Dear Chair Golden, and Members of the Senate Natural Resources Committee,

My name is Marissa Thompson, and I live in Portland, OR.  
When you make a mess, you should clean it up. That's why I support the creation of the Climate Resilience Superfund, to hold polluters accountable by making the large, out-of-state fossil fuel companies pay their fair share.

This bill is important to me because for decades, large polluters have dumped climate pollution into our air and water while we bear the cost of heart and lung diseases, lost homes to wildfires, and higher food prices due to water shortages. These polluters always knew this was happening, but continued to do it while piling up massive profits with no accountability. Now it's time they pay for the damage they've done. Taxpayers and local governments are already paying for the climate crisis, even though they're not the ones causing it. The costs of responding to climate-related disasters and of making our communities more resilient will have to be paid one way or another, but Oregon legislators have the power to decide who foots the bill. We've been footing the bill while fossil fuel companies rake in the profits. That must end.
