24 **“Sec. 3.** The amount authorized, as provided by ORS 286A.035, for issuance of certificates of  
 25 participation and other financing agreements of the state during the 2025-2027 biennium for the  
 26 Oregon Department of Administrative Services is [*\$13,037,910*] **\$33,037,910.**

27 **“SECTION 4. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue general ob-**  
 28 **ligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, for the biennium ending June 30, 2027, at the request of**  
 29 **the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the State Treasurer may issue Article**  
 30 **XI-Q bonds under ORS 286A.816 to 286A.826 in an amount that produces up to \$200,000,000**  
 31 **of net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an amount**  
 32 **estimated by the State Treasurer to pay bond-related costs but not to exceed \$1,400,000,**  
 33 **subject to subsection (3) of this section.**

34 **“(2) Net proceeds of bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Oregon**  
 35 **Department of Administrative Services for deposit in the Oregon Arena Fund established in**  
 36 **section 3, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), to support capital im-**  
 37 **provements to the Moda Center and surrounding plaza areas.**

38 **“(3) The State Treasurer may issue bonds under this section only if:**

39 **“(a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments set forth in section 5,**  
 40 **chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), are met; and**

41 **“(b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certificates of participation**  
 42 **issued or anticipated to be issued under this section and section 5 of this 2026 Act does not**  
 43 **exceed \$200,000,000 of net proceeds.**

44 **“SECTION 5. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue certificates**  
 45 **of participation and other financing agreements of the state, at the request of the Oregon**

1 Department of Administrative Services, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue certifi-  
2 cates of participation in an amount that produces up to \$200,000,000 of net proceeds in the  
3 biennium ending June 30, 2027, for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section,  
4 plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay costs of issuance but not to exceed  
5 \$1,400,000, subject to subsection (3) of this section.

6 “(2) Net proceeds of certificates of participation issued under this section must be  
7 transferred to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for deposit in the Oregon  
8 Arena Fund established in section 3, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill  
9 1501), to support capital improvements to the Moda Center and surrounding plaza areas.

10 “(3) The department may issue certificates of participation under this section only if:

11 “(a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments set forth in section 5,  
12 chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), are met; and

13 “(b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certificates of participation  
14 issued or anticipated to be issued under this section and section 4 of this 2026 Act does not  
15 exceed \$200,000,000 of net proceeds.

16 “SECTION 6. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue general ob-  
17 ligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2027, at the request  
18 of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the State Treasurer may issue Article  
19 XI-Q bonds under ORS 286A.816 to 286A.826 in an amount that produces up to \$165,000,000  
20 of net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an amount  
21 estimated by the State Treasurer to pay bond-related costs but not to exceed \$1,200,000,  
22 subject to subsection (3) of this section.

23 “(2) Net proceeds of bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Oregon  
24 Department of Administrative Services for deposit in the Oregon Arena Fund established by  
25 section 3, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), to support capital im-  
26 provements to the Moda Center and surrounding plaza areas.

27 “(3) The State Treasurer may issue bonds under this section only if:

28 “(a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments set forth in section 5,  
29 chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), are met; and

30 “(b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certificates of participation  
31 issued or anticipated to be issued under this section and section 7 of this 2026 Act does not  
32 exceed \$165,000,000 of net proceeds.

33 “SECTION 7. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue certificates  
34 of participation and other financing agreements of the state, at the request of the Oregon  
35 Department of Administrative Services, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue certifi-  
36 cates of participation in an amount that produces up to \$165,000,000 of net proceeds in the  
37 biennium beginning July 1, 2027, for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section,  
38 plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay costs of issuance but not to exceed  
39 \$1,200,000, subject to subsection (3) of this section.

40 “(2) Net proceeds of certificates of participation issued under this section must be  
41 transferred to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for deposit in the Oregon  
42 Arena Fund established by section 3, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill  
43 1501), to support capital improvements to the Moda Center and surrounding plaza areas.

44 “(3) The department may issue certificates of participation under this section only if:

45 “(a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments set forth in section 5,

1 chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501), are met; and

2 “(b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certificates of participation  
3 issued or anticipated to be issued under this section and section 6 of this 2026 Act does not  
4 exceed \$165,000,000 of net proceeds.

9 individuals and veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having  
10 at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;

11 “(c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers employed by the contractor;

13 “(d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth  
14 in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract  
15 has an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.

16 “(2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is carrying out a qualified  
17 project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on  
18 Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:

19 “(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;

20 “(b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, minority individuals and  
21 veterans; and

22 “(c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits provided to workers by  
23 contractors and subcontractors.

31 registered standards and all other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, em-  
32 ploying and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

33 “(d) ‘Minority individual’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

34 “(e) ‘Qualified project’ means the following capital construction projects:

35 “(A) The Portland State University Portland Center for the Performing Arts Academic Building  
36 referenced in section 1 (1)(f) [*of this 2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025**;

37 “(B) The University of Oregon Child Behavioral Health Building project referenced in section  
38 1 (1)(g) [*of this 2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025**;

39 “(C) The Southern Oregon University Creative Industries/Student Success project referenced in  
40 section 1 (1)(h) [*of this 2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025**; [*and*]

41 “(D) The Western Oregon University Data Center project referenced in section 1 (1)(i) [*of this*  
42 *2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025**.; and

43 **“(E) The Oregon State University Cascades Student Health and Recreation Center project**  
44 **referenced in section 1 (1)(j), chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025, as amended by section 1 of this**  
45 **2026 Act.**

1           “(f) ‘Veteran’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.

2           “(g) ‘Woman’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

3           “**SECTION 39. This 2026 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**  
4 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2026 Act takes effect**  
5 **on its passage.”.**
