My name is Mary and I am a resident of Wilsonville. I am writing today to express my strong support for HB 4153. I am not a farmer, but I am a frequent customer of Oregon’s farm stores, and I believe this bill is essential for preserving the rural experiences that my family and I value so deeply.

For me, visiting a local farm like Wooden Shoe Tulip Farm is about much more than just taking pictures of flowers but celebrating peaceful moments with my family and appreciating the slow pace of life. If you have any brains, you would support all local farms in Oregon. Don’t fine them please! I don’t want local farms to close. I want to make happy memories by taking my goddaughter to those farms. Those farms also provide jobs for people. Those fun activities for children make life worth living. I was frustrated to learn that current outdated laws actually make it harder—and sometimes illegal—for farmers to host these activities. I also appreciate that this bill includes strict guardrails.
