Chair and Committee Members,

My name is Regina, and I am writing today in strong support of HB 4153. This legislation is a vital lifeline for Oregon's small and mid-sized family farms, which are currently facing an existential threat from outdated and overly restrictive land-use regulations.

For generations, Oregon has prided itself on protecting its farmland. However, the definition of what it means to "farm" must evolve to meet the economic realities of the 21st century. Today, growing a crop is often not enough to keep a family farm solvent. ?? ??

The Challenge: Regulatory Stagnation

Farms like Topaz Farm and others across the state have become "experience destinations" for their communities. Yet, they are frequently hamstrung by rules that restrict event counts and place arbitrary income caps on non-farm products. Current regulations often penalize farms if their "incidental" revenue—such as tickets for a corn maze or a farm-to-table dinner—exceeds a small fraction of their total sales.

The Ripple Effect: Community & Economic Impact

The benefits of HB 4153 extend far beyond the farm gate. When family farms like the Echo Corn Maze in Umatilla County are allowed to thrive, the entire region wins:

- \* Educational Hubs: ?? These farms serve as outdoor classrooms for our children to learn about agriculture.

- \* Local Job Creation: ?? Agritourism is a primary employer for local youth and seasonal workers.

- \* Supporting the Local Value Chain: ?? This bill allows farmers to sell products from neighboring farms, keeping dollars within our rural communities.
