program" means the total system of apprenticeship that a particular
42 local joint committee, as defined in ORS 660.010, operates, including the local joint committee's
43 registered standards and all other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, em-
44 ploying and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

45 (d) "Minority individual" has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.
