Our names are Keith and Laura Middleton, and we currently reside in Monroe Michigan. We previously owned and operated a 500-acre farm in Bend, Oregon. **BY PASSING THIS BILL IT WILL ABSOLUTELY SAVE 100’S OF FARMS!!!** I am writing today to express my strong support for HB 4153. We are farmers, and I believe this bill is essential for preserving the rural experiences along with preserving the family farms that many love so deeply.

Preserving farms is essential for ensuring a sustainable food supply. Farmstands allow farmers to sell directly to consumers, fostering community connections and transparency in food sourcing. They also serve as platforms for educating the public about local agriculture and sustainable practices.

Agriculture is a major industry, creating numerous jobs in farming and related sectors. Farms also contribute more in property taxes than they consume in public services.
