I was only vaguely aware of the function and varied condition of Hub facilities when I moved here. It was not top of the amenities advertised in real estate ads, imagine that! While that is not the only environmental cauldron awaiting a mishap, it's a set-up for a massive catastrophe which I wonder if I would survive. Corporations involved there do not show serious intentions to upgrade facilities. They rely on inaction by regulators while they draw profit rather than spend the necessary for preventive work... and their investors won't look kindly on the corporation paying for something without a clear monetary incentive. The climate is changing and we have no Planet B. We have to take care of the one we have rather than let investors extract whatever they can with no responsibilities. therefore I support SB 1541, the creation of the Climate Resilience Superfund.
