*Army National Guard: Makes up roughly half of the Army's total maneuver forces, including combat units like infantry and armor, alongside support brigades (engineers, intelligence, medical).

*Air National Guard: Composed of personnel operating aircraft, cybersecurity units, and support roles.

*Personnel: Primarily "citizen-soldiers" who hold civilian jobs, attend college, or have other careers while serving on a part-time basis (usually one weekend a month, two weeks a year), but can be activated full-time.

*Organization: Organized into units by state and territory.

*State Duty (Governor): Activated by state governors for local emergencies, such as natural disasters, civil unrest, or, recently, cybersecurity and COVID-19 response.
