3 trative Services is [*\$13,037,910*] **\$33,037,910**.

4 **“SECTION 4. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization**
5 **to issue general obligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, for the biennium**
6 **ending June 30, 2027, at the request of the Oregon Department of Ad-**
7 **ministrative Services, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q**
8 **bonds under ORS 286A.816 to 286A.826 in an amount that produces up**
9 **to \$200,000,000 of net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection**
10 **(2) of this section, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer**
11 **to pay bond-related costs but not to exceed \$1,400,000, subject to sub-**

2 proceeds in the biennium ending June 30, 2027, for the purposes de-
3 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an amount estimated by
4 the State Treasurer to pay costs of issuance but not to exceed
5 \$1,400,000, subject to subsection (3) of this section.

6 “(2) Net proceeds of certificates of participation issued under this
7 section must be transferred to the Oregon Department of Adminis-
8 trative Services for deposit in the Oregon Arena Fund established in
9 section 3, chapter __, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501) to
10 support capital improvements to the Moda Center and surrounding
11 plaza areas.

12 “(3) The department may issue certificates of participation under
13 this section only if:

19 section and section 4 of this 2026 Act does not exceed \$200,000,000 of
20 net proceeds.

21 **“SECTION 6. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization**
22 **to issue general obligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, for the biennium**
23 **beginning July 1, 2027, at the request of the Oregon Department of**
24 **Administrative Services, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q**
25 **bonds under ORS 286A.816 to 286A.826 in an amount that produces up**
26 **to \$165,000,000 of net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection**
27 **(2) of this section, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer**
28 **to pay bond-related costs but not to exceed \$1,200,000, subject to sub-**
29 **section (3) of this section.**

30 “(2) Net proceeds of bonds issued under this section must be trans-

1 referred to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for de-
2 posit in the Oregon Arena Fund established by section 3, chapter __,
3 Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501) to support capital im-
4 provements to the Moda Center and surrounding plaza areas.

5 “(3) The State Treasurer may issue bonds under this section only
6 if:

7 “(a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments
8 set forth in section 5, chapter __, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate
9 Bill 1501) are met; and

10 “(b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certif-
11 icates of participation issued or anticipated to be issued under this
12 section and section 7 of this 2026 Act does not exceed \$165,000,000 of
13 net proceeds.

14 SECTION 7. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization
15 to issue certificates of participation and other financing agreements
16 of the state, at the request of the Oregon Department of Administra-
17 tive Services, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue certificates
18 of participation in an amount that produces up to \$165,000,000 of net
19 proceeds in the biennium beginning July 1, 2027, for the purposes de-
20 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an amount estimated by
21 the State Treasurer to pay costs of issuance but not to exceed
22 \$1,200,000, subject to subsection (3) of this section.

23 “(2) Net proceeds of certificates of participation issued under this
24 section must be transferred to the Oregon Department of Adminis-
25 trative Services for deposit in the Oregon Arena Fund established by
26 section 3, chapter __, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate Bill 1501) to
27 support capital improvements to the Moda Center and surrounding
28 plaza areas.

29 “(3) The department may issue certificates of participation under
30 this section only if:

1 “(a) The prerequisite conditions for issuance of debt instruments
2 set forth in section 5, chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2026 (Enrolled Senate
3 Bill 1501) are met; and

4 “(b) The aggregate amount of net proceeds from bonds and certif-
5 icates of participation issued or anticipated to be issued under this
6 section and section 6 of this 2026 Act does not exceed \$165,000,000 of
7 net proceeds.

19 other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, employing
20 and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

21 “(d) ‘Minority individual’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
22 200.005.

23 “(e) ‘Qualified project’ means the following capital construction projects:

24 “(A) The Portland State University Portland Center for the Performing
25 Arts Academic Building referenced in section 1 (1)(f) [*of this 2025 Act*],
26 **chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025;**

27 “(B) The University of Oregon Child Behavioral Health Building project
28 referenced in section 1 (1)(g) [*of this 2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon Laws**
29 **2025;**

30 “(C) The Southern Oregon University Creative Industries/Student Success

1 project referenced in section 1 (1)(h) [*of this 2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon**
2 **Laws 2025**; [*and*]

3 “(D) The Western Oregon University Data Center project referenced in
4 section 1 (1)(i) [*of this 2025 Act*], **chapter 630, Oregon Laws 2025**[.]; **and**

5 “(E) **The Oregon State University, Cascades Student Health and**
6 **Recreation Center project referenced in section 1 (1)(j), chapter 630,**
7 **Oregon Laws 2025, as amended by section 1 of this 2026 Act.**

8 “(f) ‘Veteran’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.

9 “(g) ‘Woman’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

10 **“SECTION 39. This 2026 Act being necessary for the immediate**
11 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**
12 **declared to exist, and this 2026 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**
