My life has been made infinitely better by access to Topaz Farm. I grew up visiting my grandparents' farm and getting to interact with animals and rural life in a safe supportive space. I am so grateful that my daughter was able to grow up in Oregon learning the same kinds of things, now that my family no longer owns their own land. Learning about agriculture, enjoying the fruits of nature, even understanding that lambs grow up to be really good dinners has helped my entire family to better appreciate Oregon and to really understand where our food comes from and the importance of farms.
