Re: Support for SB 1506-01

Chair Taylor, Vice-Chair Hayden, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Robert Camarillo, and I am the Executive Secretary of the Oregon State Building and Construction Trades Council. I am submitting this testimony in support of SB 1506-1.

The Oregon State Building and Construction Trades Council (OSBCTC) is a statewide umbrella organization comprised of 31 member unions and 6 regional local councils, representing tens of thousands of Union skilled trades workers in a wide array of crafts across the state. OSBCTC's affiliates are leaders in the nation - establishing apprenticeship programs that continue to advance quality work and high performing trades workers. Together, we advocate for local jobs that provide family-sustaining wages, registered apprenticeship and training opportunities, and safe working conditions for the construction industry.

Our council strongly supports the critical work that the Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) does to protect workers' rights, ensure fair compensation, and prevent employers from undercutting each other by paying lower wages or exploiting workers. As we see the increased need for skilled construction workers across our state, it has never been more important that the agency has secure, long term, and sustainable funding.

One of the funding mechanisms provided by SB 1506-01, creating the BOLI Worker Benefit Fund, helps to create the security the agency needs and it's important to note: this is an entirely separate fund from the existing Workers' Benefit Fund, leaving the existing workers compensation system untouched. This change will cost workers approximately \$2 a year – a worthwhile investment to ensure that BOLI is able to enforce the laws that workers depend on for accessing justice for workplace civil rights violations and wage issues.

Additionally, the nominal shift in the Prevailing Wage fee cap will generate \$1.5 million to sustain and fully fund the critical work of supporting Prevailing Wage laws, guaranteeing that ALL workers on public works projects are paid wages that reflect the local labor market standards, ensuring fairness in compensation. This is particularly important in the construction industry, where pay discrepancies can lead to a race to the bottom, driving wages down and potentially compromising the quality of work, and creating an uneven playing field where good contractors must compete against those that steal wages.

In conclusion, the Oregon State Building and Construction Trades Council strongly supports this bill, and we urge the committee to prioritize the funding needed to fully support BOLI's work.
