To the Senate Committee on Commerce and General Government:

I'm writing in support of SB 1512: Prosperity Programs. When Oregon invests in jobs, it strengthens families, communities, and our statewide economy. Prosperity Programs build on the success of Prosperity 10,000 (P10K)—with 9,285 Oregonians served to date, the program delivers extraordinary results. But the clock is ticking; current funding expires June 30, 2026. Renewed investment is essential to protect this proven infrastructure and keep Oregon economically competitive.

Prosperity Programs are a revenue-generating strategy, not an expense. The state's original \$35 million investment in P10K has generated a \$149.1 million return on investment over two years. Renewed investment translates to additional tax revenue for the state and continued reduction in social service costs.

Prosperity Programs reach people often left behind by traditional systems—women, people of color, veterans, rural residents, Oregonians with disabilities, and neighbors navigating barriers like housing instability or justice involvement. Participants aren't just completing training; they're landing family-wage jobs averaging \$22.73/hour, with most working full-time and earning more than Oregon's Self-Sufficiency Standard.

Prosperity Programs are set up to help your constituents directly. Local workforce development boards—like Worksystems in the Portland-metro region—tailor services to community needs (e.g., career coaching, skills training, wraparound supports, and paid work experiences).

SB 1512 strengthens the existing Prosperity Program infrastructure—expanding goals, centering equitable access, and setting clear benchmarks for completion and employment while establishing standards that ensure fair wages and strong training plans for participants.

Over the last several years, Prosperity Programs have helped nearly 3,000 workers in the Portland Metro Area to connect with much needed employment and training services to move into high-quality and self-sustaining jobs. Funding has supported both individuals looking for work and businesses who need a talented workforce. I have personally seen the positive impact of these funds on community member's livelihoods. Oregon's investment in individual career advancement builds stronger communities, a more robust income tax base, and the skilled workers that business

needs to maintain competitiveness.

With federal workforce dollars down sharply over the last decade, Prosperity Programs are Oregon's most effective tool for connecting people to quality jobs and keeping our economy competitive. Thank you for your leadership and for supporting programs that deliver measurable results where they're needed most.
