Oregon has pride in a long history of protecting rural areas, as well as small family farms, and encouraging small businesses and entrepreneurship. Oregon, with help from the federal government, has put in place programs to help rural areas, which are too often economically disadvantaged relative to our higher density metros with their more vigorous economies.
