**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 4103**

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 4 through 24 and delete pages 2 through 4 and insert:

“SECTION 1. (1) The Senator Aaron Woods Commission on Artificial Intelligence is established within the office of Enterprise Information Services. The purpose of the commission is to identify and report on long-term policy implications in the use of artificial intelligence technologies by the state government of Oregon to assist policymakers in making strategic, well-informed decisions that foster innovation while safeguarding the well-being of Oregonians.

“(2) The commission shall:

“(a) Conduct literature reviews of public policy issues around the use by state government of artificial intelligence technologies, including the benefits and risks to the broader public and historically disadvantaged communities, taking into consideration equity, workforce impacts and ethical concerns;

“(b) Conduct reviews of existing protections under federal and state laws of individuals’ data and privacy rights, civil rights, intellectual property rights and safety, and how federal and state laws that apply to artificial intelligence technologies align, differ, conflict or interact;

“(c) Identify uses of artificial intelligence systems by the state that present or create a high risk to individuals, such as risks to

1 individuals' safety, employment rights, civil rights or constitutional
2 rights;

3 “(d) Provide recommendations on the use of artificial intelligence
4 by the state;

5 “(e) Identify impacts from the use of artificial intelligence systems
6 by the state on privacy interests of individuals in this state and what
7 policies are needed to protect individuals' privacy interests from any
8 diminution caused by the use of artificial intelligence systems in the
9 public sector;

10 “(f) Identify impacts and opportunities related to the use of artifi-
11 cial intelligence systems on public sector jobs and incomes in this
12 state and recommend policies to protect public sector jobs and incomes
13 from adverse effects from the use of artificial intelligence systems by
14 the state;

15 “(g) Conduct a review of issues around unlawful discrimination, on
16 the basis of race, color, national origin, creed, religion, sex, sexual
17 orientation, gender identity, disability, age, veteran or military status,
18 marital status, family status or any other protected class, from the
19 use of artificial intelligence systems by the state and provide recom-
20 mendations for mitigating or protecting against such discrimination;

21 “(h) Provide recommendations on prioritizing transparency to im-
22 prove the understanding of the behavior and functional components
23 of artificial intelligence systems used by the state and enable the
24 identification of performance issues, safety and privacy concerns, bi-
25 ases, exclusionary practices and unintended outcomes;

26 “(i) Conduct a review of legal and contractual protections for indi-
27 vidual personhood, including for individuals employed by the state,
28 against the use of artificial intelligence systems to create an artificial
29 replica, including an artificial replica of a person's voice, image or
30 likeness; and

1 “(j) Conduct a review on the use of artificial intelligence systems
2 by the state to support or make decisions around employment.

3 “(3) The commission shall consist of nine voting members and six
4 nonvoting members as follows:

5 “(a) The Governor shall appoint, from among persons jointly re-
6 commended by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the
7 House of Representatives, the following voting members:

8 “(A) One member who represents public sector employees, including
9 public sector employees who are members of organized labor unions.

10 “(B) One member who represents labor, trade or professional or-
11 ganizations.

12 “(C) One member who represents the public universities listed in
13 ORS 352.002 and community colleges, as defined in ORS 341.005, and
14 who has expertise in the design, effects and ethical use of artificial
15 intelligence systems.

16 “(D) One member who has expertise or a professional background
17 in artificial intelligence technology.

18 “(E) One member who has expertise in data security.

19 “(F) One member who can reflect the interests and needs of the
20 nine federally recognized Indian tribes in Oregon, appointed in con-
21 sultation with the Commission on Indian Services.

22 “(G) One member who has expertise in energy systems and natural
23 resource management.

24 “(b) The Governor shall appoint, subject to confirmation by the
25 Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS 171.562 and 171.565, the fol-
26 lowing voting members:

27 “(A) One member who represents communities that are dispropor-
28 tionately vulnerable to being harmed by algorithmic bias.

29 “(B) One member who represents public safety.

30 “(c) The nonvoting members shall be:

1 “(A) The designee of the State Chief Information Officer, who spe-
2 cializes in artificial intelligence strategy and privacy concerns.

3 “(B) The Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries or
4 the commissioner’s designee.

5 “(C) The Attorney General or the Attorney General’s designee.

6 “(D) The Secretary of State or the secretary’s designee.

7 “(E) The State Treasurer or the State Treasurer’s designee.

8 “(F) A representative from the Judicial Department, appointed by
9 the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

10 “(4) The term of office of each voting member is three years. A
11 voting member serves at the pleasure of the appointing authority.
12 Before the expiration of the term of a voting member, the appointing
13 authority shall appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1
14 of the following year. A voting member may be reappointed. If there
15 is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an
16 appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

17 “(5)(a) The commission may establish one or more advisory com-
18 mittees to advise in an area impacted by artificial intelligence used
19 by the state. An advisory committee may be established for an ongoing
20 or limited duration. In establishing an advisory committee, the com-
21 mission shall define the advisory committee’s charge, subject area of
22 focus and scope of activity.

23 “(b) Members of an advisory committee are appointed from among
24 the voting members of the commission by the chairperson of the
25 commission, subject to approval by a majority of the voting members
26 of the commission.

27 “(c) An advisory committee shall consist of no more than seven
28 members.

29 “(d) Members of an advisory committee must represent a broad and
30 diverse cross section of stakeholders in the area advised on by the

1 advisory committee.

2 “(e) One voting member of the commission may serve on an advisory committee established under this subsection, as the chair of the
3 advisory committee.
4

5 “(6) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are
6 directed to assist the commission in the performance of the duties of
7 the commission and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to
8 confidentiality, to provide information and advice that the members
9 of the commission consider necessary to perform their duties.

10 “(7) On or before September 1 of each year, the commission shall
11 submit a report in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, regulations or policies, to the
12 Legislative Assembly related to information management and technology.

15 “(8) A majority of voting members of the commission constitutes a
16 quorum for the transaction of business.

17 “(9) The commission shall elect one of its voting members to serve
18 as chairperson of the commission.

19 “(10) The commission shall meet at least once every three months
20 at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a
21 majority of the voting members of the commission.

22 “(11) Members of the commission shall be paid compensation and
23 expenses as provided in ORS 292.495 from such funds as may be available to the commission.
24

25 “(12) The designee of the State Chief Information Officer shall provide resources and staffing required by the commission to carry out
26 the commission’s duties.
27

28 **“SECTION 2. Notwithstanding the term of office specified in section**
29 **1 (4) of this 2026 Act, of the voting members first appointed to the**
30 **Senator Aaron Woods Commission on Artificial Intelligence:**

1 “(1) Three shall serve for a term ending December 31, 2027.

2 “(2) Three shall serve for a term ending December 31, 2028.

3 “(3) Three shall serve for a term ending December 31, 2029.

4 “SECTION 3. (1) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services
5 shall employ, at the appointment of the State Chief Information Offi-
6 cer, an individual responsible for developing the strategic vision for
7 the state relating to privacy, data protection and artificial intelligence.

8 “(2) The individual employed under subsection (1) of this section
9 shall:

10 “(a) Assist and advise the Senator Aaron Woods Commission on
11 Artificial Intelligence established under section 1 of this 2026 Act; and

12 “(b) Provide policy and support staff to the commission to assist the
13 commission in carrying out the commission’s duties.

14 “SECTION 4. The Oregon Department of Administrative Services
15 may charge a fee to a state agency, officer, board or commission for
16 the cost incurred by the department or the Senator Aaron Woods
17 Commission on Artificial Intelligence in providing services related to
18 artificial intelligence systems requested by a state agency, officer,
19 board or commission.

20 “SECTION 5. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropri-
21 ation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Department of Administra-
22 tive Services, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, out of the
23 General Fund, the amount of \$_____, which may be expended by the
24 department to hire additional full-time employees to enable the indi-
25 vidual employed under section 3 of this 2026 Act to carry out the
26 individual’s duties under sections 1 and 3 of this 2026 Act.”.
